President Ron introduced our speaker today, <u>Chris Bingham</u>, who heads up the <u>County's Veteran Service Office</u>. Chris, himself a vet, flew P-3 Orions for the Navy, and later transferred to the Air Force, finishing his career flying C5A Galaxys, the military's largest transport.

The County Veterans Service Office is NOT a branch of the Federal Government's VA office, but a service offered by the Human Services Department of Sonoma County. Their goal is to help veterans and their families obtain benefits and services that are available to them, including some they may not even be aware of. Many times clients will visit their office for assistance with one issue, only to discover that they may be eligible for other benefits as well.

<u>Their service is completely free to veterans</u>, and they are a full service office, walking you through the total process from beginning



to end. While pension claims typically take from 30 to 60 days, disability claims can take anywhere from 3 to 6 months. Chris said dealing with the VA on your own can be like defending yourself in court without an attorney. Not the best thing to do. Their office knows how to deal with the Federal backlog at the VA, knowing how to cross all the T's and dot the I's to expedite the process to as fast a resolution as possible.

When some folks think of disabilities, they think of missing limbs...but a disability can also be a disfiguring scar, a <u>hearing</u> <u>loss</u> (#1 item they deal with) or post-traumatic stress. Benefits can range from a monthly stipend, hearing aids, or access to mental health services for these issues. Stipends can be as high as \$8,000 per month, depending on the severity of the disability.

Many may also be eligible for healthcare if their annual income is \$50,000 or less. Although VA healthcare has been in the press a lot lately, 90% of those who do receive these services are very happy with the care.

Chris told us of WWII vets with missing limbs who say, "I'm fine, I don't need help. Give it to someone who needs it more than me." But with our aging vet population from WWII, Korea, and now Vietnam, many are in need of caregivers, and they may be eligible for monthly caregiver benefits ranging from \$1,700 for a vet, \$1,130 for his dependent survivor, or up to \$2,085 for a married couple, depending on their net worth.

Other benefits range from burial benefits, if you are getting disability benefits, to student tuitions for dependents at a State or Community College. Many may also be eligible for Cal Vet Veterans Homes.

To find out more about their services, go to <u>http://scvets.org</u>. Their offices are open Monday through Thursday, from 8am to 5pm. They will see drop-ins from 8:30 to 10am, but recommend making an appointment, which you can schedule by calling (707) 565-5960. They are located at 3725 Westwind Blvd, in Santa Rosa.



President Ron thanked Chris for his informative talk today and informed him the club would be making a donation to <u>The</u> <u>Pathway Home</u>, an organization dedicated to helping Iraq and Afghanistan vets reintegrate into civilian life, in his name. THE ABC's of Rotary

#60: Still More Rotary Firsts

- Rotary first presented Significant Achievement Awards in 1969 to clubs with outstanding international or community service projects.
- Rotary's first Interact club was organized in Melbourne, Florida, USA, in 1962 to become the pioneer for about 8,600 Interact clubs in 110 countries.
- Rotary's first convention held in the Southern Hemisphere was in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in 1948.
- Rotary's first community service project took place in 1907 when Chicago Rotarians led a campaign to install a public "comfort station" in the city hall.
- The first year the Rotary Foundation received total contributions of a million dollars in a single year was 1964-65. Today, more than \$70 million is given annually. Contributions since 1917 total more than \$1.3 billion.
- Rotary's first appeal for aid to disaster victims was in 1913 when \$25,000 was given for flood relief in Ohio and Indiana, USA.


Speaker: Tomio Iwamoto, Ph.D., Curator Emeritus, California Academy of Sciences, Dept. of Ichthyology

Program: "Climate Change and Its Effect on North Coast Fisheries"



Dr. Iwamoto worked at the Cal Academy for almost 40 years before retiring in 2011. The Department of Ichthyology there is home to one of the largest, most significant collections of fishes in the world. He will tell us about his studies of "grenadiers", a group of more than 400 deep-sea fishes related to the codfish. Grenadiers (Family Macrouridae), also known as "rattail fish" are found in all oceans, but 80-90% are found in tropical and Most importantly, subtropical seas.

because of their wide distribution, they can also be a marker for changes in the ocean due to climate change -- and how those changes may affect our vital North Coast Fisheries. Dr. Iwamoto will tell us about his studies and why we should be interested in what he has learned about the humble Grenadier fish.
