Linda Sinkay, Sebastopol Sunrise member and Assistant District Governor, introduced speaker Bill Sauber.



Bill lived in California most of his life and, after serving in the Air Force and graduating from Cal. Poly, he worked 40 years in Farm and Construction Sales – mostly in California but more recently in North Carolina and Pennsylvania. He retired in Nov. 2014 and moved back to Sebastopol with his wife Maxine. He is a member of Sebastopol Sunrise Rotary, and <u>President Elect Nominee</u> for

2017/2018. He has been a runner for 44 years, running hundreds of road races, 18 full marathons, including New York City and Boston. He has competed in numerous triathlons including full Ironman events in

Louisville, KY and Kona, HI. He lived in Ashville, NC from 2003 to 2013 and in Carlisle, PA.

Bill and his son, Pete, hiked parts of the Appalachian Trail (AT) while living in PA. He also read Bill Bryson's book "*A Walk in the Woods*" and knew that this trip was not just a sojourn along a grassy path to Maine.

He and Pete started walking on February 21, 2015 at Mt. Springer, Georgia. They walked 7.6 miles uphill, to get to the start of the trail and then an additional .2 miles on the trail. (Snow!)



They had assembled backpacks with essential equipment weighing 45 lbs. that they would continuously replenish along the way. The hike would cover 2,189 miles to Mt. Katahdin, Maine, their final destination, located at an elevation of 5,287 ft. The trip would require a change in altitude of over 500,000 vertical feet, and would take them through parts of 14 states. The year before, they undertook their journey, about 2,500 hikers had started it and about dropped out by Harpers Ferry, PA – That is about halfway. About one in four hikers, or about 26%, completed the trip.

Bill and Pete were hit by a heavy snowstorm in GA. After slogging through, and at times having to sleep on snow, they had a 62-degree warm spell before leaving GA.

Bill calculated that they were burning over 5,000 calories per day, and during the duration of the trip Bill lost over 40 lbs. and Pete about 100 lbs.





Bill describes a delightful trip, slipping and falling on mossy rocks with cuts and strains, reaching viewpoints at Max Patch and Rocky Top with no view through the fog. They had to hang their packs to avoid the most dangerous creatures on the trail, ticks carrying Lyme disease while riding the backs of mice. They also had to hang their food to avoid bear, including 5 or 6 bears they saw in New Jersey. Bill showed a photo of an exceptionally large bear taken with his iPhone.

Some of their memorable highlights included Pizza at a Hostel, sleeping at a City Park in Unionville NY, viewing Luray Caverns in VA, and drinking Manhattans in Manhattan.

Bill injured his knee in PA and required medical care. He had to take three weeks off in the care of friends, while Pete continued on, as Bill did not know if he would be able to finish. He was able to rejoin Pete and after the grueling end in Maine, he had to return to finish the 67 miles that he had missed since he was committed to completing all of the 2,189 mile journey.

The entire trip took about 180 days. Bill finished the trek exhausted in the dark after a short trailside nap in Boiling Springs, PA. When he undertook this trip he felt doubly blessed to be able to avoid the ravages of Polio in his youth and to be able to complete the trip with his son and good health. So he had vowed and contributed \$1 per mile that he hiked on this trip to the Rotary Polio Plus Program.

After running late from many questions, **Bob Rogers** contributed about 4.5 cents per mile and encouraged others to join him.



President Rick gifted our speaker with a bottle of Pinot for Polio wine and the meeting was adjourned.

"An Overview of the Golden Gate Bridge, Highway & Transportation District"



Denis Mulligan, GM Golden Gate Bridge & Hwy June 03, 2016

"The Cordell Bank National Marine Sanctuary"

Dan Howard, Superintendent Cordell Bank National Marine Sanctuary June 10, 2016

Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute

Coastal California had an unknown mystery hidden beneath the waves for many years! It was not until the late 1800's that the Cordell Bank was discovered. It is an undersea granite and rocky reef about 4 1/2 miles by 9 1/2 miles, located 23 miles west of the Point Reyes Lighthouse. It sits on the edge of the continental shelf and rises abruptly from the soft sediments of the shelf to within 115 feet of the ocean surface.

This underwater adventure will be brought to us today by Dan Howard, Superintendent of the Cordell Bank National Marine Sanctuary. He manages all site activities and staff, policy development and all interaction with local, state and federal agencies. His focus of study since 1980 has been on kelpbed ecology, predator/prey relationships and juvenile rockfish recruitment.
