LOBSTER FEED: Our Lobster Fest raised a great \$80,000 which will be used to fund many of our ongoing projects and to support the Fire Relief Fund. Details to follow after the Board of Directors next meeting. They are probably busy counting the money right now.

District 5130 has started a Fire Relief Fund, similar to the one for Lake County last year. The fund will provide help to families and businesses affected by the fires in Lake, Mendocino, Napa and Sonoma counties, helping to get them resettled and filling in the gaps left by other support. The NO overhead fund will be administered by Rotarians from the four affected counties based on the model of the Lake County recovery. 
women murdered every day in domestic violence in the USA. She also noted that children from families where there is domestic violence are more likely to become bullies at school.

<u>Police Chief Jeff Weaver</u> is retiring in 5 days, so this will be his last time speaking to our club as Chief. His replacement will be <u>Captain James Conner</u>, a long time Sebastopol policeman.



<u>Keller McDonald</u> related that <u>Chief Weaver</u> meets all 12 criteria for the Boy Scout Law, which the scribe could not write down or remember (Ed. You know --courteous,, kind, obedient, etc). If the response from the audience is any indication, he will be missed.



While the main subject was the Family Justice Center. Jeff started out talking about the response to the fire. He received the first call at 2:30 AM from John Zanzi the former Fire Chief. Within hours our community stepped forward including: **Diana Rich**, who made the Community Center available for evacuees, but this wasn't nearly enough room, so the WCUHSD stepped up with **Steve Kellner**

offering Analy High school; Ceres stepped up to provide meals; **Bob Hirsch** housed some of the first responders; and **Ken Silveira** got his deli to make sandwiches to meet the immediate needs. (Rotarians step up). <u>Jeff</u> noted that in the next days or even months we will see First Responders suffering from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. The job of those First Responders carries a huge psychological burden, not for what the responders were able to do, but for what they weren't able to do. If you have a chance hug a police or fireman.



The main topic of the Family Justice Center was in response to the problems facing victims for domestic violence. Before 1998 most victims were told by responding law enforcement to "see a counselor ", or "work it out between yourselves, both of which were found to be ineffective in solving the problem. Now the first response is to arrest

the aggressor and to get the victim help.

The Family Justice Center, at 2755 Mendocino Avenue

is staffed by people trained to help the victim gather their thoughts and take action. Legal help is available as well as referrals' to shelters for women and children where they can feel safe. The FJC was opened in 2007. When a call of domestic violence comes in to the police, it can take an officer 3-5 hours to respond. No longer will they just brush off the accusations and walk away.



As a thank you for his service to the community, Jeff was given a Paul Harris Fellowship, he received two standing ovations.

COMMUNITY GRANTS COMMITTEE (Chair: Linda Johnson) – Nothing new to report.

LEARN TO SWIM COMMITTEE (Chairs: Greg Jacobs and Rick Wilson) – Nothing new to report.


MARK SELL ROTARY TEACHER GRANT COMMITTEE (Chair: **Keller McDonald**) – We have received 35 Mark Sell Rotary Teacher Grant applications so far, from a large number of public and private schools across West County. Earlier this week, **Keller** emailed the principals of the few schools from which we had not received apps to ask them to remind their teachers of the Oct 20 deadline. We assume the word got out properly to teachers at schools from which we have already received applications. The committee meets Wed Nov 1 to recommend approving applications to the club board for funding.

COMMUNITY VOLUNTEER PROJECTS COMMITTEE (Co-Chairs: Steve Beck and Ellen Harrington) – YWCA:

- Peace Garden: Julie Cugini & Ellen Harrington met with CEO Lu Frazier and established potential placement
 of the Peace Garden. Next step is Art Center Board approval at their October 19 meeting. Julie, Ellen, and Jack
 to make presentation.
- Redwood Empire Food Bank: Regularly scheduled for Thursdays.
- Sebastopol Senior Center: Steve Beck, Ellen, and Jim Pacatte met with ED Linda Civitello at the Senior Ctr. Lumber cost \$365. Jim pre-cut the lumber and will get back to us on date for painting and rail project Nov 4, 11, or 18, to be negotiated with Linda. <u>Sebastopol Paint Ctr</u>. will donate paint. Sebastopol Sunrise club has given \$500 to cover shipping costs for new flooring. <u>Mike Nyholm</u> of DSB Flooring is donating flooring materials and labor for this, plus the hallway and lobby.
- YWCA: district 5130 Grant is approved and will be matched by our club, 50/50. Total project is \$5,000. **Ellen** is coordinating project dates with **Jim Pacatte** and <u>Madeleine</u> at YWCA.
- Catholic Charities: approved by this committee. <u>Ellen</u> met with <u>Noreen Mendoza</u> at CC. A schedule for volunteering was established. We will star with either St. Sebastian or Graton day Labor Ctr. To see how it goes.

LEARN WITH ME COMMITTEE (Chairs: Patti Blount, Mike Carey, and Linda Irving) -

- Teachers: All 14 eligible teachers referred students. Four teachers are new to Park Side School and are being taught how LWM functions.
- Students: Park Side = 38 Students (K: 10; Grade 1: 9; Grade 2: 5; Grade 3: 7; Grade 4: 7) Brook Haven = Small groups made up of all 48 5th graders.
- Tutors: 23 tutors, 17 returning, six are new, 31 tutoring hours/week.
- Focus: PS Letters/sounds/beginning reading: 30%. PS reading practice: 25%. PS Math Support: 5%. PS Varied help with reading & writing assignments: 40%. BH: Social Studies Support: 33.3%. BH: Math & Science Support: 66.7%.





Referred Students: Most students' skills are 1-2 grade levels below standard. 85% of referred students lack academic support at home. Teachers hope one-on-one tutoring will build confidence and skills, resulting in increased student perseverance and academic performance. LWM Kinder students began school with limited (0-3) letter recognition. 32% PS LWM students are from Spanish-speaking homes. ~65% PS LWM students qualify for free & reduced lunch.

PEACE AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION: (Chairs: Henry Alker, Steve Zivolich) -

- **Henry** and **Steve** will attend the next board meeting to offer reasons for inviting the city of Sebastopol to designate itself as a peace city.
- Peace Science Digest: There are five copies available for our perusal. Group wants to translate highly technical jargon into ordinary English for use in libraries and schools.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS COMMITTEE (Chair: Cory Maguire) -

- The Domestic violence Awareness Committee is comprised of members from both clubs and is headed by **Cory Maguire**, noon club, and <u>Nancy Wilson</u>, morning club.
- Rotary Club of Sebastopol funded a ValPak coupon in both Spanish and English reaching 30,000 homes in and near Sebastopol. Cost was \$585, a discounted rate. See photo below.
- The committee is "prudently passing out" [sic] and has posted the great flyers giving the YWCA's information.
 Cory says she and Jim Passage were very well received at the businesses they reached out to Many brochures placed in windows; others in the break rooms. Rotary was well acknowledged.
- Rotary Club of Sebastopol has received a District Grant to provide yard improvements at the YWCA therapeutic
 preschool and safe house. \$5,100 cost.
- Both the Rotary Club of Sebastopol and the Rotary Club of Sebastopol Sunrise are presenting information related to domestic violence awareness month at their weekly meetings.
- Both clubs are pursuing giving donated goods to the YWCA as posted on their wish list page at YWCASC.org. hopefully once per month all the year.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE [Chair: Hal Kwalwasser] – Hal writes: "Tom: I'm away till the 19th. I'll catch up with you when I get back. Hal"

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE [**Co-chairs: David Schreibman, Jeff Boal**] – **David** reports: "**Tom**, I've attached the summary of our recent Membership Committee (MC) meeting. As a follow up to that, we are actively working on our next After Hours Event Oct 12 at Mexico Lindo [postponed due to fire], and we are planning another for Nov. 30 at the Sebastopol Center for the Arts. We have also

begun to plan a Fireside Chat. There are several items for Board review within the summary. Perhaps the most important is the recommendation to reduce the first year's dues to \$195. There was broad agreement that if we are to attract younger members, the cost could be a significant barrier, especially before they really see the value of Rotary, and our club. One of our members even agreed to start a fund to offset the\$85/member shortfall if needed. The Board also asked the MC to recommend a measurable statistic to track engagement. Our solution is listed, but several are still very skeptical that this is a good thing to do. The MC recommends a NO vote on the pilot program. See you Tuesday! **David**"

Membership Committee – Meeting Summary -- September 22, 2017 - 1:35PM --Media Room, SebCommChu (Present: D Schreibman, J Boal, E Harrington, L Johnson, J Warren, T Boag, R Wilson, M Fink)

Open Discussion about anything read in the Membership Attraction Committee (MAC) meeting summary There was a lot of discussion regarding the cost of being a member, and how challenging that might be to younger members. The conclusion of the discussion was that we should offer a one-time first year dues (for non-Rotarians) of \$195. It's a more attractive price point and it makes for an easier decision to check it out for a year. Mark Fink even offered to start a Membership Dues Assistance Reserve. There was also a lengthy conversation about inviting people to join Rotary and it was consensus that members needed more information on how to ask, what tools are available, and what the process is.

EDUCATION Subcommittee

Rick Wilson was asked to move forward on coordinating an educational social (formerly known as Fireside Chat), either in November or January. **Rick Wilson** asked for more help with Greeters. No suitable names were offered. **Rick** also asked for help presenting Rotary Info to [JP]. **David Schreibman** offered to consider it.

FRIENDS OF ROTARY -- The Chair will handle these responsibilities for now as no one volunteered.

OTHER ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

Should we recommend to the board to join the 3-year pilot membership program?

After each member expressing their opinions, it was unanimously decided to recommend **NOT** joining the pilot project offered by the Zone. We all felt we'd stay committed, and focused on, growing membership without the program, and that the added layers of bureaucracy were not worth any possible benefits.

The Board has also asked us to come up with a measurable statistic to track engagement. Currently we track attendance and makeups. There are two key points I'd like you to ponder.

We concluded that the only reasonable way to track engagement is in minutes. As an example, if a member is required under current rules to attend or make up 50% of (75 minute) meetings in 6 months (2.5 hrs./month), then the amount of actual time a member is engaged in Rotarian activity could be used as a more suitable measure of engagement.

We still feel pretty strongly that members should be required to attend at least one meeting per month regardless of hours of service.

How can we make it easy and desirable for people to report their engagement?

Recognizing the practically insurmountable mountain of getting people to self-report, we recommend that committee chairs be responsible for keeping a list of people and their times on a project.

Next meeting of the whole Membership Committee is November 17 after the lunch meeting.

AUDIO VISUAL COMMITTEE [Chair: Gene Nelson] – Ron Puccinelli reports "The Audio-Visual committee played with their toys at the Lobster Fest. The committee is planning to rearrange shelving within the trailers to accommodate the extra speakers acquired for smaller events such as the debunking (projected attendance currently at 3). -Ron"

SPONSORSHIP COMMITTEE [**Co-Chairs: Linda Johnson, Cory Maguire**] – **Linda** sent a spreadsheet with notation "This is the figures for sponsors. I will have to check with **Ken** to see if any checks have come in. **Linda**" **Linda**'s spreadsheet showed a total of contributions totaling \$13,650 that included \$10,650 money donations (**H Henningson, M McDonell**, Terra Firma-**Facendini**, Umqua Bank-**Coate**, M Lemon, RenewingOurSchools-**Kwalwasser**, Exchange Bank-**McLennon**, K-Tech-K Jonasse, Portsmouth-E Chen, Manzana-A Trine, Neil & Amelia Trust-McDaniel) plus \$3,000 in In-Kind Donations (Sprint copy, Pacific Market, Balletto Vineyards, Rose Draper Graphic Design).



Linda, **President Jack**, and **Tom Boag** met on October 6 to discuss a November Sebastopol Rotary Soiree and to discuss a request for additional \$600 budget – It turns out that the committee has an existing approved \$800 budget that will cover anticipated expenses. In addition, **Linda** responded to several board questions as follows:

"How will the invitees be identified? Sponsor Rotary and Membership Committees will work together to identify who to invite; How many invitees are we targeting? Maybe 60 to 75; What is our plan for "closing the deal" on membership or sponsorship with folks that attend the event? We will register all attendees and follow up with emails or direct calls; Who from our club will participate in the event? Sponsor Committee (Linda, Ellen, Cory, Hal) and Membership (David M, David S); Are we proposing to fund this through the Membership Committee or Sponsorship Committee, or both? Both; Has the Membership Committee been involved in planning this event so far? If not, what will their involvement be? Yes; Overall Goal: Recruit 4 new members, Recruit Sponsors Rotary funding of \$ 2,000"
