



Our Own Captain Polio





District Governor Nominee Bob Rogers has kept the club aware of many topics related to Rotary over the years, and on this day he had some dramatic information to share in regard to ending polio.

A few years ago (2012) there were polio cases in only Pakistan, Afghanistan, India and Nigeria. Shortly after, India was removed from that list. Today Nigeria is no longer on the list. Pakistan has dropped from 95 cases a few months ago to only 28 in the latest report. The world-wide endemic list has declined dramatically.

Locally, **Bob** had more statistics. Of the 10 districts (and many clubs) in Rotary 5130, Sebastopol has contributed \$45,000 of the 200,000 raised. [See more in the After the Bell section below -Ed.]



It took **Russ Cunningham** two days to celebrate his birthday, so he also received the two-for-one treatment (\$10).










Today's program went to the dogs --Search & Rescue dog teams, anyway. <u>Mike Stornetta</u>, a member of a long-time Sonoma County family, is currently a Windsor fire engineer --and the only certified urban search dog team member from Marin County to the Washington state border. His dog, Rocket, also has something to do with the recognition.





What makes for a good search & rescue dog? According to Mike, many are dogs that are 'un-adoptable'. That is, they make lousy pets and don't mind well. Such was the case with Rocket, a stray found in a Sacramento SPCA facility. The training can be fairly intense: Rocket took a liking to Mike, they matched up, and the canine was trained to believe every person is a 'toy' --something to be retrieved.

Such valuable animals are hard to identify --it takes about \$20,000 to train a S/R dog. Rocket was a case of a dog that needed to be rescued (from the pound) in order to

be a rescue dog. So, maybe there is a correlation with Rotary presidents? (naw).

President "Rin-Tin-Rick" thanked Mike and Rocket with a 'Pinot for Polio' bottle, \$100 towards the Search Dog Foundation, and a handful of dog biscuits.





The meeting was adjourned at 1:30, with an ice-cream social 'out back'.



Here is some additional information on PolioPlus giving from **Bob Rogers**:

First of all, there was an update on the figures.

District 5020 Total Giving - \$240,466 District 5130 Total Giving - \$223,866

So we did substantially better than reported at the meeting...\$30,000 better, because <u>DG Kevin</u> allocated \$30,000 from our District Designated Funds (DDF) to go to PolioPlus!!!

But the other important news in this is that District 5020 is more than twice the size of ours, numbers wise. For example:

District 5020 - Total Clubs 88 and total number of Rotarians 4,985 District 5130 - Total Clubs 47 and total number of Rotarians 2,425

So when you take the average donation per Rotarian in each district, we "blow them away" :-)

Their average giving to PolioPlus per Rotarian is \$48.23 Our average giving to PolioPlus per Rotarian is \$92.32

Don'tcha just love "Friendly Competition"???

One other thing that **John Blount** pointed out ...just for the record, is that Microsoft and Starbucks (aka Seattle) is not really in District 5020 as reported earlier, but just outside of it.

Today marks one year since Nigeria last reported a polio case caused by wild poliovirus. The country is on the brink of eradicating the paralyzing disease. If no cases are reported in the coming weeks, the World Health Organization is expected to remove Nigeria from the list of countries where polio is endemic, leaving just two: Afghanistan and Pakistan.
