Before the Bell





Irony and humor were in short supply at this routine Friday meeting. Hardly a chuckle could be heard in the hall.

Business Tag Team - Paul Thielen_




The agenda was now in full swing. Dr. Paul Thielen entertained the club with fables related to his youth and former lives.
