Past District Governor, Bob Rogers, announced that at the RI convention in Toronto, our <u>District 5130 was honored for</u> being 16th in terms of Polio Plus giving in all of Rotary. And Bob had a lot to do with that.

Our speaker was <u>Alison Bies</u> of <u>ARTSTART</u>. ARTSTART was begun19 years ago by <u>Liz Uribe</u>. She modeled it after a program in Chicago designed to get and keep teenagers involved in the arts and to help kids transition to careers in the arts after high school. The ARTSTART mission statement: "Our mission is to provide job training, mentoring, and the fostering of life-changing breakthroughs by way of stimulation arts work experience for Sonoma County Youth, while creating public art for our community." This is an opportunity for teens to make a positive difference in their communities with their art.

The 2018 summer session has 14 kids – apprentices – who are mentored by two lead artists. The session runs from June 20 to July 20 and includes scholarships for the students. High school youth are asked to submit their art portfolios to apply for this program. ARTSTART public art can be found throughout the community: the Spring Lake Children's Memorial Grove, the Prince Memorial Greenway, silhouettes at the CASA offices - a project that included youth in the CASA program, public benches, a mural at the Palms Inn, indeed a number of murals and mosaics throughout Santa Rosa. They will also do projects for private individuals, because the program can always use extra money. Alison told of one project for a fire victim in which the student artists have turned fire-damaged china into a beautiful mosaic. Interestingly, years ago Jane Byrnes, whom many of us know, suggested



that the plain brown tubes that the Press Democrat is delivered in could be turned into a community art project. And ARTSTART made it so! The Prince Greenway project has also involved repairing damaged and vandalized art. And the

kids of ARTSTART have been able to partner with many homeless people in the area to protect and preserve the art projects there.

Changing lives – and a community – one art project at a time, all the while encouraging and mentoring young artists. That is what ARTSTART is all about. Speaking of the Children's Memorial at Spring Lake, <u>Melissa Kelley</u>, Executive Director of Sonoma County Regional Parks Foundation, said, "Art and outdoor spaces both have the ability to help people heal."



President Larry thanked <u>Alison Bies</u> for her informative talk and presented her with a gift in her name to Rotary's Polio program – The gift provides polio immunization to 50 kids. Alison thanked President Larry for that... saying that her mother has Post-Polio. He then rang the bell (exactly 1:30), ending his first meeting.
