Larry Florin, Executive Director of Burbank Housing was unable to attend the meeting. A surprise substitute guest speaker, in place of Larry, was Efren Carrillo, Director of Government and Community Relations, Burbank Housing. Burbank Housing is a local nonprofit with sixty-three properties in the County. They have more properties in Napa. **Jorgen Holst** introduced Efren. Efren explained about the severe housing crunch in Sonoma County. He called it a crisis, an Armageddon. He went on to explain that income has not kept up with housing prices. A family of four making \$140,000 a year cannot afford to purchase a home. He also said that there are over 17,000 affordable rentals were needed in Sonoma County before the fire. The need is

even greater now. He also quoted some staggering statistics. The average two bedroom rental in Sonoma County was \$2600, pre fire. After the fire, it is now \$3600. Efren also said that 71% of the renters in the fire destroyed units were uninsured. Burbank Housing houses over 10,000 residents and has a list of more that 10,000 more that need housing. They are the largest housing management system in Sonoma County. With open space between cities making it impossible to build on it, Efren says the only way to provide adequate housing is by increasing housing density and constructing taller buildings. He also talked about local government involvement in housing and rent control pros and cons. Pertinent questions were asked by **Patrick Dirden**, **Hal Kwalwasser**, **Dick Zimmer** and **Frank Mayhew**. Efren said that Rotary has a unique voice to promote more housing.



With the whack of the hearty Roto-bell at 1:30PM, another Rotary meeting came to an end.

February 2, 2018: Ameena Jandali, Understanding Islam



Ameena Jandali is a founding member and Content Director of ING. She co-designs and develops ING's educational presentations and cultural competency seminars. Ameena has delivered hundreds of presentations in schools, colleges, universities, churches, and other venues on Islam and related subjects. She has also appeared on many news outlets speaking on issues relating to American Muslims. She currently team teaches classes on Islam as well as Women in the Middle East at City College of San Francisco. Ameena received her M.A. in Near Eastern Studies from the University of California, Berkeley, and B.A. in History from the University of Illinois

February 9, 2017: Dr. Judy Sakaki, Sonoma State University



Dr. Judy K. Sakaki became Sonoma State University's seventh president on July 1, 2016. She is the first Japanese-American woman in the nation to lead a four-year college or university.

Her career in higher education has been devoted to developing, leading and implementing best practices in access, affordability, inclusion and diversity, and student success. Prior to Sonoma State, Dr. Sakaki served as Vice President for Student Affairs for the University of California Office of the President; Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs at UC Davis; and Vice President for Student Affairs at Fresno State.

Dr. Sakaki is a double alumna of the CSU, having earned both a Bachelor's degree in human development and Master's degree in educational psychology from CSU East Bay. She holds a Ph.D. in education from UC Berkeley. She has been honored with Outstanding Alumni awards from both universities.
