






THE PROGRAM



Our guest speaker, Rob Giordano, is the newly appointed Sheriff of Sonoma County. Rob confessed that he did not want to be the Sheriff of Sonoma County. This job found him, rather him finding it. He spent most of his 21 years in the Sheriff's department in management positions, working as a public servant. In 2014, Sheriff Steve Freitas appointed Rob as Assistant Sheriff. When Sheriff Freitas retired earlier this year, he asked Rob Giordano to take over the Sheriff's position for the remainder of his term. Rob shared with the club that he will not be running for the Sheriff's positing in the 2018 election. He noted that it's awkward being a cop and being a politician. The race for Sheriff in 2018 will be tight. There are six people running for Sheriff. It will be the first time there will be a contested Sheriff's election in over 25 years.



Rob mentioned how the Sheriff's department has responded to public demands for increased transparency. He introduced the club to the Sheriff Department's Community Engagement Liaison, Misti Harris. Misti is in charge of social engagement, education, and the department's social media outlets. She encouraged everyone in the club to subscribe to the Sonoma County Sheriff's Facebook page. Even though the most effective way of reaching out to people is person to person, the realities of the county and population size make person to person contact less probable, which makes social media one of the most effective means of outreach.

Rob discussed the issues surrounding the recent debate around immigration. He cleared the air surrounding the recent discussions in the media about the county's position on cooperation with ICE agents. Sheriff's officers will not ask about one's immigration status. They do not want people to be afraid of contacting law enforcement if they need help. Sheriff's officers will back up ICE agents on raids, but not

engage in any raids. He further stated that if an inmate at the jail has matching finger prints in the ICE database, they will inform ICE. ICE agents have asked about 120 inmates, but have only picked up 24.

Greg Jacobs commended <u>Rob Giordano</u> for his professionalism and commitment. **Mike Ferguson** asked about recent developments surrounding the Civilian Oversight Board, and if <u>Rob</u> thought the board was political. The amount of complaints has been slim to none. <u>Rob</u> shared that out of almost 5,000 arrests, 83 complaints were received, and 0.24% of all arrests involved force. Regarding the political aspect, he said that the community should answer whether the million dollar budget is worth it (\$600,000 for audits, \$400,000 on community programs).

Robin Maybury asked what the county's level of engagement with Homeland Security is. Rob stated that the county is apart of some DHS task forces, but the level of engagement is low, since the threat of terrorism in Sonoma County is extremely low. Rob advised the club to say something if they see something. Les Crawford asked about community policing programs in Roseland. Rob stated that the community policing program is shrinking, as more and more of Roseland is annexed into Santa Rosa. Steve Kellner asked if Rob felt that there were enough sheriff's deputies to cover the west county. Rob felt that there are enough deputies to cover any issues in the West County, but not enough to cover everyone. Rob said that since the west county is quiet, and that vineyards usually cause no trouble, there is no need for increased enforcement.



After thanking Sonoma County Sheriff <u>Rob Girodano</u> for visiting the Roto-palace, **President Jack** ended another successful meeting. Everybody behaved, and nobody was arrested! With that, **Jack** rang the Roto-bell at 1:30 PM sharp!

Supervisor Lynda Hopkins is in her first term representing the geographically large and economically diverse Fifth District. Her District includes the entire Sonoma County coastline, the lower Russian River, many unincorporated rural villages, the city of Sebastopol, and the Southwestern portion of the city of Santa Rosa. Lynda's interest in public policy and land use began while attending Stanford University, where she studied environmental problem solving focused on coastal land use, mass transit, land use policy through the Earth Systems (BS, MS) Program. She also received a Bachelor of Arts degree in creative writing, which led to her work as a journalist focused on local government. After earning her Master's from Stanford, Lynda and her husband Emmett moved to his childhood home in Sonoma County. Lynda is a passionate advocate for environmental protection, coastal access for all Californians, social justice, and early childhood education. In addition to her

involvement in the agricultural community, she also serves on the Children's Museum of Sonoma County Board of Directors.
