Rollie Atkinson stepped up to the Roto-lectern to talk about journalism. **Rollie** warned the crowd that his talk would be sobering. He started with a question: Are newspapers dying? Unfortunately, yes. Over the past ten years, 20% of all newspapers nationwide have shuttered. Today, there are over 170 counties without a local newspaper, creating "news deserts." The absence of local newspapers have been correlated with lower voter turnout, greater political corruption, increased environmental degradation, and increased health issues. Without a local newspaper, oversight disappears and democracy suffers.



Rollie knew that Sonoma West had to find a better business model. The newspaper has been serving Sebastopol since 1889, and is a staple in the community. He referenced **Pauline Pellini**, who used to ask **Rollie**, "what did you put in my newspaper?" **Rollie** took great pride in **Pauline's** reference. Sonoma West is your newspaper. He decided to take it a step further.

Last year, Sonoma West made a direct public offer, allowing people to buy shares in his company. His goal is to raise \$400,000. To date, he's raised \$270,000, and has 80 investors. Other companies, including Ben and Jerry's have used direct public offers to help fund their organizations. To join, the minimum investment is \$1,000, which equates to \$250 shares. Investors must reside in California. The buy

in expires in mid 2019. This move has attracted national and world attention. **Rollie** was recently featured in the *New York Times*, and has been interviewed by NPR, and other outlets across the globe.

Rollie expressed his frustration of being unable to retain talented reporters and not offering competitive wages. The direct public offering changed that. Now, **Rollie** is offering competitive wages, attracting talented reporters from across the country, and is adding new positions. He wants to add more pages to the paper, increase ad sales, host live meetings and events, and expand their website, which now sees 70,000 visitors monthly.

Some of the challenges **Rollie** continues to face includes the shift in advertisement dollars from newspapers to Facebook and Google. Compounding the problem is the surge in online sales, which have harmed local businesses, and advertisement purchases. Despite that, there is reason to celebrate. Enrollment in journalism schools have increased substantially over the years. More students are electing to work for news outlets, rather than PR firms. **Rollie** reminded everyone that all of the news stories come from one place, and one place only, a living, breathing reporter. He proudly proclaimed that Sonoma West will always remain an independent newspaper. Many people in the audience shared their appreciation for the paper, and the work of **Rollie** and his team. **Rollie**, from the staff at the *Appleknocker*, we thank you for your work, and your continued commitment to our community!
