
Aleia Coate was recognized for Chairing the Lobster Boil,

### THE PROGRAM -- STEVE ZIVOLICH - INTEGRATED RESOURCES INSTITUTE



**Tom Lambert** stepped to the Podium to introduce today's speaker, **Steve Zivolich** – one of our newer members. "When **Steve** was a special education teacher in Southern California, he saw that people with developmental disabilities received financial assistance from the government agencies and charities – but they had very a difficult time getting jobs. Because of this, **Steve** founded the nonprofit <u>Integrated Resources Institute</u> to improve employment outcomes for people with significant disabilities.

Fast forward to April of this year when the Regional Center of Orange County awarded Steve and the Integrated Resources Institute the <u>2016 Lifetime</u> <u>Achievement Spotlight Award</u> for facilitating an incredible <u>20,000 job placements</u> for people with significant disabilities. Today **Steve** will tell us what makes his Institute so successful."



Steve started by reviewing the history of how we as a country have treated the people with some form of mental disability. These would be people with mental retardation, autism, cerebral palsy and other neurological conditions that greatly affect a person's ability to function in society. Only one percent (1%) of this population finishes high school with a diploma, they have no academic skills, cannot drive a car, they experience poverty and segregation, and only 6% have jobs. One way our society has tried to control this problem is through negative eugenics. **Steve** defined negative eugenics as marriage restriction, segregation, sterilization, and in some cases, even euthanasia. In 1927 there was a U.S. Supreme Court decision legitimizing forced sterilization and the decision still stands. Steve mentioned that to care for a retarded person the cost the state or agency totals \$1,000,000 per person up to the age of 23, and then another \$1,000,000 for the rest of their life. Steve's service, Integrated Resources Institute offers an alternative approach to solve these problems. Integrated Services Institute or ISI is a non-profit organization dedicated to the full inclusion of people with disabilities into the community. Through its Metroworks Program, it has placed over 200,000 handicapped individuals in meaningful jobs in the United States and Australia. IRI also provides supported living, educational, consultation and professional development services. IRI feels that people with disabilities should live, work and play in integrated community settings. Home, work, and play settings should be based upon individual preference.



### <u>Speaker July 22, 2016 – Brook Edwards – Jenner</u> Highlands Preserve Manager

Brook is manager of the newly opened Jenner Headlands Preserve and will explain how this valuable property, overlooking the Russian River and the Pacific Ocean, came to be a part of the "Wildlands Conservancy" and what it offers to those who enjoy the outdoors. He will show what visitors can expect from a visit to this property and explain what the "Wildlands Conservancy" is providing to residents of Sonoma County and California.

Brook was born and raised in Santa Rosa. His love of the outdoors was instilled in him at an early age by his father who would take him and his

family out camping in the High Sierras every summer. Brook received his Bachelor's Degree in environmental Studies from San Jose State University and afterwards worked as a field botanist in both the private and public sector, working in the Sierra Nevada Mountains, Great Basin, Upper Sacramento River watershed, Point Reyes National Seashore, and the Sichuan Province of China. After receiving his Master's Degree from Humboldt State University in Natural Resources Planning, he worked as a GIS Specialist for the International Institute of Tropical forestry located in Puerto Rico. In 2008, Brook came home to Sonoma County to work for the Sonoma Land Trust as the Jenner Headlands Project Manager. He now works for The Wildlands Conservancy and manages both the Jenner Headlands and Estero Americano Coast Preserves.

### <u>Speaker July 29, 2016 – John Wotring – Executive Director, Primrose</u> <u>Santa Rosa</u>

John Wotring has been specializing in the care for the elderly for 20 years, the last 18 specifically for elderly with memory loss. Working for Primrose Special Alzheimer's Living and the Primrose Living Fund, John has gathered research and experience to educate the community about ageing successfully. #### <u>Speaker August 5, 2016 – Jay Jasperce – Chief Engineer, Dir.</u> <u>Groundwater Management, SCWA</u>



Jay Jasperse is the Chief Engineer and director of Groundwater Management for the Sonoma County water Agency. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in Geology from the University of California at Davis and a Master's degree in Civil engineering from the University of California at Berkeley. He is a Registered Profession Engineer in the State of California. Prior to joining the Water Agency, he worked as an environmental engineering consultant specializing in groundwater resource characterization and remediation. He is responsible for the Water Agency's capital projects program and resource planning and management activities. Mr. Jasperce has been a member of NATO and NSF delegations in Egypt and South Korea, respectively. He is an author of published journal articles and book chapters on topics such as surface water-groundwater interactions, natural filtration processes, riverbank filtration, and integrated water resource management.
