years. Today their shipping fleet is the sixth largest globally and they are one of leading producers of specialized vessels and maritime equipment worldwide.

Over the decades, the Norwegian business community has had to solve a number of extraordinary challenges

such as shipping in the Arctic climate, oil production on the seabed, and the sustainable management of sustainable fish stock, Norway has become pioneers by necessity. Norway lives from and with nature. They have learned the importance of sustainable natural resources. Norway has world class products-- every day up to 40 million meals of Norwegian seafood are served worldwide.

Norway is a financial center for the global maritime economy. Ocean industry is an essential component of the economy, accounting for 40% of their value creation and 70% of their export



Norway has set a goal of having all new cars sold be emission free by 2025. Norway has had a Democratic constitution since 1814, and Norwegian institutions are characterized by a high degree of trust, social security and well-functioning collaboration between the public and private sectors. The vast oil resources in the North Sea have provided Norway with great wealth. The revenue is not only spent on building the country, but a large portion is also saved for future generations

Friday Dinner Presenter - Dave Dravecky SF Giants (retired) MLB Pitcher, Author & Cancer Survivor In 1988 Dave was at the top of his game and life. Not only did he have a wonderful family, but he was also reaching his All-Star peak playing the game of his childhood dreams. His 5-1 opening day victory was overshadowed later that fell by the discovery of cancer and the removal of half of the deltoid muscle in his pitching arm. Defying all odds, after battling cancer, on August 10, 1989, Dave came back to pitch once again in the Major Leagues. Sadly, Dave's comeback was short-lived. Five days later, in Montreal, Dave threw "the pitch that could be heard round the world." Dave's arm had split in two. His arm along with his shoulder blade and left side of his collarbone were amputated for fear the cancer would spread and take Dave's life. He began to ask questions many ponder. After a long search, Dave discovered his true worth could never be shaken by adversity or loss again.

Saturday Breakfast Presenter - Lisa Kristine Bound to Freedom: From Slavery to Liberation Humanitarian Photographer, Lisa Kristine, creates more than images, she inspires change. A master storyteller, Lisa documents indigenous cultures in more than 100 countries on six continents, instinctively identifying the universal human dignity in all of us, Awakening compassion and igniting action in a worldwide audience with powerful, broad-sweeping images of courage and tender. intimate portrayals, Lisa elevates significant social causes-such as the elimination of human slavery and the unification of humanity-to missions. Her work resonates in the heart and moves us to act. Best known for her evocative and saturated use of color, her fine art prints are among the most sought after and collected in the world

Senator McGuire joined the Rotary Club of Healdsburg in 2004, while serving on the Healdsburg City Council. He became the City's youngest-ever mayor and went on to the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors seat in 2010. There, he concentrated his efforts on recovery from the economic recession, crafting a local jobs plan and investments in infrastructure and schools. Elected to the State Senate in 2014, Mike serves Californians on several committees, and is a leader in response to the recent devastating wildfires.

Saturday Dinner Presenter - Ron Burton, Past RI President 2013-14 and RI Foundation Chair 2018-19 PRIP Burton retired as President of the University of Oklahoma Foundation Inc. in 2007. He is a member of the Cleveland County, Oklahoma, and American Bar Associations and is admitted to practice in Oklahoma and before the U.S. Supreme Court. Burton has been a Rotarian since 1979 and has served as RI President; RI Director; Foundation Trustee and Vice Chair; RI Board Executive Committee Member; RI President's Aide; and many more positions. A recipient of RI's Service Above Self Award, Burton has received The Rotary Foundation's Distinguished Service Award and International Service Award for a Polio-Free World. He and his wife, Jetta, are Paul Harris Fellows, Benefactors, and members of the Arch Klumph Society and Bequest Society of The Rotary Foundation.

- 1) Committee Members: Steve Beck, Jack Blasco, Jeff Boal, Sally Ewald, Steve Prandini, Dick Zimmer and Bob Rogers
- 2) Senegal Cervical Cancer Screening Found out from the June board minutes that the expenditure of \$2,000 for this Rotary Club of Chicago 1 Global Grant project was approved by the Board, but we are still waiting to hear from Chicago 1 as to when the grant is approved by TRF and the funds are needed.

1/8/19 - Notified via email that funding commitments are completed and project has been approved by TRF. Waiting for instructions on distribution of funds.

- 3) Keeping Girls in School Global Grant #1748653 All funds have been sent in except for \$1,350.30 from the Rotary Club of Russian River, due to a mis- communication. The project is ready to start work on the borehole well, but cannot start until all funds are in the hands of TRF. President Hans Bruener and Frank Mayhew are working together to resolve the issue in as timely a manner as possible. Issue was resolved with Russian River Rotary Club and their \$1,350.30 has been sent in to TRF, and Frank reported that work has begun on the well (complete with video of drilling) as well as the tower and storage tank.
- 4) Tanzania Water and Toilet Block for Schools <u>Jerry Meshulam</u> of Rotary Club of Sebastopol Sunrise is initiating a Global Grant from a project he learned about at last Spring's Eastern Africa Project Fair. It is \$69,000 project (\$20,000 needed from clubs) for the installation of a rain water harvest system, construction of a toilet block, and menstrual health education for a 650 student girls' school in Bukoba, Tanzania. I told him we would look at it, but cannot commit to any support until after our fundraiser, when we will know how much funds our board allocates for International Service, probably after our club's November event, and at that time I will present this project to the committee members.

**1/7/19** - Have received information on this project and will be presenting to the WCS Committee at our next meeting on Friday, January 11<sup>th</sup>. At our 1/11/19 meeting, The Committee moved to recommend to the Club Board of Directors our financial support of \$2,500 with the proviso that the amount will be reduced by the amount the El Molino Interactors raise at their March Fundraiser. On 1/17/19, due to new information,



the committee amended the proposal to delete the "proviso regarding the Interactor's fundraiser and to fund \$2,500 without restrictions. At a February 1<sup>st</sup> board meeting, the club board voted to approve the Committee's recommendation to support this project with a funding of \$2,500 without restrictions. Sebastopol Sunrise is now awaiting approval by TRF for this GG before asking us for the funds.

5) Chidamoyo Hospital – At our 1/11/19 meeting, the Committee voted to recommend to the board the purchase of 100 hospital mattresses at US\$50 each (\$5,000 total) for Chidamoyo Christian Hospital. The Board approved the funding at their February 1<sup>st</sup> podium meeting, and a \$5,000 check was given to the local Chidamoyo Hospital Representative by Steve Prandini. The hospital supplied us with a proforma invoice and will give us a copy of the actual invoice when the mattresses are purchased.

Mattresses we delivered to hospital on March 2<sup>nd</sup> and for verification, pictures were sent of workers offloading them from truck. Also, a copy of the receipt for mattresses was supplied to the club. This project is completed.

6) Puerta Vallarta Sur Water Filter Project – At our 1/11/19 meeting, the committee voted to recommend to the board the funding of \$2,500 towards the PV Sur Water Filter project for the village of Casimiro Castillo, Jalisco, Mexico (about 2 hours by car from PV). It is planned to distribute 100 water filters. Our contribution will purchase 62 water filters (US\$40 each), with the balance being supplied by the PV Sur club, plus the 100 five-gallon buckets needed for the project. The Board approved this recommendation at their 2/1/19 podium meeting, and the funds were wire transferred to the PV Sur Club on Tuesday, February 20<sup>th</sup>. Documentation will be provided after the purchase.

Distribution of the filters is tentatively planned for March 23<sup>rd</sup>, which will be verified by March 6<sup>th</sup>, and any Sebastopol club member has been invited to participate. An announcement to the club will be made shortly.

The filters, along with buckets and decals have been purchased by the PV South Club. On 3/6/19, they verified the filter distribution date as March 23<sup>rd</sup>. On 3/10/19 a club-wide email was sent reminding members of this opportunity to participate. Les Crawford has responded and said he is interested, along with his partner Santa Rosa Rotarian Kathy. I have put them in touch with Malcolm and Sandra Laird of the Puerto Vallarta South club for further information.

7) At our 1/11/19 meeting, we also voted to recommend to the Club Board to reduce the World Community Service Budget from \$17,397 to \$12,500. This will leave WCS with a budget balance of \$2,500 for contingency projects, should they arise. The Board did **not** act on this recommendation at their 2/1/19 podium meeting, deferring it to the next board meeting.

As I understand it, the board approved the motion to reduce the WCS budget to \$12,500, as requested at their 2/21/19 meeting.
