yet vaguely psychedelic photos taken during last week's rain storm featuring his dogs Honey and Blondie.





Yvette Williams van Aggelen introduced our speaker, <u>Heidi Dhangyai</u>, who was standing in for her husband, artist <u>Tashi Dhangyai</u>.

The <u>Tibetan Gallery & Studio in Sebastopol</u> is run by Tibetan master artist, Tashi Dhargyal.

Visitors can view Tashi working on thangka (traditional Buddhist scroll paintings), and also join into his weekly classes. Tashi is one of the few masters in the West working entirely in the traditional Tibetan method, which includes hand ground mineral pigments, and 24k gold.

<u>Tashi's studio in the Barlow</u> has become home to a very unique project, the first <u>thanbochi</u> painted by a Tibetan outside of Tibet. This will be a most auspicious endeavor for North America. <u>A thanbochi is a very large thangka</u> that is shown at special prayer ceremonies and brings blessings to all who see it. <u>This massive undertaking will take almost five years</u>, and when completed, the canvas will be <u>two stories high</u>.



The Studio is located in The Barlow (6770 McKinley Street #130, Sebastopol, CA) [Selected for its two-story-high ceiling - **Ed.**] and is open Wednesday-Sunday, Noon-7 p.m. in the summer, Noon-5 p.m. in the winter, and by appointment.

It also features traditional Tibetan *Menris thangka*, and a small shop with beautiful art-quality prints, as well as one-of-a-kind items featuring Tashi's art, fair-trade sourced custom silk scarves, and small Buddhist shrine items. Funds raised at the gallery go directly to support student artists here in California and at the school in Tibet.

Our program Friday, October 10th is Buzzy Martin, known throughout the county and beyond for his work with At-risk Youth through a program called "Mentoring Through Music". Buzzy developed this program when he saw the appeal of prison life to at-risk youth, and saw what prison life was like for young inmates. He had the unique opportunity to teach guitar to inmates at San Quentin, where he saw the powers of music to change people. He'll speak to us, and sing to us.... And maybe change us a little, too!

#55: Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA)

Each summer, thousands of young people are selected to attend Rotary-sponsored leadership camps or seminars in the United States, Australia, Canada, India, France, Argentina, Korea, and numerous other countries. In an informal atmosphere, groups of outstanding young people in the 14-30 age range spend a week in a challenging program of leadership training, discussions, inspirational addresses, and social activities designed to enhance personal development, leadership skills, and good citizenship. The official name of this activity is the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards program (RYLA), although these events are sometimes referred to by other names, such as Camp Royal, Camp Enterprise, youth leaders seminars, or youth conferences.

The RYLA program began in Australia in 1959, when young people throughout the state of Queensland were selected to meet with Princess Alexandra, the young cousin of Queen Elizabeth II. The Rotarians of Brisbane, who hosted the participants, were impressed with the quality of the young people. It was decided to bring youth leaders together each year for a week of social, cultural, and educational activities. The RYLA program gradually grew throughout all the Rotary districts of Australia and New Zealand. In 1971, the RI Board adopted RYLA as an official program of Rotary International. RYLA is generally conducted as a district activity


To be considered in the next funding cycle applications must be submitted by October 27, 2014.
