A flutter of activity, with club members still buzzing from the great gala of last Saturday, which was a huge success!





Jim Passage introduced our speaker, Santa Rosa Symphony Conductor Francesco Lecce-Chong, with one of the best and most passionate introductions we have heard in a while. And then the conductor took the microphone and led us on a fascinating journey through his own experience as growing up, home schooled only child on a farm outside of Boulder, Colorado, through New York University, to conducting in Eugene Oregon and now at the Santa Rosa Symphony. A charming person and natural story teller, Francesco started by thanking us for the work we do in the community, and sharing the important role he sees the orchestra also having in the community, spreading a message of hope and positivity through the medium of music. He reflected on how orchestras are changing, though at different speeds, and most are realizing that they are, in fact, service organizations, with a role to play in serving their communities. He told us how they have their own after school program, teaching kids to play, and even build their own, instruments, two hours every day. As he



said. "You may never know when the spark of music might hit someone."

He did not come from a musical family himself, but once the spark hit him, his artist mother was encouraging, which enabled him to follow his path to where he is today. His ambition for the orchestra is to hit each and every person in the county once every year, and he feels the organization shares and supports this view. In his work, there are two things that important to him, innovation and connection. You cannot have one without the other. He really believes in new music, in not only performing the same old pieces, but also understands that but can be hard for people to accept it, because it is, after all new. People have not heard it before. It is different and sounds like nothing else. So you must introduce it consciously, not too surprising.

"We want to move forward and innovate around what an orchestra can be and do, but at the same time make sure we maintain that connection to our audience."

When asked about practicing vs playing in front of the audience, he explained that they can practice a million times, but once they come into the hall, their performance becomes powered and shaped by the energy of the audience. They feel it from the stage, and it helps them perform even better, while also make every performance unique.
