



### "The 25-Year Anniversary of the Fall of Communism"

<u>Jeff Gospe</u> was introduced by **Barbara Beedon**; **Barbara** has known Jeff since 2006, when he joined the Rotary Club of Santa Rosa. His story provided an inside-view of one of the most unusual, dramatic events in world history.



Jeff was a foreign exchange student in Krakow, Poland in 1989, arriving shortly after the summer 1988 'solidarity' movement in that country -- resulting in ongoing union strikes and general unrest (actually, peaceful resistance had been going on for several years). In April 1989 an agreement between the unions ("Solidarity") and the communist regime resulted in the scheduling of a June election --where 200 representatives from two houses would be elected.



The June 4 election was a stunning success for 'Solidarity'; 199 of the 200 seats were filled with Solidarity candidates (the only other seat was filled by an independent). A

few months later, the Berlin Wall came down --as part of the momentum created in Krakow. While the fall of Communism was a combination of many events over the years, approached the impact that the Solidarity movement accomplished.

Jeff joined in a number of Solidarity events, none more telling than the photo he shared of a picture taken by the 'other side' --showing him in the front row of a large crowd facing off against those in power at the time.

With that as a background, Jeff had stories to tell about the "ZOMO" (local thug groups opposed to Solidarity), the possibility of martial law, and peaceful strategies employed by the movement. What, Gary Cooper as a cowboy on one poster, next to a Lech Walesa poster?

Jeff had interesting stories to tell that were less intense: the joy of finding toilet paper on a store shelf, a shopping 'experience' that consisted of three stages: Go through a 'look line', then return to a 'pay line', and finally go to the 'pick up' line. And prices varied wildly: on the one hand, inflation could jump to 150% in two months --at the same time college students received 15 cents a day for rations.

Jeff's experiences have landed him positions with Ernst and Young as a consultant, working with multi-national corporations and governments in the former Soviet bloc. It also doesn't hurt to have a degree from **Stanford**.

Jeff had quite a display of artifacts from his time in the Soviet bloc, and several people stayed after to look at them and hear more details from Jeff.





# **The Closing Bell**



Feeling that the crowd might become energized in a 'Solidarity'-type overthrow movement, **President Ron** hastily adjourned the meeting at 1:30 (but did hold a board podium meeting right after....hmmmm).


# #53: Rotary Fellowships
