Dave Madsen introduced our host and guest speaker John Balletto

Today he is the proud owner of one of the best wineries in the country. (And if you don't believe that, you didn't have enough of the free samples before lunch.) John was a member of the Sebastopol Rotary for many years and is presently a member of the Sebastopol Sunrise Club.

John started growing vegetables on a small plot under his father's instruction. He was destined to San Jose State on a full ride track scholarship when fate intervened and his father became ill. He had to forego his college and take over the business.

John credits his mother with his never give up attitude and strength of character. He started out earning 75 cents an hour and was soon up to \$1.50! With the help of several locals, he was able to buy land on Guerneville Road, navigate the restrictions and procedures and become a hugely successful produce grower. He supplied San Francisco with tons of fresh produce and employed hundreds of workers.





The farming life proved challenging as NAFTA and Organized Labor threw obstacles in the path. John was forced to switch to grape growing planting several acres on Burnside Road and other spots. Today John makes wine out of about 30% of his grapes and sells the rest.

After John Balletto spoke, Nick Frey took the microphone and spoke a little bit about the challenges of being a grower of wine grapes. In 2001 environmentalists and growers met to hammer out a regulatory framework to protect the land. Since then, the restrictions just keep on coming. Constant revisions and new setbacks have made it more and more difficult for the growers to succeed. They are often forced to leave land fallow that could

work well for them. Nick urged everyone to be cognizant of the growers' challenges and recognize to value of agriculture to West County and the world.



Scott Briggs came forward to share the thought(s) for the day with a nod to the Olympics Scott quoted Michelle Kwan: *"I didn't lose the gold – I won the silver."* and with a nod to his father who liked to quote Abraham Lincoln: *"Give me six hours to chop down a tree and I will spend the first four hours sharpening the ax."*



Many Rotarians and guests joined Nick Frey for a tour in the vineyards, the production facility and the barrel room to learn more about the many facets of the wine making process.

COMMUNITY SERVICES AREA – Director Rick Williams:



Lobster Boil (Chairs: Aleia Coate, Jackie Moreira) – Since this event is our club's major money maker, Aleia is a little nervous, but all is on track. Ticket sales start this Friday (~7/29) and are expected to sell out fast.

The next major event is the <u>Crab Feed</u> (**Chair: Nao Noguchi**) – After last year's cancellation, due to crab shortage, **Nao** will conduct a committee meeting shortly after the Lobster Boil.

Rick Williams has announced new <u>Community Service Projects</u> – a chance to have fun and get your hands dirty – **Rick** has contacted several members who expressed interest in the committee, but has not been able to get a commitment from anyone yet. **Rick** has attempted to get in touch with **Bob and Julie Cugini** to get a status on the Peace Garden – but has not heard back.

Six other Community Services committees didn't report this time – Either their programs have not begun or they are waiting for committee member listings so they know who they are working with. Those committees are: <u>Community</u> <u>Grants</u> (**Chair: Linda Johnson**), <u>Teacher Mini Grants</u> (**Chair: Michael Hixson**), <u>Dictionary</u> (No Chair yet), <u>Food Drive</u> (No Chair yet), <u>Learn to Swim</u> (**Chairs: Greg Jacobs, Rick Wilson**), and <u>Read to Me</u> (No Chair yet).

VOCATIONAL / YOUTH SERVICE AREA – Director Jackie Moreira:

The <u>Interact</u> program has begun (**Chair: Dan Rasmus**) and school commitments made – Analy (**Dan Rasmus, Donna Pantzer**), Brook Haven (**Pauline Pellini, Mike Carey**), Orchard View (**Lisa Jacobs**), and Twin Hills Charter (**Dan Rasmus, Monica Kretschmer**) – If you want to help out, contact them for time and place.

<u>Youth Exchange</u> (**Chair: Katy Spyrka**) - Current inbound exchange student <u>Bruna</u> is going home July 25. Current outbound Katie returned July 6. Next year's inbound Malene from Denmark will arrive in August and outbound Lindsey will leave for Italy in August. The following year's outbound will be chosen in September. We have the first host family for Malene but will need more.



Overcoming Obstacles Award (Co-Chairs: Tom Boag, Donna Pantzer, Barbara

Bickford) – The Overcoming Obstacles Award (OOA) event occurs in spring but preparations begin just after school starts up. This year we are developing a publicity program for the HS counseling and teaching staff – to reach more students that would benefit from this program. The first OOA committee meeting occurs in September and program announcements go out to the HS about then. Students apply by October and a December committee meeting chooses the participating students. OOA is one of our club's most popular programs, attracting a large attendance and a large committee, plus sponsors and mentors from the club, and special morning event speakers. We




are happy to report that some previous years' committee members, **Diana Rich** and **Sally Ewald**, maybe more, have rejoined us.

<u>RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards)</u> (**Co-Chairs: Cindy Carter, Tom Boag**) is a very special opportunity for top students and leaders to participate in a week long "retreat" with really important training additions for their leadership "toolboxes". Our last June event included a welcoming BBQ at Westminster Woods for all the (50) participants – including the five Analy students our club sponsored. We will be taking steps to increase the visibility of the program over the next few months but then further activity will wait until spring.

<u>SRJC Scholarships</u> (**Chair, Founder: Henry Alker**) – This is a new major scholarship program for SRJC students, providing continuing major support after the first year Doyle Scholarships. **Henry Alker** will continue in the position of Chair and will be reporting shortly on our results from this year.

Three other regular programs in the <u>Vocational / Youth Service Area</u> are the <u>High School Speech Contest</u> (Chair: Larry Ford), <u>Trade Paths</u> (No chair yet), and <u>Financial Literacy</u> (Chair: Tim Moore) – Probably no further update on these programs until later.

WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE AREA (WCS) – Director Frank Mayhew:



A progress report has been received from the Tororo Educational Grant – final report in October. Adopt a Village Grant in Ecuador is approved and waiting from funding by clubs. A new grant in Uganda, "Keeping Girls in School", will be presented to committee. The grant for Kakira School includes water and sanitary health plus an education program for menstrual health and hygiene – including textbooks and teacher training, and building of 15 new buildings by the Anthill Foundation. A workweek is planned for August 29 to build a new demonstration classroom using earth-bag technology – No club members have signed up.

<u>Rotary Club of Sebastopol Scholarships</u> (**Chair: Tom Lambert**) - Our club has provided scholarships to students in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico since 1996 – a program called the *Programma de Becas*, administered by *Club Rotario de Puerto Vallarta Sur*. Our member's contributions provide annual scholarships for uniforms, shoes, books, and school supplies – In 2015-2016, our club provided a total of \$5,900 to the program through individual member contributions – at no budget cost to the club.)

An additional International Service program is Foundation (**Chair: Dan Rasmus**) – No report on this. The World Community Area will assist in promoting the RI Foundation Centennial.

CLUB SERVICE AREA – Director Jerry Warren:

Our club's <u>AV (Audio Visual) Committee</u> (**Chair: Ron Puccinelli**) provides sophisticated professional-level services to our club, district, and other events. They coordinate with the Program committee to provide whatever needed for our meetings. Currently they are ready for the Balletto Winery meeting (8/12). They are meeting with the Lobster Boil Committee to support them and are involved with the Governor-Elect training seminar in Santa Barbara.

<u>The AppleKnocker</u> is our club newsletter (Chair: **Tom Boag**). It's been around for over 50 years, over ten years in its present form. New Co-Editors (**Jim Raffini**, **Steve Kellner**, and **David Still**) have signed up and are being trained in the process of putting the AK together – by September they will share the work. A special software and file storage/exchange environment is in use to produce a Word-to-PDF version, distributed by ClubRunner email.



Roto-Wrangler and Technical Editor Harvey Henningsen has an almost full slate of volunteer **Scribes** and **Photogs** for 2016-2017. Thus **Harvey** is also Chair of the AppleKnocker Scribes and <u>Photographers Committee</u>.

A <u>Club History / Archive "Committee</u>" has been inactive for several years (since Chaired by the late Pete Hill) but, over the last year, we have captured (on disk) some 10 years of AppleKnocker archive – along with over 27,000 photos – all searchable by name, meeting date, event, or photographer name. We plan to scan old (paper) AppleKnocker copies (many over 50 years old and stored either in the trailer or members' attics) and include them as well in an online location (cloud with HD backup) – available via the club website. (WSCHS may assist us in archiving.)

Jeff Boal is Chair of the Membership Committee.

The <u>Program Committee</u> (**Chair: PP Russ Cunningham**) has arranged speakers for July, August, September, and October. They need suggestions for programs from **members like you**.

Our <u>Sergeant-at-Arms</u> committee (**Chair: Nao Noguchi**) meets every Friday at 11:15 or so to set up for our meeting. They request that the Program committee or others contact them in advance for special needs.

We have a new <u>P/R (Public Relations) Committee</u> (**Chair: Hal Kwalwasser**) -- The goal of the PR committee this year is to make clear to the larger West County community the extraordinary activities of our club, from supporting a wide variety of community and global causes, to the great and enjoyable fundraisers, and to the warm fellowship of our members. This will be done by reinvigorating our club website and expanding use of FaceBook and other social media. We're committed to making club's activities more transparent to members so they will participate. We work with all committee chairs and club leadership to obtain a steady stream of information. By next summer, we hope to have raised the profile of the club in the community, attract new members, and build greater coherence among current members.

The club <u>Sponsorship Committee</u> (recently Chaired by **David Schreibman**, now by **Cindy Carter**) first met in January 2016 to plan a year-round effort to contact companies to sponsor club programs and events. With our new tax exempt charitable foundation, we can approach companies, offering naming opportunities or renewal priority. Directed donations mean that both companies and individuals can now direct money to specific things. Current focus is the Lobster Boil. A database of the last five years of contributions means that a foundation for progress is in place – Some \$3,000 has been raised already.

The <u>Sunshine Committee</u> (**Chair: Mia Del Prete**) keeps in touch with **President David** / others alert about members in need of support (illness, birth, death, family celebrations).

Greeters (often Green-Badgers) (Chair: Linda Johnson) are present every meeting, welcoming Rotarians and guests.

The <u>Golf Tournament Committee</u> (<u>Long</u> Chaired by **Mike**, now maybe by **Tim Moore** with **Brad Benedetti**) needs their event to be planned six months in advance – too late for this fall.

The traditional Super Bowl Board (Co-Chairs: Torrey Olson and Aleia Coate (Munson) – needs a confirmation of Chairs.

Speaker August 19, 2016 – **Noreen Evans**, Candidate for District 5 Supervisor

Noreen Evans graduated from California State University Sacramento in 1978 with a degree in government, and then graduated from the University of the Pacific McGeorge School of Law in 1981 with a JD. In 1982, she studied international business at the University of Salzburg and worked in Ireland at a Dublin firm of solicitors. She then returned to the US and practiced law as a civil litigator.

In 1996, Noreen was elected to the Santa Rosa City Council, then in 2004 was elected to the 7th Assembly District in the California State Assembly and served until termed out in 2010. She was then elected to the State Senate where she chaired the Senate committee on Judiciary Committee, which included a seat on the Judicial Council. She also chaired the Senate Select Committees on Wine

and Food. In 2013, she returned to private practice in Santa Rosa and now, in 2016, has entered the race for Sonoma County Supervisor, 5th District.

Speaker August 26, 2016 – Lynda Hopkins, Candidate for District 5 Supervisor

Lynda Hopkins, an organic farmer, small business owner, mother, former community journalist with Sonoma West Publishers and graduate of Stanford University (Bachelor's Degree in Coastal Land Use & a Master's Degree in Land Use Policy) is ready to work with the residents of the Fifth District to improve our community.

As Executive Director of Sonoma County Farm Trails, Lynda worked with dozens of family farmers to help keep small-scale farming viable. As a community journalist with Sonoma West Publishers, she spent years researching, reporting and informing the community through local newspapers. As Board Secretary of Farm to

Pantry, she has helped manage an organization that moved over 100 tons of gleaned farm-fresh produce to those in need. As a member of the Leadership Circle of Community Alliance with Family Farmers (North Coast chapter), she advocated for sensible streamlined land use policy.

As the owner of Foggy River Farm in the Russian River Valley, Lynda has worked with her husband to grow their small business to supply fresh, locally grown organic produce to farmers markets throughout Sonoma County, including the Sebastopol Farmers' Market and West End Farmers' Market. The farm's mission is to "grow food that is good for our souls, our bodies, and the land."



Speaker September 2, 2016 – Abigail Bridgman – The Protection of Children in Conflict Areas

I was born and raised in Uganda where I earned my law degree at Makerere University before moving to the United States almost 7 years ago. I went to Empire College for a year to acquire the necessary credit units to enable me take the California Bar. I also earned my LL.M in International Crime and Justice from The University of Turin, Italy. I worked at the Sonoma County District Attorney's office before moving on to work at the United Nations International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda. I currently consult for the Defense Team of Dominic Ongwen, a Ugandan accused of war crimes at the International Criminal Court in The Hague and also work part time for the Oxford University Press. I have also just concluded a pre-college summer class at UC Berkeley teaching high school students international law.







My passion is the intersection of human rights and the criminal justice system and international law. I will be discussing the protection of children in armed conflict, drawing heavily on my current assignment, which involves a former child-soldier.

Speaker September 16,2016 -- HAL KWALWASSER —

What our Kids Need to Succeed. . Changing Priorities for our Schools

Hal's talk will cover the challenges to having high school graduates college or career ready, and how those changing needs might lead organizations like ours, that strongly support our schools, to rethink the priorities for our work.



Hal is the former General Counsel of the Los Angeles Unified School District, the second largest in the country with approximately 700,000 students. Since leaving the district, Hal has continued to write and consult about education, including publishing a well-received study of high performing districts: "Renewal, Remaking America's Schools for the 21st Century." He is speaking to us this week on the topic of "New challenges for our schools and changing priorities for the Rotary."

Previously, **Hal** had a varied career. He was Deputy General Counsel/Legal Counsel at the Department of Defense and a partner in the Los Angeles law firm of Tuttle & Taylor. Between those two, he spent several years as a political consultant, including a stint as Chief of Staff to State Senator John Garamendi. He also headed a startup software firm (who around here hasn't?) that specialized in building data base platforms for government agencies.

Hal graduated from Swarthmore College and Yale Law School, where he was an editor of the Law Journal. He also clerked for Judge Max Rosenn of the US Third Circuit Court of Appeals in Philadelphia.

As many of you know, **Hal** has continued to work on interesting education projects, including the development of education summit for school supporters here in Sonoma County and a nationwide effort to eliminate standardized testing for accountability purposes.

Hal lives in Forestville with his wife, Estelle.
