Barbara Beedon introduced <u>Pat Kerrigan</u> from Radio Station KSRO. <u>Pat</u> has become something of a local hero for staying on the microphone during the horrendous fires of October 2017. Pat has had a long and storied career as a radio personality. On October 8, she was awoken and evacuated from her home in Kenwood due to fires everywhere. She went to work.

As most people know, there was no cell service, most TV was down and the internet was missing in action. People turned to AM Radio to find out what was going on and <u>Pat Kerrigan</u> filled that need, staying on microphone for 24 days, reporting everything. The first twelve hours were a mess. No one knew what exactly was happening but Pat worked the phones and rounded up as much information as possible and relayed it via KSRO. People in the fire's

path listened to Pat. Medical personnel at Kaiser and Sutter listened to Pat. She became the defacto information center during the first difficult hours of the inferno and she stayed on it as long as she could

Pat was most impressed with the spirit of volunteerism that swept the county. The volunteer center fielded 14,000 phone calls looking to help, not looking for help. Pat points out that the two year anniversary will be here soon and many people will have to finally decide whether to stay or go. Pat also recommended that people take personal responsibility. As she said ' In these kinds of emergencies, Superman ain't coming. You need to be ready yourself to help yourself."

Overcoming Obstacles is both profoundly moving and troubling, and it shows what a great local Rotary club can do.

Whenever I hear the stories of the kids we select as winners of this particular scholarship, I recognize how important it is for these students to find they have someone in their lives who wants to support them. Too often, I think, we forget that there are lots of young people in this country who are really struggling. Sometimes, it is a physical disability, which is an obvious, visible obstacle to overcome, but more likely, it is a kid from a totally dysfunctional home, who may look fine on the outside, but who is under the tremendous psychological - and sometimes physical - burden of having a mother or a father (or both) who are not there for them. Whether it is drugs, or physical abuse, or simply having parents who need to keep at 2-3 jobs at a time to survive, these kids grow up without the kind of support and sustenance every child deserves. Their experience with OOA may be the first time in their lives they have a caring adult in their lives.

OOA is a symbol of what a local Rotary can do. We can find things of real value to our community and tailor what we do to the special needs of the people we serve. At a time when the concept of community is strained in an America that is increasingly divided not just by race but also by class, it is a way to bridge a divide and demonstrate that kids who work hard and believe in themselves can still make it in America. That's a great message.
