Rick started by calling his talk a "Retrospective Perspective" on his life. He was born in Texas, and had a great map to show us why that was a "big thing". His father Dick was a fighter pilot, and his

Our speaker, 5th District County Supervisor, Efren Carrillo, is known by – and knows -- many of our club members, who all greeted him warmly. He was introduced by Jim Passage, who gave an overview of highlights from his life and career:

- Serving his 2nd Term
- Active in Climate and Water Protection issues
- Lobbied for funding for Fisheries Restoration Projects on County and State levels
- Works closely with Climate Protection Campaign and SoCo Water Agency to bring Sonoma Clean Power
- Raised in Roseland, in SoCo first Habitat for Humanity home
- Advocate for underserved communities, innovation in education & health opportunities for those most in need



■ The Board of Supervisors and Sonoma County Office of Education (SCOE) launched Career Technical Education with funding from the Community Foundation



When Efren stepped to the podium, he looked at Rick, and said "let's talk" about a public transportation system, and then he turned to Frank Mayhew and said, "Next time you go to Oakland, talk to me first!"

Efren's talk would focus on what most agree are the top 4 issues in Sonoma County – Roads, Drought Relief, Fire Services Review, and State Water Board Regulations.

Priority #1 County Roads

As you may have read in the news recently, on November 10 the Board approved a new "one time" funding increase of \$13.5 million for roads – bringing the general fund contribution for 2015-16 to a record high of \$25 million. They also approved an ongoing source of funding by indexing 2% of the General Fund, for an annual commitment of \$8-9 million.

Funds for the one time allocation came from drawing down fund balances, such as delinquent property taxes (\$9.3M, from Teeter), aggregate mining road fees, waste hauling impact fees, and set aside funds from special districts and cannabis farming impacts.

The record levels of spending from the general fund and other sources will result in the repair of +/- 300 miles of roads, out of the 1380-mile county road network. That equals approximately all of the roads in Petaluma. Sonoma County is number one of the 19 counties (out of 58 counties total) in the state that use general funds for road paving and repair. Our road network is larger than any other county – that is a legacy issue. Many of the roads that have been identified as the "worst" in the county are on the list for improvement next summer.

Priority #2 Drought

This should really be our #1 issue. Santa Rosa rainfall is 39% short of average. Lakes and reservoirs are at record lows – Lake Sonoma is at 68% of the water supply pool, Lake Pillsbury is at 37%, and Lake Mendocino is at 42% of average.

El Nino is coming, and might deliver above average rainfall to our region. However, until we KNOW that to be for certain, please keep using water saving practices through the winter.

We need three things to alleviate the drought:

- 1. Above average rainfall in winter and spring months which means 32 inches in Santa Rosa
- 2. Timing is critical we need a steady stream of rainfall, not an inundation, aka Pineapple Express or Atmospheric River. The areas stricken by fires are all potential areas for mudslides and flooding. Also, the Army Corps operates the Warm Springs dam under requirements that in a large storm, a portion of the lake water must be released to allow for flood control.
- 3. Storing water that we do receive is also crucial. Rather than letting water flow off already saturated ground, we need to save water and restore the levels in our water table.

There is also a Drought Relief Program to help Russian River area residents to replace older toilets with more efficient models, (including installation), and turf removal replacement with drought tolerant plants. See sonomacountywater.org/drought for more information.

Priority #3 Fire Services

In 2014, then Supervisor Mike McGuire and Efren convened a volunteer committee with volunteers from all 40+ fire service providers around the County. This includes Independent Districts, City Fire Depts., Volunteer Fire Companies, CAL FIRE, and other agencies that provide their own fire services – places like the Two Rock Coast Guard Base. There are also community volunteers on the committee, many with a background in firefighting.

Their goal was to create a more efficient, effective and sustainable fire system in the entire County.

The committee of 80 representatives has been working well. The 2015-16 Budget set aside \$990 Thousand from Prop 172 funding to go to Fire Services. Proposition 172 funds were previously committed to only the Sheriff's Dept. and District Attorney. Current year Proposition 172 funding to those two departments is \$40 Million.

The plan is to gradually raise the amount committed to fire services to 8% of total Proposition 172 funding. (This year that would be \$3.2 Million.)

The committee met through the end of October, and there will be a Board of Supervisors presentation on Fire Services in December or January to explain the committee's recommendations.

Priority #4 "Poop" in our Water

Otherwise known as TMDL (Total Max Daily Load) - State Water Board Regulations. Coming soon....

The County, and particularly the Russian River area, are committed to protecting and improving the quality of our water. Pathogens in the water come from a number of sources, typically wastewater, untreated sewage, runoff from agricultural land or recycling projects, septic systems and recreational water uses.

In response to a report on water quality in the Russian River, the North Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board released a draft report with an action plan to reduce pathogens in the River. The County and the Water Board are dedicated to working together to ensure that any actions are communicated to residents, and that they support and will be properly supported in any planned actions.

At the North Coast Regional Board meeting on November 19, members stated the rules would take time to implement, and homeowners will be given time (and hopefully resources) to comply with any new rules.

Priorities # 5 and #6

Efren gave a quick update on the Roseland Redevelopment efforts. City and County are dedicated to working together to annex Roseland and 50 other unincorporated "islands" within City boundaries. The City and County have been meeting on the annexation, and immediate improvements that can be made to the old grocery store location on Sebastopol Road near Dutton. The 6-acre property was purchased by the County, and is now owned by the Public under the Housing Authority. Plans are to turn that property into a Public Plaza, some housing, some communal areas, plus community uses, like the Boys and Girls Club, and a Public Library. More to come...

The Kashia /Richardson Estero property brings back coastal land to the Kashia tribe, to hold under conservation and preservation rules, and to create a continuation of the California Coastal Trail (Mexico to Canada). The intent is to prevent it from development, and for the public to gain access to it under conservation rules.

Questions From the Audience



There were questions/comments about our Roads – conditions are terrible; Frei Road has been called "The Road to Kandahar" by folks who have been to Kandahar etc. etc. Our Challenge is that the roads were not engineered for today's usage levels, or size of vehicles. They were designed as the road home for farmers and ranchers to get to and from the market.

Efren reminded us that we have the most country roads of any county in the state....and assured us that 39% of next year's road repairs will be in West County.

Sonoma Compost, and resulting water issues.... they are still working on relocation of this valuable service. Most people want the composting service, but "not in my backyard". Stay tuned!

All in all, a very interesting and informative talk.... thanks, Efren!



President Rick reminded us that <u>next week the club will be dark for Thanksgiving</u>.

He then rang The Bell – Meeting Adjourned
