President Larry Ford rang the bell at precisely 12:15 and called on **Dick Zimmer** to lead the Pledge of Allegiance.



After the Award, **President** Larry


couldn't resist reminiscing about how he and **John** both joined Rotary about the same time many years ago as young Sebastopol dentists.

Jim Passage introduced <u>Sally Evans</u> and Stacy <u>DeShazo</u>, our speakers for the day. <u>Sally and Stacy</u> are actually working archeologists. They study everything old except dinosaurs which they leave to someone else. <u>Stacy and Sally presented</u> an overview of the Chinese in Sebastopol.

Using various techniques including old insurance fire maps, they have been able to trace the existence of enclaves of Chinese in Sebastopol beginning around 1850.. The first recorded enclave or "Chinatown" was located right on Main Street, Sebastopol, right around where **Ken Jacobs** office is today. The Chinese immigrants and citizens alike, worked on the railroads, in agriculture and Iaundries.



Beginning in the 1880s, anti Chinese hysteria began to sweep the state with one of the biggest proponents being one Thomas Geary of Santa Rosa. Geary was instrumental in the passing of several Chinese exclusion Acts, barring Chinese, American born or not, from entering the United States. Various vigilante actions caused the Chinese to flee most towns and cities. In Sebastopol they just moved.



1893 records show that someone named Brown leased some land to the Chinese in the middle of what is now downtown Sebastopol. Maps show over forty buildings including a Joss House. Fire of unknown origin swept through the area in 1893 but the enclave, called Brown's Chinatown was rebuilt right about where the new CVS pharmacy is today. (I wonder if they went through the design board?) Slowly, slowly, the Chinatowns in Sonoma County disbanded with the Sebastopol community disappearing last in about 1943 giving way to development

Cordelia Holst - What's happening at the Sebastopol Community Cultural Center.

Cordelia Holst grew up in Sebastopol, lived in Norway for 13 years and returned here with her family, our club member and her husband Jorgen among them, in 2016. Since she became Executive Director of the Community Center at the beginning of last year, Cordelia Holst has spent time going in depth into what the community really needs. Through studying local research data, holding focus groups, outreach and local engagement, she created a strategy for how to address community needs in the short and longer term future, to continue to play an important part in the social fabric of our town. This strategy includes making changes to the facility to be more comfortable, useful and beautiful. Then came the floods of last month, and suddenly, the time for action is now. Cordelia has stepped in on short notice to give us an update on strategic goals of the community center as it rebuilds the main building and looks to the future.

Julie Meridian is an artist and designer. Her art captures the essence of people and places through representational paintings with impressionist details. Her designs have shaped products from LinkedIn and Adobe, including Photoshop.

She brings these worlds together as one of the volunteers of Operation Photo Rescue. By combining her knowledge of photo retouching with artistic interpretation, she works to recover what she can from family photos damaged in natural disasters.
