THE PROGRAM

Governor Bob came forward to introduce today's speaker, Jennifer Strong. Jennifer is a member and twice past President of the Lakeport Rotary Club. She joined the Lakeport club in 1998, served her first term as president 2001-2002 and her second term was 2015-2016. On both occasions she filled the terms of individuals who could not meet the responsibilities of Presidency. She also did an outstanding job as Emcee of the 2018 5013 District Conference. It was during her 2015- 2016 term as president of the Lakeport Club that the Valley Fire broke out and it quickly became apparent that the destruction was going to be vast. Something needed to be done, and the Fire Relief fund was born two days later, and a call to action was sent to the clubs throughout the District. Jennifer is also the chair of one of Lakeport Rotary's major projects the Konocti Challenge a cycling event held every year it's a 100-kilometer ride held in October of every year and 2015 was no exception, thanks to Jennifer.



One of **Jennifer's** favorite sayings and the one that inspires her to meet her Rotary Objectives, the saying is by Mark Twain and goes: "The two most important days of your life are the day you were born and the day you find out why". The "why for **Jennifer** is to have the opportunity, and meet that challenge, to be a significant force in helping people in need.

Rotary provides her with the opportunity to meet that "Rotary Moment". It was in the summer of 2015 and it began with the July 29th "Rocky" Fire where 69,438 acres,43 homes and 53 outbuildings were devastated. On August 9th, the "Jerusalem Fire" broke out,

destroying 25,118 acres, 6 homes, and 21 outbuildings, and on September 2nd "Elk Fire" followed, destroying 673 acres, though no homes or out buildings were lost.

Then, the big one hit on September 12th. The "Valley Fire" burned 76,067 acres, destroying 1280 homes, 27 multi-family homes, 66 commercial properties, 585 outbuildings, an additional 93 structures damaged, 4 firefighters injured, and 4 dead, with 1 still missing and presumed dead. This was the 3rd most damaging fire in California history. At one point 1/3 of Lake County population was evacuated. It was evident that something had to be done, so on September 14th 2015, the Lakeport Rotary established the Valley Fire Relief Fund, hoping to raise \$50k. A call went out to all of District 5130. Lake Area Rotary Club Association created a committee of three Rotarians from each of the four Lake County Rotary Clubs, and over 100 Rotary Clubs from around the world responded, and over 1000 made donations. Funds started to roll in and total funds raised for the Valley, Rocky & Jerusalem fires was just over \$756k. The funds went to fund needed support programs such as a business grant program, reforestation, grief counseling, various school programs, after school programs, coats for kids, OEF notification program, animal care grants, home rebuilds, plus many, many more.

But luckily there were still some funds left to allocate. Just when they thought they were in the clear, almost one year later, the Clayton Fire broke out on August 13th, 2016. It ravaged through downtown Lower Lake, burning 3929 acres, destroying 209 homes, 8 businesses, and another 80+ structures. Many lives were impacted again. Again, LARCA assembled and raised \$190k.

All this made the LARCA prepared for the biggest of all the fires. October 8th 2017, 14 fires broke out in four North Bay counties; Napa, Sonoma, Lake and Mendocino. Panic ensued. Over 100,000 people were evacuated, nearly 200,000 acres were burned, over 8000 homes and businesses destroyed 44 people died. The Rotary Fire Relief fund jumped in, expanded to the District level and raised much needed additional funds, bringing the total raised to more than \$2.8million.

Jennifer's own Rotary moment, the moment when she realized her WHY, was when, at the Konocti Challenge bicycle race shortly after the fires in 2016, a little girl thanked her for the bike that Rotary gave her, since her own bike had gotten "stolen by the fire monster". She shared a picture of the moment and told us she still cannot look at it without tearing up. That is quite understandable!

Jennifer closed by quoting a phrase by Past President of Rotary International President Clem Renouf:

Rotary takes ordinary men and women and gives them extraordinary opportunities to do more with their lives than they ever dreamed possible.

PDG Bruce Campbell of Sebastopol Sunrise came forward to welcome our speaker **Jennifer Strong** into the Paul Harris Society. Rotarians become members of the Society when they donate \$1000 per year to the Rotary Foundation.






President Jack looking relaxed and well rested rang the final bell at 1:30pm.

FUTURE PROGRAMS

June 1, 2018: Charles Prickett - The Civil Rights Movement



One of the original "freedom fighters" in the American civil rights movement, Dr. Charles O. Prickett is an author, educator and speaker who brings the history and lessons of the period alive. Dr. Prickett participated in the 1963 March on Washington, the 1964 Mississippi Freedom Summer, and the 1965 Selma to Montgomery March. In his recently published book, "Remembering Mississippi Freedom Summer," he chronicles his time as an active participant in the civil rights movement. Among others, the book includes his experiences teaching at a "freedom school" and meeting with Dr. Martin Luther King while working on the Selma to Montgomery March.

As an acclaimed public speaker, Dr. Prickett has appeared before audiences ranging from civic organizations to colleges to high schools and elementary schools. In addition to showing a film about the period, he recounts his often-harrowing yet deeply meaningful experiences in the civil rights movement.

June 15, 2018: Gisela Zebroski – The Berlin Airlift

When WWII broke out in 1939 Gisela Zebroski's privileged childhood came to an abrupt end. The Soviet Union took over Latvia, the country of her birth. Her parents, destined for deportation, fled to Germany and settled in Poland.

The memories of WWII and its aftermath had compelled her to weave those stories into her two novels, "The Baroness" and "Mephisto Waltz." Years of preparation and studies had acquainted her with her own complex background as a refugee and immigrant.

The Berlin Airlift stands out as a turning point. The Allies had defied Stalin and kept him from taking West Berlin as well as West Germany saving her family from being deported to Siberia. She enjoys telling how President Truman and

General Clay saved Europe from the Soviets. Her own story is a work in progress under the title of SELFIE SIDEWAYS. Please join me in welcoming Gisela
