Mike Ferguson introduced our speaker – <u>Janell Smiley</u> of the Smiley Academy. He began by introducing her husband, <u>Dennis Smiley</u>, who worked with **Mike** in the Sheriff's Office and retired as a Detective Sergeant.

The theme of <u>Janell's</u> program was the ups and downs, joy and pain, of home schooling. She has written a book, "As Long As You Don't Turn Them into Weirdos" which describes her experiences as a home schooling mom. The title is a quote from her husband – his first reaction to her proposal of home school for their two sons, <u>Jacob</u> and <u>Joseph</u> (what, no coat of many colors?). <u>Jacob</u> was in 5th grade and <u>Joseph</u> in 3rd when she took them out of the public school system. She

said they were bored, underachieving and just not getting what they needed in their schooling. She started with a blank slate, without a clear plan, but convinced her sons needed something more.

But searching the internet for resources, she was able to be their coach at home. When they reached high school, she used curriculum from the California Virtual Academy. Her sons prospered, able to work at their own pace and move into advanced classes. One son wanted more math classes and was able to do that through the home schooling program. Janell was also pleased and somewhat surprised at the support she received from teachers and principal at the school.

After high school, both sons received scholarship offers from colleges. The Virtual Academy provided all necessary transcripts, and the boys did well on all standardized tests. In terms of socialization, she believes their flexible school schedule actually gave them more time to volunteer in the community and they were able to participate in sports such as swimming through the YMCA.

Yes, there were fears and anxieties along the way, but for her family, home schooling was the way to go. Her book tells the story.

Friday, December 21: Rollie Atkinson, Reinventing Local Journalism



Rollie Atkinson has worked in newspapers for 43 years, starting his career as a reporter at his hometown daily in Frederick, Maryland before moving to Sonoma County in 1981.

He has worked as sports editor, editor, general manager and finally as owner and publisher at a group of weekly newspapers here including The Windsor Times, The Healdsburg Tribune, Cloverdale reveille and Sonoma West Times & News in Sebastopol. With his wife, Sarah Bradbury, then have been owners since 1995 with their independent corporation Sonoma West Publishers.

Atkinson was part of the newspaper team that started The Windsor Times in 1987, five years ahead of the incorporation of the Town of Windsor.

The four Sonoma West Publishers newspapers share the same mission of community service and leadership but provide very local news, columnists and shared opinions that are different in each paper, specific to each community such as Windsor. At the same time, the four newspapers combine efforts to report on larger stories like the wildfires, homelessness, affordable housing, the Russian River watershed, agriculture and more.

Rollie wants to talk today about the historical challenges facing newspapers and journalists today and why their survival and support is important. He also wants to share his "new vision for community journalism which Sonoma West Publishers launched just a few weeks ago.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AREA – DIRECTOR PEGGY ROGERS:



FAMILY SAFETY / DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS COMMITTEE (Chair: **Cory Maguire**) – The Family Safety/DV Committee met earlier in the week with <u>Anita Sandwina</u>, educator at Analy... In addition to her regular classes, she has a 16 year legacy of doing amazing work through the "Community Matters Safe School Ambassador" program at the school, a non-violence education program that actively involves students working peer-to-peer. The program is being expanded to include male athletes, called "A Boy's Day", and speaks to how violence against minorities, women, LGBTQ shows up on campus. A pilot program was introduced last year with remarkable results. The Committee hopes to engage Sunrise for a joint effort. Analy Boosters has funded \$620 for five substitutes for the Boys Day. A request for \$6,000 will be made from our budget to pay for the program training all the athletes and coaches at Analy. (**Peggy Rogers** was not at Board meeting, out of the country for a long awaited vacation. She asked **Cory Maguire** to attend to talk about the \$6,000 the committee

hopes to fund the training of the athletes and coaches on non-violence and positive relationship and respect skill development as part of Analy's Community Matters Safe School Ambassador program.)

MARK SELL ROTARY TEACHER GRANT COMMITTEE (Chair: **Jack Blasco**) – **Jack** reports: "The Committee concluded the Fall round of grants by distributing checks for 38 grants at 21 schools totaling \$15,169. The letters accompanying the checks urged the school committees to support our annual Crab Feed, the funding source for the teacher grants."

DICTIONARY COMMITTEE (Chair: Paul Yeomans) - We have dictionaries ordered with delivery in February, 2019.

LEARN WITH ME COMMITTEE (Chair: **Linda Irving**) – <u>Deborah Drehmel</u>, Program Coordinator reports "Rotary's Learn With Me program values the mentor relationship that develops between tutors and students. The development of trust creates an environment where our struggling learners are willing to keep trying – even when it is very difficult. The partnerships are often strong and multi-year with tutors working with the same students as they progress through the grades. This year, 18 students are working with their tutor for a second year; one student is in his third year with his tutor. Last year, among Rotarian **Hal Kwalwasser's** tutees were a 2nd and a 3rd grade boy. Both students made significant progress, though both are still below grade level standards, and we planned for **Hal** to continue with them this year. As many of you know, for the past few months, **Hal** has been in Florida and his students have been awaiting his return. When told he'd be back this week, their eyes lit up, huge smiles appeared on their faces accompanied by excited exclamations of "**Hal's** back!" That exemplifies the power of the Rotary LWM relationships!"

CRAB FEED (Co-Chairs: **Scott Briggs** and **Patrick Dirden**) – **Scott** reports: "Scheduled for February 9. Fortunately, it appears that there will not be any water quality/toxicity problems this year getting fresh crab, although we will, of course, not know what the price of crab will be until purchased next February. **Patrick Dirden**, **Nao Noguchi**, and I have already met once (Mtg notes shared previously.), and have scheduled a meeting of our full committee and key personnel for this coming Monday night at my (**Briggs**) home for 5:30 PM."

Among our main discussion points thus far: How can we better advertise our event and reduce the last minute crunch re ticket sales (including possible web-site work); possible reconsideration of live (but less noisy) music; better efforts at getting West County winery wine donations; and completing Rotarian assignments for key Crab Feed tasks.

LEARN TO SWIM COMMITTEE (Co-Chairs: **Greg Jacobs** and **Rick Wilson**) – Private donor has given \$4,000 again and **Greg** has a list of expenses he will present to the Board.

COMMUNITY GRANTS COMMITTEE (CHAIR: **Linda Johnson**) – **Linda** is working with **Hal Kwalwasser** to finalize the grant application and it should be available next week.

COMMUNITY VOLUNTEER PROJECTS COMMITTEE (Chair: **Steve Beck**, "until October"): Community hands-on service projects: **Jim Pacatte** and **Steve Beck** have been working with West County Community Services on improving the outside of a trailer in the low income trailer park, helping a Vietnam vet with pruning trees and painting the exterior – Cost \$500. Other projects needing funding may need \$3,000 or more this year. Projects may include (Total requested funds: \$3,500 for following):

Linda Johnson proposed we consider building some Buddy Benches at one or more of the local schools and described their purpose.

The tree Rotarians planted in front of the Sebastopol Post Office has grown tall enough to obscure the words "Post Office" and the tree has either blown away or merged into soil and thus no longer limiting weak growth. Adjacent to the steps is a clearly visible plaque informing passersby that our club members did the landscaping work nearly a decade ago and that the message today may be less positive in its current condition. For about five years, the landscaping was maintained under contract to **Greg Gill**, and then not renewed by the Postal Service.

Another former Rotary landscaping project in Ives Park on the north side of Calder Creek is a small rose garden. Back in 2016, I was told a fallen tree had damaged the garden, and while the tree had been cut up and the pieces removed, the rose garden looked unaffected – clearly showed no signs of maintenance since its planting. If there is sufficient interest, we could combine the rose garden and post office landscaping upgrades into a single project.

Julie Cugini is currently working to find a metal worker to make the Rotary signs for the peace garden.

PEACE AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION: (Chairs: **Henry Alker**, **Steve Zivolich**) – Purchased subscriptions to 2x \$49.95 so we can continue funding Peace Studies Digest at Analy and El Molino High Schools. (\$100 already paid.)

GALA (FALL FUNDRAISER) 2018 (CHAIR: **Keller McDonald**) – Event happened, a great success – Look at last month's Director Report Summary for financial details. All revenues have now been resolved and final bills are being paid. Final accounting should be available to review at Board meeting, says **Keller**.

REDWOOD FOOD BANK VOLUNTEERS (Chair: **Jerry Warren**) – **Jerry** reports: "At last week's workday at the Redwood Empire food Bank, I asked the eight other members there if they thought we should schedule a December workday, knowing what a busy time of the year this is. Because of the critical community need for REFB support, all eight members agreed we should at least try. So, I have scheduled our next volunteer workday for Thursday, December 20th, 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. If you can work these hours into your schedule; that would be great. If you know students who are on vacation, or if you have family members or friends who would like to volunteer, they, too, are welcome to join us.

TOOLBOX DISTRICT GRANT (**President Larry Ford** and **Keller McDonald**, Responsible Assignees) – The pre-school implementation is on track. We are waiting for an introduction of the program and grant to the Club as a whole and plan to invite all Rotarians to a one hour training on using the "TOOLBOX" of skills with their children and grandchildren. Requested funds: \$2,500. The grant reimburses the club after all \$4,700 is spent and grant documentation is provided and approved.

MAP YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD DISTRICT 5130 COMMITTEE [Chair: Richard Ruge, Sunrise] — No new report from Tom Boag. Map Your Neighborhood program has been moved from Club Service Area to Community Service area.

VOCATIONAL / YOUTH SERVICE AREA – DIRECTOR HAL KWALWASSER:

INTERACT (**Chair/Coordinator: Barbara Bickford**): First the good news: Adopt a Family is moving forward. As of last week, shopping was proceeding. The target is to support 22-24 families. Also, **Pauline** has two fire trucks committed from Sebastopol, and is hoping to get a third from Gold Ridge so that all the participating schools, Analy, Brook Haven, and Twin Hills, will have one. **Rick Wilson** has agreed to play Santa – again.

Also, Brook Haven held a jog-a-thon last week. No final numbers on the amount raised, but it will be split between Camp Fire and the Living Room.

But there is bad news: Orchard View has had too few students sign up and will likely be disbanding.



OVERCOMING OBSTACLES AWARD (**Co-Chairs: Tom Boag, David Schreibman, and Hal Kwalwasser**) – The committee had its first organizing meeting on November 30th. It has since moved ahead smartly. Approximately 12 students submitted applications, which is sufficient to give us a good cross-section from which to draw our winners. [**Update**: We now have 17 applications, including 9 from Analy, 5 from El Molino, and 3 from Laguna. Application material received and distributed (150 pages!) to committee members for their "homework" over the holidays. The "selection committee meeting" will be held in late January.] The committee has confirmed that O'Reilly will allow us to use its Tarsier Conference Room for the morning activities. The committee has begun approaching people about being judges, but no confirmations yet.

YOUTH EXCHANGE (Co-Chairs: Jackie Moreira, Katy Spyrka, Aleia Coate) - Inbound student Laura has moved to her

second host family and is doing well. Outbound <u>Natasha</u> in Switzerland is doing better. Our outbound student for next year, Fay, will get her country assignment in January.

SRJC Scholarships (**Chair: Scott Briggs**) – The committee should be getting applications after the New Year. It need clarification of funding regarding whether it will be able to offer three or four \$4,000 scholarships.

PROGRAMMA DE BECAS] (Chair: Tom Lambert) – [See International Service

CAREER FAIR ANALY HS (Chair: Tom Lambert) - No new report.

COOL KIDS CAMP (Chair: **Robin Maybury**) – The committee met on Friday with the leadership of Cloverleaf Ranch. They are again prepared to offer us discounted rates for our kids. (\$500 each) Also, they are prepared to offer 35 slots spread out over their eight sessions this summer. The committee will begin contacting social service agencies right after the New Year.

FINANCIAL LITERACY (Co-Chairs: Tim Moore and David Schreibman) – No new report.

HIGH SCHOOL SPEECH CONTEST (Chair: Richard Power) - The contest is now set for April 5th.

INTERACT ADOPT A FAMILY (Chair: **Pauline Pellini**) – **Pauline** has verified with the Sebastopol Volunteer Fire Department for the Adopt a Family project. It will be on December 15th, starting at 9 am. - See Interact Report above.

ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP AWARDS (RYLA) (**Chair: Cindy Carter**) – **Cindy** has noted that there seems to be a decreased interest in the camp. She expects three people will go this year. [Conversation at Board meeting expressed some doubt for RYLA this year.] Our club has contributed scholarships and a welcoming BBQ in the past.

TRADE PATH (VOCATIONAL) AWARDS (Chair: Rick Williams) - No new report.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE AREA - DIRECTOR LU FRAZIER:

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION (Chair: **Dan Rasmus**) – **Dan Rasmus** reports "Gala complete and budget numbers can now be filled in."

WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE (WCS) (Chair: **Bob Rogers**) – (Report submitted by **Jack Blasco** on behalf of WCS Chair **Bob Rogers**): The WCS Committee met on December 7. The following international projects are currently under consideration:

Tanzania School Rainwater Harvesting and Toilet Blocks Project, brought to us by <u>Jerry Meshulam</u> of Sebastopol Sunrise, the Host Club. This is a \$69,000 project and they need \$20,000, with TRF and the District supplying the balance. The project is similar to our "Keeping Girls in School" project and addresses the sanitation and hygiene problems girls face as they transition into puberty. A number of other District 5130 clubs have committed



or are considering partnering up with Sebastopol sunrise. A Google Group has been created so that Interact Students at El Molino and the students in the school in Tanzania can get to know each other through emails and photos.

Nepal Telemedicine Vocational Training Team Global Grant, brought to us by Mikel Cook and Brian Bauer of the Sebastopol sunrise Club on behalf of the Rancho Cotati Club. It is tied in with Global Offsite Care, a non-profit, whose board is largely made up of Rotarians and whose purpose is to spread Telemedicine to developing countries' hospitals. The purpose of the grant is to train medical practitioners in Nepal in the use of Telemedicine. They are seeking financial partners for this VTT Global Grant, which totals around \$54,750. (Club cash contributions share would be about \$15,600).

Potential Projects being developed by our Club:

Steve Prandini is communicating with Director Kathy McCarty of the Chidamoyo Hospital in Zimbabwe, where we have provided an ambulance and generator in the past, to determine if there is a viable project at the hospital that our club can support this year.

Bob Rogers is in Puerto Vallarta this week and is tentatively planning on visiting our sister club, <u>Puerto Vallarta Sur</u>, to discuss potential project opportunities for this year.

Frank Mayhew reported that, to the best of his knowledge, all of our financial commitments for the Keeping Girls In School Global Grant have been fulfilled, and the funds identified in this year's budget as being held in reserve for that project will not be needed for that purpose. The WCS Committee trusts that the Board will follow precedent and release those funds to be used on other international projects, in addition to the funds that the Board allocates for this year.

In summary, the WCS Committee is excited about the number and quality of potential projects under consideration this year and is confident that the funds allocated by the Board for international projects this year will be put to good use.
