THE PROGRAM—JEFF BOAL THE ANTHILL FOUNDATION



Russ Cunningham introduced today's speaker - our own Jeff Boal.

Jeff's talk was about the Anthill Foundation, and the good work that it is doing in Africa. Jeff saluted Frank and Cathy Mayhew for creating this non-profit agency. Today Frank is in Uganda supervising the construction of a school building.

Jeff spoke about the creation of the Anthill Foundation, and the significance of the name. We learned that there are lots and lots of ants in an African anthill. The foundation started by the creation of a

hospital maternity ward in the Ugandan capital city of Entebbe.

One serious purpose of this project is to keep girls in school. Girls dropout very early for a variety of reasons but a lack of clean facilities and a lack of privacy is one common reason. The goal is to provide school facilities with clean flush toilets, with knowledge of feminine hygiene, they must overcome strong stigma about femininity in the East African culture. Also diarrhea is a problem, there are inadequate hand washing facilities.

At present Ugandans have to walk very long distances to get any medical attention at all. Student drop out is also due to a lack of text books. Low grades, a cause of student dropout, is partly due to a lack of books. The government standard there is 35 students per teacher. Also, classrooms have





dirt floors. The students sit and squat on the dirt floors. Chiggers cause discomfort and infection and disease. In Uganda, there are to be three children at a desk. If there are not enough desks, the girls have to sit on the floor. School desks are being provided by the Rotary Club of Cotati.

> The LRA, Lord's Resistance Army, is a serious issue in Uganda. Children are abducted from schools. Door and window frames are taken from the school buildings for use by the LRA. Thus, with wide open windows and doorways there is no security in many of the schools. And weather interferes with teaching and learning.

> Rotary usually works to rehab existing school buildings rather than to build new ones. The one new classroom building under construction, to be a prototype,

will have walls made of rice bags filled with dirt. And the roof will be translucent panels. Budgets for the Kakira School Project were reviewed. For three classrooms the total budget is \$ 169,459. There is very enormous leverage of Rotary funds. The Anthill Foundation will contribute \$60,000 while Rotary will contribute \$110,000.

Funds invested by Rotary Clubs are matched two for one by <u>Rotary International</u>. For this project 7 clubs will contribute a total of \$31,132. Can we keep girls in school: an emphatic <u>YES</u>!

This work must proceed one school at a time, and there are many local schools. In Uganda there are 12 district languages. The common language is English.

Kathy Mayhew came to the podium to join **Jeff**. She urged that Rotarians give generously to this effort. She handed Jeff a check for the Anthill Foundation.

President David thanked **Jeff** and **Kathy** for the presentation, and for the good work being done.





THOUGHT FOR THE DAY. **Henry Alker** offered this quote, a quote from Dan Koontz:

"No matter how close we are to another person, few human relationships are so free of strife, disagreement, and frustration as is the relationship that you have with a good dog. Few human beings give of themselves to another as a dog gives of itself. I also suspect that we cherish dogs because their unblemished souls make us wish – consciously or unconsciously – that we were as innocent as they are, and make us yearn for a place where innocence is universal, where the meanness, the betrayals and the cruelties of this world are unknown."

Speaker September 16,2016 -- Hal Kwalwasser --



What our Kids Need to Succeed. . Changing Priorities for our Schools

Hal's talk will cover the challenges to having high school graduates college or career ready, and how those changing needs might lead organizations like ours, that strongly support our schools, to rethink the priorities for our work.

Hal is the former General Counsel of the Los Angeles Unified School District, the second largest in the country with approximately 700,000 students. Since leaving the district, Hal has continued to write and consult about education, including publishing a well-received study of high performing districts: "Renewal, Remaking America's Schools for the 21st Century." He is speaking to us this week on the topic of "New challenges for our schools and changing priorities for the Rotary."

Previously, **Hal** had a varied career. He was Deputy General Counsel/Legal Counsel at the Department of Defense and a partner in the Los Angeles law firm of Tuttle & Taylor. Between those two, he spent several years as a political consultant, including a stint as Chief of Staff to State Senator John Garamendi. He also headed a startup software firm (who around here hasn't?) that specialized in building data base platforms for government agencies.

Hal graduated from Swarthmore College and Yale Law School, where he was an editor of the Law Journal. He also clerked for Judge Max Rosenn of the US Third

Circuit Court of Appeals in Philadelphia.

As many of you know, **Hal** has continued to work on interesting education projects, including the development of education summit for school supporters here in Sonoma County and a nationwide effort to eliminate standardized testing for accountability purposes.

Hal lives in Forestville with his wife, Estelle.
