It (the program) was billed as, 'Ecuador Rain Forest Chocolate Production', but the potential impact on a large part of Ecuador, the country -- and the world -- is far, far reaching. And much of this has to do with one person's effort; someone with close connections to our club, Sebastopol and, of course, the **Rogers** family.

<u>Dr. Amy Rogers</u> took an interest in fireflies as a 5year-old, to a place few can imagine. She returned to her 'home' in Sebastopol with her two young sons, <u>Kai</u> and <u>Kingston</u>. Even with her academic/science background (including a Ph.D. from U.C.L.A., a Fulbright scholarship and a Switzer fellowship), it's hard to fathom what she has accomplished in a short time.



Yes, it's all about chocolate and the production of

cacao in the rain forests of Ecuador. And, yes, it's about the farmers who gather the beans for cacao production, where a one-pound collection of beans earns a farmer 25c (barely enough to survive), while that same pound of beans becomes \$20 worth of chocolate bars. And there is the matter of deforestation in sensitive environments that may never be reversed.



But what's the solution? That's where Dr. Rogers' work and research began – and as a result the following actions/recommendations are underway, involving Ecuador and the world:

• Instead of rewarding conservation with 'carbon' credits, provide direct payments for communities that conserve -- the so-called 'land squatters' (30% of the forest residents, many who are 3rd generation inhabitants), remain and participate in conservation.

Trade conservation efforts for livelihood improvements (no forest - no money)

• Instead of farmer/gatherers who just sell the beans, construct drying/fermentation centers within the rain forest communities so they sell an enhanced product (pictures of the first one completed were shared at our meeting).

• Closely monitor the "Pilot" communities, learn from them, improve and expand the concept to other remote communities in Ecuador and hopefully, the whole equatorial belt around the globe, where the majority of the world's chocolate grows and most of the rain forests exist.

• Using this advanced conservation scheme, 'use' the rainforests as a way for local inhabitants to enjoy an increased income...and conserve the rainforests at the same time.

These solutions now appear to be pieces of a puzzle that is coming together. Stay tuned.



The meeting closed uneventfully, as long as one can erase the video image of **Paul Thielen** motoring in circles in his backyard.

Teachers from public and tax-exempt private schools within the boundaries of the West Sonoma County Union High School District are eligible to receive one-time grants in the amount of \$50 to \$500 to purchase classroom materials or to implement programs that might otherwise go unfunded.

January 23 - February 1 Terms and Conditions This year we will fly non-stop with Aeromexico for Festival flights. We will depart SFO on Friday, January 23 at 11:30 am and return from Guadalajara on Sunday, February 1 at 8:00 am. We will begin and conclude the Festival in Tlaquepaque.

THE ABC's of Rotary

#52: Council on Legislation

In the early days of Rotary, any change in the RI Bylaws or Constitution was proposed and voted upon at the annual convention. As attendance at conventions increased and open discussion became more difficult, a Council on Legislation was created in 1934 as an advisory group to debate and analyze proposals before they were voted on by the convention.

Finally, at the 1970 Atlanta convention, it was decided that the Council on Legislation would actually become the legislative or parliamentary body of Rotary. The council is composed of one delegate from each Rotary district as well as several ex officio members. It was agreed that the council would meet every three years at a site and time other than the RI Convention.

The council has the responsibility of considering and acting upon all "enactments," which are proposed changes in the Rotary International Bylaws and Constitution and the Standard Rotary Club Constitution, and "resolutions which are recommendations to the RI Board for policy, program, and procedural changes. Proposals may be submitted by any Rotary club, district, or the RI Board. The council's actions are subject to review by all the Rotary clubs of the world before they become final. If 10 percent of the voting strength of the clubs oppose a council action, such legislation is suspended and it is submitted to all the clubs for a final vote.

The Council on Legislation provides the membership of Rotary with a democratic process for legislative change in the operations of Rotary International.
