An SOS is still out for more instructors for the Learn to Swim Program. Let's just do it.





The Friendship Dinners were initiated in 2002 by <u>PP Russ Cunningham</u> one of our honored guests today.







**Jim Passage** was born in December of 1940 in Buffalo, New York; he has an older sister and a younger brother. **Jim's** family was simple and old fashioned, his father was an accountant and believed in healthy meals, being clean and orderly, and sharing chores. **Jim** spent a lot of time pulling weeds, shoveling snow (you know there is a lot of snow in Buffalo), mowing lawns, picking strawberries, and delivering newspapers.

Having received a full tuition scholarship from the Michigan Alumni Club, in Buffalo, **Jim** enrolled in the <u>University of Michigan</u> in 1958 majoring in Civil Engineering. During this period **Jim** joined a small fraternity and enrolled in ROTC. Influenced by his strong work ethic **Jim** had several jobs through college. One of **Jim's** jobs was working at a liquor store, which made him BMOC (Big Man on Campus).

His life changed drastically when he met his first wife at a party they fell in love and were married in 1962. With a lot of help from his professors in finding jobs and student loans **Jim** was able to finish his undergraduate studies in the spring of 1963. **Jim** was recruited by the State of California as a Civil Engineer and with his wife and first daughter (born in November 1962) moved to The Golden State and started work as a Junior Civil Engineer for the Division of Highways in San Francisco.

**Jim's** second daughter was born in November 1963. **Jim** became a licensed California Civil Engineer in 1967 and eventually left the Division of Highways to become a design engineer for a private firm. **Jim** and his first wife divorced in 1971.

While folk dancing at the Mandala Club in San Francisco, **Jim** met his second wife **Celine**, they fell in love and were married at the Casa Madrona Hotel in Sausalito in November 1974. Celine suffers from dementia and is a resident at the Primrose in Santa Rosa.

**Jim** is a volunteer at the <u>Burbank Farm</u>, he learning to play classical music on the piano, and volunteers as "Read to Me" tutor -- **Jim** also enjoys English Country Dance. **Jim** and his two daughters are very close. # Ron Lindenbusch – Community Involvement





**Nao Noguchi** stepped up to the podium to introduce our guest speaker <u>Ron Lindenbusch</u>. Nao met Ron Lindenbusch 13 years ago when Nao's daughter won a silent auction item which was a beer tasting and brewery tour at Lagunitas. Since then Lagunitas has been supplying beer for Taiko events and fundraisers that Nao was involved. Ron grew up in St. Louis and moved to California in 1984, where he discovered a craft brewing scene the likes of which Missouri had never seen. Ron found his way into the craft brewing scene via the restaurant business. He began pushing beers such as Acme and Grant's as these pioneers were making their first splashes in the mid-80s. He left the corporate restaurant business to run the Tavern at the Hopland Brewery-- the first brewpub since the prohibition. Tony Magee founded Lagunitas Brewery in 1993 and Ron joined him to head up the marketing and distribution side of the business. They had an unconventional approach and developed an anti-marketing plan that focuses on relationships and having fun.

To start off his presentation Ron mentioned that the relationship between the hops and barley farmers and the craft brewers is extremely important, it is good for them to know the price they will get for their crop and good for the brewery

to know the price they will pay for their key components. Some years the farmers could get a better price on the commodity market but when prices are very low they face serious losses. Lagunitias makes sure the deal is good for the farmers and for the brewery. At the end of every harvest the brewers and the farmers have a big get together. Lagunitas purchases hops from Yakima Washington and barley from Alberta Canada.

Since Americans have learned to enjoy beers with different flavors and alcohol content, the industry has experienced substantial growth. In 2013 the industry realized an 18% growth in volume and a 20% growth increase in retail dollar value. Craft beers account for 7% of all beer sales. Lagunitas is 5th in size among craft brewers. In February of this year they were #1 among all beer producers in the sale of 12 packs in grocery stores. In the mid 2000's Lagunitas sales were 27,000 barrels per year -- in 2014 they produced over 250,000 barrels. Their facility in Petaluma can produce up to 600,000 barrels per year.

Because they were spending \$150,000 per month shipping beer east, they decided it makes sense to build a brewery in the East, currently building a facility in Chicago. They chose Chicago not only because it is a transportation hub but also because they have a consistent supply of good quality water being close to Lake Michigan. One of the problems Lagunitas faces in Sonoma County is the current drought condition that could force them to use well water at great expense for treatment and the introduction of different flavors.

Lagunitas has always had a strong commitment to the community, wherever the community may be. For example they contribute beer to 3500 charitable events per year including the Taiko Drummer party in Sebastopol.



After thanking Ron for a very interesting and entertaining presentation, **President Ron** rang the meeting to a close.



#### **Rotarians Taking Action**

The session opened to a presentation by District Governor Kevin Eisenberg after which the teens participated in a number of ice breaking sessions, discussions of leadership styles, and sharing of projects.



The highlight of the event was a presentation by Jen Julius, a Life Coach, who discussed many issues faced by leaders including the need for role models whose actions match their words – all the time, how to face challenges and difficulties, the value of confidence, and how to maintain your core values while not always having to be right.

This successful and valuable conference was organized by Linda Ruffing and Kristina Carbone-Smith of the Fort Bragg Rotary, Donna Schuler

of the Mendocino Rotary provided the MC talent, and <u>Marilyn Lira</u> of Santa Rosa East Rotary made sure tummies were full of good food.
