
Wow, what a very good time was had by all. Your Humble Scribe searches for more superlative adjectives!

Tommy Lee is a trial attorney and a Rotarian in Novato who has a rich family history of strong military connections. He was an Army medic in the Vietnam era, his father was in the Air Force during World War II, Korea and Vietnam and his son is a former marine who served as a pistol, rifle, water safety survival and combat instructor during both the Iraq and Afghanistan conflicts. His son now works for the USO in Arlington Virginia.

Tommy first became interested in Arlington when he discovered that he was related to the Lee's of Virginia and to Robert E. Lee, a former owner of Arlington. But Tommy's side of the family disagreed with those in the family who thought a civil war was the only way to resolve their differences, so they moved west. Both of Tommy's parents are buried in Arlington Cemetery.
