Rotarians **Henry Alker**, **Steve Zivolich**, **Jim Passage** and the club's Peace and Conflict Resolution Committee won the City council of Sebastopol's unanimous support for a "Declaration of Sebastopol as City of Peace," acknowledging the international work of Rotary. Their action was a result of earlier meetings by **Henry Alker** and **Steve Zivolich** with councilwomen <u>Una Glass</u> and <u>Sarah Glade Gurney</u>. Both women spoke eloquently in support of the motion, and **President Jack** to the council with a strong and passionate message, stressing the long history of Rotary in promoting peace, and with reference to the peace garden, the peace wall, and several peace posts around Sebastopol. SEBASTOPOL DOCUMENTARY FILM FESTIVAL



Festival director <u>Desiree Andrews</u>, of the Sebastopol Center for the Arts gave a preview of the upcoming 11th annual Documentary Film Festival, to be held March 22-25. The festival will include 66 films from 24 countries. Andrews previously curated with the Sundance and Aspen film festivals, added proof of the prestige of Sebastopol's own local doc fest. THE PROGRAM

Tom Boag introduced the club's guest speaker <u>Tom Cochrane</u>, geologist and book author. <u>Cochrane</u> recently wrote and published a book, "*Shaping the Sonoma-Mendocino Coast*." Over his 30-minute program, which covered a vast range of topics from the Earth's inner core to trillions of miles to the nearest star to earth Proxima Centauri, <u>Cochrane</u> forgot to talk about the contents of his book. No matter. He fascinated club members with his scientific whiffs on "the whole of Earth being just like a test tube." He told the club that Earth spins at 11,000 miles per hour while orbiting through space around the Sun at 66,000 mph. "Man has changed every place on Earth," he pointed out. That's why there are no native grasses left on the Great Plains and the ice in Antarctica keeps getting thinner and thinner. Is the Earth flat? Was it created in seven days? How many more years does San Francisco

have left before the rising sea washes it away? <u>Mr. Cochrane</u> thinks we ought to care. "We measure things in parts-perbillion. We say the difference between 3 or 5 parts per billion can cause death or disease." Many club members were left with just one question: "what does any of this have to do with the coast of Sonoma –Mendocino? Read his book; it is recommended by your humble scribe, as I have read it and so has **Tom Boag**.

Here is the "Declaration of Sebastopol as City of Peace," in its entirety:

RESOLUTION NO. 6178

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEBASTOPOL DECLARING THE CITY OF SEBASTOPOL AN INTERNATIONAL CITY OF PEACE

Whereas, the World Health Organization defines health as not merely the absence of disease or infirmity, but an achievement of a balance of physical, mental, and social wellbeing, and

Whereas, peace is not merely the absence of war and violence, but a condition where society has achieved a balance of prosperity, security, justice and hope, and

• Whereas, peace is necessary for everyone to achieve health as defined by the World Health Organization, and

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Sebastopol and the community want to work together to create and implement initiatives that not only foster peace but to create a positive, lasting change in our community and around the world and become a model for other cities that tackle tough challenge; and

Whereas, this vision for the future should build on the expertise of each person and involve all segments of our City in planning actions and making a difference; and

Whereas, the City of Sebastopol and its community are committed to establishing peace in the region to promote understanding, economic opportunity and improve the quality of life of the people of our region, and

Whereas, the United Nations has designated 21 September of each year to be the International Day of Peace, devoted to commemorating and strengthening the ideals of peace both within and among all nations and peoples; and

Whereas, the City of Sebastopol, also known as PeaceTown USA has a long history of promoting peace.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that I, Mayor Patrick Slayter, and the City Council of the City of Sebastopol proclaim the City of Sebastopol, California, to be a City of Peace in perpetuity; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOVLED, that the City of Sebastopol City Council designates the 21st of September of each year to be the City of Sebastopol Day of Peace in perpetuity; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Sebastopol, community leaders and concerned citizens develop policies and procedures that promote establishing peace in our region in perpetuity.

March 23, 2018: Jorgen Holst, They Robots Are Taking Our Jobs, Or Are They?

Jorgen Holst was born and raised in Oslo, Norway, and has his career first in advertising, and later in business innovation. He is a facilitator, writer, business consultant and, soon to be, foresight councilor who spends a lot of his time helping businesses prepare for what's next. And what's next might just be robots and automation and whether they will take our jobs. He will share the latest thinking on the topic, his own views, and what the different scenarios could mean for workers, education, and our economy. **Jorgen** is a member of our club and an **AppleKnocker –Ed'itor**.



March 30, 2018: Steven Spanier, Solving the Problems of a Deeply Polarized American Society



Steve Spanier is retired from a career in high technology. During his career, he held various positions in the Silicon Valley including Director of Knowledge Products at networking giant Cisco Systems, where he was responsible for over 200 employees and a \$25 million budget. Since he retired, Steve has become interested in the root causes of and potential solutions to some of the big problems in our society. His research has led to various initiatives designed to educate the public about contentious issues such as money in politics, corporate power and responsibility, media consolidation and, more recently, societal polarization. His initiatives have included speaking to Osher Lifelong Learning Institutes (at the University of California at Irvine and Cal State Fullerton), radio show and the founding of the Orange County chapter of the а organizationReclaimDemocracy.org. His latest interest is to create a grassroots movement dedicated to bridging ideological divides through a dialogue process designed to create empathetic understanding and connection between individuals on different sides of the divides.

April 27, 2018: Cordelia Holst, Universal Basic Income – a Radical, Yet Increasingly Popular solution to Many of our biggest Problems

<u>Cordelia Holst</u> went to Apple Blossom, Twin Hills, and Analy High School in Sebastopol, and earned a BS degree in Business and Marketing from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. She lived and worked 13 years in Norway before she moved back with her family to Sebastopol in 2016. Cordelia's career has been in marketing, founding and running her own pie shops, and recently started as Executive Director of the Sebastopol Community Cultural Center. Seeing the vast inequalities in American society, put in stark perspective after over a decade in Norway, she became interested in the Universal Basic Income movement that is growing in both size and attention these days. She has attended conferences at the Basic Income Lab at Stanford University in the Ethics department, attended a weekend long create-a-thon and the CASH conference sponsored by the Economic Security Project. She has contributed to the movement by working as a freelance journalist for BIEN, the Basic Income Earth Network. Cordelia believes a UBI could be a solution for economic insecurities facing Americans today.
