




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Club President 2014/2015: Ron Puccinelli

Jim Passage and Music and Memory





Ron Puccinelli proudly informed the club that **Jim Passage** was nominated and selected for the District 5130 Individual Service to Club award. This award was given to **Jim** for his efforts on behalf of people with Alzheimer's disease.

Jim and Judy Serkissian from Mirabel Mirabel Lodge Senior Living Community were given the podium to present this local Alzheimer project. There are at least 5 million dementia patients in the United States and there are roughly 9,000 dementia patients in Sonoma County. Music and Memory, a non-profit in New York State, has developed and perfected a program that has demonstrated real help. With this IPod music program residents are more social, more talkative and exhibit more engaged speech.

Mirabel Lodge has prepared for this program by identifying the fifteen Mirabel residents most in need of socialization, by contacting their families, purchasing the

needed equipment, and preparing play lists and handling music acquisition. Now we need 5 - 7 Rotarians or Friends who can volunteer for 1 - 1.5 hours one afternoon a week, for three months.

That fact prompted Ryan Smith, a medical student at Drexel University College of Medicine in Pennsylvania, USA, to ask his Rotarian father how they could make a difference. The answer was a global grant project that has connected Drexel staff with counterparts at Makerere University School of Health Sciences in Kampala, Uganda, in an exchange of ideas aimed at reducing childbirth-related mortality and morbidity.
