



Michelle was in Costa Rica for a year, thanks to a Rotary program (that is no longer operating). She now teaches Spanish language at El Molino High School. She and her husband have a farm near Occidental.

In Costa Rica, she lived in San Pedro, a suburb of the capitol San Jose. Her first month in Costa Rica was spent in an intense language school. She had studied Spanish in school here, but

the intense course was important and necessary.

She then studied at the University of Costa Rica. She

After returning to California, Michelle found work as a bilingual aide in Shepard School in Roseland. [Les Crawford, Superintendent, helped her find this position. -Ed.]



She has now been at it for twenty years. She was clear to say that attending college, traveling to Costa Rica, finding full time employment, and getting the position at El Molino all were made possible by caring and helpful local people as well as by this Rotary Club.

Michelle uses music in her teaching. She teaches the culture too. She showed a picture of students preparing a meal as part of a class exercise.

Michelle now teaches all levels of high school Spanish, and does have native Spanish speakers in her classes too. El Molino has 700 students, and that number is increasing. Michelle has returned to Costa Rica with student groups several times since living there.



January 20, 2017: Domestic Violence Its Cause and Cure Speaker: Madeleine O'Connell



In 2012, Ms. O'Connell was named CEO of YWCA Sonoma County – the community's domestic violence service provider since 1975.

She was formerly Senior Vice President of Marketing for Sonoma National Bank in Santa Rosa where she managed community relations and non-profit support. Her career in the marketing and public relations arena of community banking spans nearly 30 years and two coasts. For over a decade, she served as a member of the Advisory Board and Chair of PR/Media for the capital campaign of The Salvation Army – Santa Rosa Corps where she was named "Volunteer of the Year" in 2009. Honored by the Santa Rosa Chamber of Commerce with a leadership award in the field of Media, Communications and Public Relations that same year, Ms. O'Connell is also a graduate of Leadership Santa Rosa Class 17.

A graduate of the University of San Francisco, Ms. O'Connell holds a Bachelor's Degree in Organizational Behavior. She leads a staff of 35 and is responsible for the sustainability of a \$2 million budget. Madeleine and her husband, Kevin reside in Santa Rosa along with their boys, Johnny age 7 and Nicholas age 5.

Challenged with a diagnosis of Stage Two breast cancer in 2014, Madeleine reminds each of us that there was a 20% chance of the lump she found being malignant, which it was – contrasted to the national and local statistic that one in four families will be affected by domestic violence – that's 25% of the people we all know.

January 27, 2017: Global Governance: People, Power and Non-violent Solutions

Speaker: Cynthia Boaz



Dr. Boaz is an Academic Advisor to the International Center on Nonviolent Conflict, a Washington DC- based human rights foundation that collects and disseminates knowledge on civil resistance. Her work with ICNC has sent her to conferences in India, Australia, Chile, Spain, and around the United States, including the annual Fletcher Summer Institute for Advanced Study of Nonviolent Conflict, at Tufts University, where she has served as an instructor on four occasions (2008, 2009, 2011, 2012). She considers her interview with Nobel Laureate Dr. Shirin Ebadi of Iran to be a highlight of her work in this field. Dr. Boaz continues to work alongside notable veterans of the struggles in South Africa, Serbia, Burma, and the US Civil Rights Movement, including Rev. James Lawson. Dr. Boaz is a prolific writer and contributes analyses regularly to several news and commentary-based media, including Truthout, Huffington Post, Common Dreams, Waging Nonviolence, and Open Democracy.

At Sonoma State, Dr. Boaz is the Faculty Advisor for the award-winning Model United Nations club and class, which every Spring participates in the National Model United Nations conference in New York City, and is department Internship Coordinator for placements with non-profits and local advocacy groups and organizations. Dr. Boaz is also an affiliated scholar with the UNESCO Program in Peace, Conflict and Development Studies at Universitat Jaume I in Castellon, Spain, where she has taught courses in 2001, 2003, 2007, 2011 and advises graduate students. She is founding board member of the Sonoma Independent, a grassroots media organization. She spent her Fall 2015 sabbatical in West Cork, Ireland.

February 17, 2017: Leadership for a Thinking Environment Speaker: Sara B. Hart

Dr. Hart earned her Ph.D. from Northwestern University and then taught at Queens College in New York City before joining Pfizer Inc. During her 20 years at Pfizer, she was responsible for a wide range of HR activities, including building and managing the learning and development function for the research division in the US, helping to develop strategy for process redesign, and launching the change with the organization. She also was the Head of HR at Pfizer's research center in the UK. Subsequently, Sara served as the Executive Director of the Anita Borg Institute for Women and Technology, Palo Alto, CA.

Sara is the founder and President of Hartcom, a consulting company, which specializes in building effective groups, developing supervisory and leadership excellence, enhancing presentation skills, and maximizing employee effectiveness. In some of her work, Sara focuses on the importance of

developing a Thinking Environment[™] in which each of us can do our most creative and brilliant thinking. Sara also is actively engaged in her Sign of Enough[™] campaign, which asks all of us to consider the question "How will I know when I have enough?"

Dr. Hart is a certified coach from the Hudson Institute of Santa Barbara, HeartMath Inc., and from the world renowned Time to Think, Inc. She is an experienced consultant to organizations and professional speaker.

COMMUNITY SERVICES AREA – DIRECTOR RICK WILLIAMS:



CRAB FEED (Chair: **Nao Noguchi**) – The second meeting was conducted Dec 14th. Holy Ghost Hall is reserved. Tickets available at Exchange Bank in addition to online using PayPal for payment processing. Road signs are out. No advertising in the Sonoma West Times but notices will be posted in calendars of events. **Jack Blasco** will be recruiting volunteers, but we were sorely short-handed in 2015. We all need to encourage volunteerism for cleaning tables, floors, etc. between seating and at the end. Crab strike ended Jan 6th, so the 1,750 lbs. of crab should be available. Raffle items are needed, but the Raffle Committee is on task. Supplies (crab hats, etc.) are being inventoried to determine replenishment requirements. Need wine donations. The committee is doing a great job of planning and coordinating this event. Next (and last) meeting [was held -Ed.] Jan 11th.

COMMUNITY GRANTS COMMITTEE (Chair: Linda Johnson) – Web page up. Applications are coming in. Final deadline is Feb 28th.

DICTIONARY COMMITTEE (Chair: Paul Yeomans) - Nothing new since the last board meeting. Paul has been on top of this to date.

FOOD DRIVE COMMITTEE (Chair: none) – Some ideas have emerged to replace the "Food Drive" committee with a volunteer oriented program that provides help and support for the several food programs in Sonoma County (volunteer programs or direct support).

LEARN TO SWIM COMMITTEE (Chairs: **Greg Jacobs**, **Rick Wilson**) – **Rick Wilson** and **Greg Jacobs** met three weeks ago to start the process of setting Learn to Swim for 2017. The dates are April 24 to May 18 at Ives Pool. In the past week, **Greg** has begun contacting schools, their administrative assistant who does the paperwork for the lessons, the tee shirt guy (volunteer shirts and kids shirts), and their bag guy (he prints the Rotary swim bags). The pool is reserved. **Greg** is planning a meeting of club members who are interested in helping for this coming Friday. The most important objectives are to get the schools thinking about the dates, getting parental help; get the necessary gear (tee shirts, bags), and to get publicity out.

LEARN WITH ME COMMITTEE (Chairs: Mike Carey, Linda Irving, Patti Blount) – Waiting for a report from the Chairs.

TEACHER MINI GRANTS COMMITTEE (Chair: **Keller McDonald**) – All the checks have been mailed. **Keller** has contacted all the recipients to make sure they received their check. **Keller** has reached out to all the applicants that did not receive a grant to encourage them to re-apply for the April round of grants.

COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS COMMITTEE (Chair: Steve Beck) – The projects that are currently underway are as follows:

• Project A: Peace Garden at Public Works (corner of Morris and Johnson streets) – Still waiting for their reply. They have all the necessary info.

No other projects on the list. **Steve** is soliciting ideas. One idea that has emerged is to create a project/program that provides support to our Veterans.

VOLUNTEER REQUEST COMMITTEE (Proposed new committee, requested by Katy Spyrka) – No update.

PEACE AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION: (Chairs: **Henry Alker**, **Steve Zivolich**) – New developments include **Henry's** participation in a phone conference of peace committee members with District Governor Wulff Reinhold. It turns out that the district will be holding events in connection with a monument that they have constructed. **Henry** is getting information on these events to see if they stimulate similar events that our club might hold in connection with the monument that was recently completed in downtown Sebastopol.

Henry also learned about a peace oriented agenda meeting to be conducted at the Atlanta convention immediately preceding the regular meeting. Henry is requesting permission to contact either our general membership or any subset of



members who are planning on attending the Atlanta convention to inform them about that particular peace meeting and encourage their attendance.

Henry would like to begin compiling a list of good speakers on peace topics for use by other clubs (and ourselves) in the district. The District Governor mentioned that this was an ongoing project at the district level and could specify speakers with particular relevance on the topic of "Peace". A second topic is to encourage exchanges with Rotary clubs of Muslim countries. The committee likes this idea. **Henry** plans to appoint a subcommittee at their next meeting to move ahead with this idea.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS & PREVENTION COMMITTEE (Chair: **Peggy Rogers**) – The committee will be holding a meeting Jan 11th. Some of the topics to be discussed at this meeting are as follows:

Goals of committee:

1. Raise awareness of pervasiveness in Sonoma County/indeed the world.

2. Know local resources for victims

3. Learn safe ways to help in prevention.

Reports from:

<u>Bill Sauber</u>: Business card sized information card with information in English and Spanish (\$100 budget from noon club) \$ from am club?

Greg Jacobs: Relationship between family law court and DV court and legal information we need to know.

Cory Maguire: Developing a 20 minute talk (with committee members input) geared towards Rotary Clubs in our area to increase awareness and possibly work together to provide a large scale forum, county wide?

<u>Helaine Campbell</u>: Medical professionals responsibilities re DV, also further discussion re a project table at District Training Assembly and/or District Conference.

Peg Rogers: update on flyer to be developed in conjunction with YWCA (In discussing this with Madeleine O'Connell, she will produce the flyer with her team of experts in design (at a cost of \$2,500), Fund raiser? Other clubs?

YWCA Madeleine O'Connell speaking at our club on January 20. Outreach to the club to bring as many people as possible to promote this speaker.

The committee will also be looking into additional forums, videos, and tours. Another idea is to have the YWCA produce a poster to this end and we may help fund it, and then solicit all the Rotary clubs in Sonoma County to contribute funds to help publish it, and provide volunteers to distribute the poster, especially in beauty salons, nail salons, public places of all kinds.
