

After **Jack** channeled his inner <u>Cal Worthington</u>, he handed the lectern to **Dan Rasmus**, who gave us a recap on the Rotary Foundation's Centennial year. Our club raised over \$71,000 this year. About 74% of the club members contributed over \$26.50. Our club had 45 separate Paul Harris Fellowship Recognitions, including 20 brand new Paul Harris Fellows, and two major donors. The Rotary Foundation raises, on average, \$200 million annually. For the centennial year, the Foundation set a goal of \$300 million. They raised \$299 million.




Some of the sights were breathtaking, like the large mechanical fire breathing dragon, the creative and amazing modes of transportation, and the burning ship.
Some, on the other hand, like the banana man, were well....interesting!
Despite the heat, and the surprise sand storms, fun was had...at least \$100 worth of fun!



Richard Power introduced the club to our guest speaker, John Lowry. John is a housing expert, and served as the Executive Director at Burbank Housing from 1998 to 2012. John explained, in detail, the challenges with the housing crisis in Sonoma County. For most low and moderate-income households in Sonoma County and California, half, or more, of their income goes to housing. Housing costs have become the biggest expense. The rate of home ownership is also decreasing. In Sonoma County, the median home price has become out of reach for many, as the cost of housing has risen faster than average incomes. The normal ratio between median housing prices and median income is three to one. The ratio in Sonoma County is eight to one. John explained how a culmination of factors led to the problems we are facing today. The first issue was the increased relationship with nature and the environment in the 1970's. This led to growth limits and increased environmental review and regulation. The second issue was the passage of Proposition 13, and loss of tax revenues.

which caused cities and counties to uses fees as a way to build revenue. The accumulation of fees (little here, little there), and the cost of materials, contributed to the problem.

However, <u>John</u> did share some signs of hope. The State Legislature is working on placing a housing bond on the 2018 ballot. The County of Sonoma is proposing a housing bond for the 2018 ballot as well. Some government agencies are starting to streamline development fees and regulations. People are starting to become more supportive of housing development. Groups like Burbank Housing are also helping to erase the housing problem, too.



The "area median income" (AMI) reflects annual incomes and is graduated for different household sizes. According to the federal government (HUD) Petaluma Santa Rosa Statistical Area (MSA) the 2016 median income for a four-person household is \$75,900, up from \$58,100 in 2000.

John shared how Burbank Housing has developed over 3,500 units between 1984 and 2012. He also shared some of the affordable housing projects recently completed across the county. He also talked about the Hollyhock subdivision in Sebastopol, which was developed by Burbank Housing. Homes were built by the participants, in which they worked off their down payments. In conclusion, John shared that the housing issue will be hard to solve. With hard work, and perseverance, the housing situation will get better. **Rick Wilson** asked John if tiny-homes are the answer to our housing crisis. John stated that tiny homes, just like regular homes, are subject to same development fees, regulations, and materials costs that average homes face. **Hal Kwalwasser** asked if density was the answer. John stated that density was an answer. Some cities offer density bonuses for some developments., where the developer receives permission to build more units than the property is zoned for. Many of Burbank Housing's developments received density bonuses. John also stated that cities with growth boundaries must look at developing taller structures.



President Jack rang the bell adjourning another great Rotary meeting at exactly 1:30pm.

# September 15, 2017: Interim Sheriff Rob Giordano - What's New in the Sonoma County Sheriff's Office

Interim Sheriff Rob Giordano started his law enforcement career with the Pittsburg Police Department in 1989. In 1996 he was employed as a Deputy Sheriff with the Sonoma County Sheriff's Office working out of the Main Office, Roseland substation and Sonoma Valley substation. He worked 4 years as a domestic violence/sexual assault detective before being promoted to Sergeant in 2003. As a sergeant, Rob worked as a Main Office patrol supervisor, City of Sonoma supervisor, Domestic Violence/Sexual Assault Unit supervisor and Violent Crimes Unit supervisor. In 2006 Rob was promoted to Lieutenant and in that role managed the Investigations Bureau, Internal Affairs Bureau, and later the Personnel Bureau. He was promoted to Captain in 2012 and put in charge of



the Field Services Section. In 2014 Rob was promoted to Assistant Sheriff, where he oversees the large and diverse Law Enforcement Division.

TEACHER MINI GRANTS COMMITTEE (Chair: Keller McDonald) -

  District are eligible to receive one-time grants in the amount of \$50 to \$500 to purchase classroom materials or to

- Peace Garden: Julie Cugini & Ellen Harrington met with Sebastopol Art Center CEO Lu Frazier and established potential placement of Peace Garden. Next step is Art Center Board approval at their October 19 meeting. Julie, Ellen, and Jack will make presentation. Jack and Ellen plan to meet with a major donor for the Art Center on presenting the Peace Garden project for their site.
- Laguna Foundation: Volunteer Day happened Sept 9 and it went "great," **Ellen** reports. **Jack** has pictures and more details. Members from other clubs are interested in being invited to more of our projects.
- Redwood Empire Food Bank: Regularly scheduled for Thursdays.
- Sebastopol Village Park: Per meeting with **Steve Beck** and **Jim Pacatte**, condition of some RVs not worthy of repair; need replacement. Project needs further evaluation for our involvement. On hold for now.
- Roseland Mentoring: Pending Steve is still working with a student. Reps made club presentation.
- Sebastopol Senior Center: Steve Beck is setting up a meeting with Linda, the ED, and Ellen to discuss a project with possible funding.
- YWCA: Exterior maintenance. District 5130 grant was submitted and approved. Will be matched by our club. 50/50. Total project is \$5,000.
- West County Vets: Project not yet defined. Steve and Rick Williams working on it.
- Gold Ridge Farms:
  - Two-stall restroom. Sebastopol Rotary will provide construction volunteers. Costs covered by City of Sebastopol.
  - 36-person amphitheater. Currently low priority.
- Reading to Kids Program (grades 1-3): Brainchild of Tim Miller. Hal and Linda will make some local and state contacts.
- Beach/River Clean-Up: Ellen communicating with Chris Brokate, Clean River Alliance & RR Watershed on priorities. Expect multiple Rotary
  clubs to be involved. Waiting to hear from Chris to view creek clean-up site for project evaluation in Santa Rosa Creek at Willowside Bridge.
- Cool Kids Camp: Libby Harvey Fitzgerald Rotary co-chair/Shawna DeGrange-CKC generating a project wish list for consideration.
- Catholic Charities: Rural food distribution. Approved by committee. Ellen met with Noreen Mendoza at CC. A schedule for volunteering was
  established.



LEARN WITH ME COMMITTEE (Chairs: **Patti Blount, Mike Carey**, and **Linda Irving**) – **Linda Irving** asked Patti, Mike Carey, and Michele to meet with her and new vice principal, Sara Gramm. She wants to brainstorm ideas for getting more Rotarians involved. We all replied with dates we could meet, but the meeting hasn't yet been scheduled.

PEACE AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION: (Chairs: Henry Alker, Steve Zivolich) -

- The committee recommended that our board invite the City of Sebastopol to designate itself as a Peace City. (Some 140 cities around the world have done likewise.) **Jack** replied asking the committee to draft a letter to the City Council, inviting them to designate the City as a Peace City, which would be presented to the Board for approval. When/if approved, the letter would be signed by **Jack**, **Henry**, and **Steve**. **Henry** will be out of the country for a while, but will do it upon his return.
- The committee has decided not to use the training program done in Santa Rosa as a model for our program, since it's too big in scope. (They have more than five schools involved.)
- The committee is investigating creation of a Peace Digest Publication that would be done in conjunction with the Rotary Action group, taking highly technical research and translating it into ordinary English for use in libraries and schools.
- The committee is exploring development of a grant to aid curriculum development in leadership chasses so West County schools can be up-to-date on the topic of War and Peace. They're looking for a teacher to assist with this.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS COMMITTEE (Chair: **Cory Maguire**) – The committee wants to spend \$585 for an ad that will be placed in a ValPak mailer and to print posters. Since there was a donation of \$1K by a private individual, the committee believes its budget is \$2K in total. At our last board meeting, however, it was made clear to Michele that the committee's total budget is, in fact, \$996, so an expenditure of \$585 at this time will leave the committee with just \$400 and change. Under discussion now.

We discussed the three major committees and their subcommittees and the transition of leadership between the co-Chairs **Jeff** and **David**, with **David** assuming the lead moving forward.

Most of the conversation and excitement was around how to attract new, younger members. Jørgen Holst, Jeff Boal, Linda Johnson, and Ellen Harrington will join David Schreibman in the Attraction Committee. We are still committed to 5 more After Hours events this year with Meredeth Bertacco and Monica Kretschmer heading up that effort. We will post our first meetup app event for the Rotary Work Day. Both Michele Kimble and Michael Hixson have offered their expertise when we are ready to try Facebook ads. We will look at prospects in the last 2 years that started the process and did not finish, as well as RYE parents and hosts, and past speakers. We will look to promote Rotary on the back of the Learn to Swim signup forms.
