

We were recognized for our total contributions to PolioPlus, highest in the district at \$57,323.42, total contributions to The Rotary Foundation of \$113,193.40, again the highest in the district, and per capita giving of \$295.87. This is something that we can all be proud of. Congratulations to you all.

Rick Wilson made a presentation in honor of <u>Foundation Week</u> featuring the work of club member **Steve Prandini** and his wife, **Rosanne**, in the African nation of Zimbabwe. Zimbabwe is in such dire straits that it is really difficult to call it a nation. AIDS runs rampant and the economy is near collapse. **Steve** and **Rosanne** worked at <u>Chidamoyo Hospital</u> for a month in 2010 and since their return, they have continued to support the hospital. Supplies, hospital beds, and blood machines have all been provided with the help of Sebastopol Rotary. **Rick** also reported that since the depths of despair in 2010, Zimbabwe has made some progress on the economic and health fronts.



Although you probably missed the in-depth coverage on Fox News or MSNBC, our club was required to vote on a change to the District Bylaws regarding the election of District Governors. Sweet Spinner Raffle





Nao Noguchi introduced the speaker for the day <u>Dr. Tomio Iwamoto</u>. Dr. Iwamoto is a graduate of UCLA, University of Miami and Oregon State making him a Bruin-Hurricane - Beaver. After doing research for the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, teaching at Miami and Corvallis he began a 39 year career with the California Academy of Science in San Francisco.

Dr. Iwamoto began with a motto that he likes to remember - The human brain is a wonderful organ, it begins working immediately at birth and doesn't stop working until you get up to give a speech.



Dr. Iwamoto spoke of climate change and some of the profound future effects on critical fisheries. While it is true



Since we know that climate change is happening, what does that mean for important fisheries? Dr. Iwamoto introduced us to the Walleye Pollock. While not discussed extensive by the anglers in the club, the Pollock fishery is one of the largest, most valuable fisheries in the world. [From 1977-2011 the catch of eastern Bering Sea pollock has

averaged 1.17 million tons — a whole lot of fish sticks. **–Ed.**] Warmer seawater will cause the Pollock to migrate northward and will increase the number of the natural predators. Negative impacts on this important fishery will cause additional downstream effects.

President Ron thanked <u>Dr. Tomio Iwamoto</u> for his interesting talk and presented him with a donation in his name to <u>The Pathway Home</u>. He then rang the bell at 1:30, closing the meeting and sending many back to continue preparations for the Gala.

THE ABC's of Rotary

#61: RI's General Secretary

The day-to-day operations of Rotary International's Secretariat are under the supervision of the general secretary, the top professional officer of Rotary. Although the general secretary is responsible to the RI Board of Directors and president, he provides the ongoing management for about 600 staff members who comprise the Secretariat of Rotary International.

The general secretary serves as secretary to the RI Board and is also the chief executive and financial officer of The Rotary Foundation, under the supervision of the Trustees of the Foundation. He is the secretary of all Rotary committees as well as the Council on Legislation, regional conferences, and the annual RI Convention.

The general secretary is appointed by the RI Board for a term of not more than three years, which may be renewed by the Board. Since 1910, 10 men have served in that position. Chesley Perry, the original general secretary, served from 1910 to 1942. Others who followed were Phil Lovejoy (1942-52), George Means (1953-72), Harry Stewart (1972-78), Herb Pigman (1979-86 and 1993-95), Philip Lindsey (1986-90), Spencer Robinson Jr. (1990-93), Geoffrey Large (1995-97), and S. Aaron Hyatt (1997-2000). Ed Futa was appointed in 2000.

Throughout the history of Rotary, the personal influence and administrative skills of our general secretaries have significantly shaped the course of Rotary programs and activities.

Pacific Manta Research Group is a conservation and research organization that studies the manta rays of the Eastern Pacific, focusing on the Gulf of California, Banderas Bay, and Islas Revillagigedo, under consideration as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Roots of Rotary's polio efforts go way back

On 29 September 1979, Rotarians and delegates of the Philippine Ministry of Health

looked on as volunteers administered drops of the lifesaving Sabin polio vaccine to children in the Manila barrio of Guadalupe Viejo. When James L. Bomar Jr., then RI president, put the first drops of vaccine into a child's mouth, he ceremonially launched the Philippine poliomyelitis immunization effort and Rotary's first international grant project.
