David Schreibman stepped to the lectern to introduce a new program called Sharing our Stories. We will be inviting members of the Sebastopol Chamber of Commerce to our meetings to come and share information about their business. The first two guests were the Executive Director of the Sebastopol Area Senior Center (and former Rotarian) Linda Civitello, and manager of Cultivate Home, <u>Kathy Anderson</u>.

Linda started by giving the club a top down overview of the activities at the Senior Center. Each week there are over 40

classes available. They offer made to order lunches Monday to Friday. They serve as a resource and educational outlet for the community. <u>Linda</u> encouraged people to stop by and see the newly renovated center, and experience some of their services. She also encouraged people to visit their Legacy Craft Store and the Holiday Store. <u>Kathy Anderson</u> spoke about Cultivate Home. In addition to providing a wide array of home décor and kitchenware, they offer a variety of culinary courses. One course recently featured renowned culinary expert <u>Michelle Anna Jordan</u>. She also has a special room within the store called the coop, featuring seasonal items. She offers a 20% discount to victims of the October wildfires, and has a Senior discount day on the first Tuesday of the month. When you visit, say hello to **Bud Daviero's** wife, **Sharon**. You might also see **Kathie Mayhew** in the store, as she is the owner!



Well, with a tight schedule, the ladder ball had to be postponed. But fear not! If you bought tickets at Friday's meeting, they will be honored at this Friday's meeting. Just turn those tickets in for fresh ones! You still have a chance to achieve fame and riches!!!





Patrick Dirden stepped up to the lectern and introduced the club to our guest speaker, <u>Matt Stevens</u>, from Sonoma Marin Area Rail Transit (AKA: SMART Train). <u>Matt</u> started with an overview of the SMART system. Technical difficulties with the laptop threatened to derail <u>Matt's</u> presentation, but our tech wiz kid **Robin Maybury** saved the day! SMART recently celebrated their first year of revenue service. They offer weekday/weekend service (17 round trips on weekdays, 5 round trips Sat & Sun). The first phase of service covers 43 miles, and serves every city between Santa Rosa and San Rafael. Earlier this month, SMART received funding to extend service to Windsor, including \$20 million from the recently implemented gas tax increase. However, if Proposition 6 passes, the gas tax repeal, the major source of the funding for the Windsor extension would disappear. Work is progressing on the Larkspur extension, which should open in late 2019. SMART is working on extending service to Healdsburg and Cloverdale. Environmental and engineering studies have been completed. The biggest hurdle is the cost, including the cost for a new bridge over the Russian River in Healdsburg. SMART is also looking at extending service in the future east towards Suisun City in Solano County

<u>Matt</u> told us that SMART currently operates 14 two-car trainsets, with two additional sets entering service next year. Trains travel at a maximum speed of 79 MPH. Each train can accommodate 300 people. There's capacity for 24 bikes on each train. All trains are ADA compliant. Becoming Independent works with SMART to operate the concession stand on each train, BI Buzz. They offer food, and an assortment of beverages, including beer and wine! The closest train station to Sebastopol is the Cotati station, on East Cotati Avenue.

Riders using the train must have a Clipper Card. Clipper is a transit payment card, which is used on every public transit system in the bay area. Customers load cash onto the card. Cards can be purchased via vending machines at each station. Customers can also download SMART's mobile Payment App, where customers can purchase individual or bulk tickets. Riders using the train, and parking at the stations, will need to download the Park Mobile app. Parking costs \$2 per day, and can be purchased via the app. <u>Matt</u> suggested that riders sign up for NIXLE to receive train updates. To sign up, text SMART to 888777.

<u>Matt</u> told us about the timed transit connections with SMART. Sonoma County Transit currently operates an express bus connecting Cloverdale, Healdsburg, and Windsor to the SMART train. Those who use the express bus to connect with SMART, and use their Clipper Card, gets the bus ride for free. The City of Santa Rosa operates a shuttle between the 7th Street Garage and the station in Railroad Square. Golden Gate Transit offers a multitude of connector buses between San Rafael and the Larkspur Ferry and San Francisco.

Finally, <u>Matt</u> reminded the club to be vigilant and safe around train tracks. Always expect a train at any time going any direction. Do not walk on the tracks. Do not park your car, or stop on train tracks. Cross the tracks only at road crossings or designated pedestrian crossings. Remember, it takes a SMART train 1,000' to stop in an emergency.

Rick Wilson asked how long it will take the train to travel from Santa Rosa to Larkspur, and what the distance is from the ferry to the new Larkspur Station. <u>Matt</u> said that the train will take 65 minutes to travel from Santa Rosa to Larkspur. The new station in Larkspur will be located north of Sir Francis Drake Blvd. The city of Larkspur passed a resolution banning SMART from crossing Sir Francis Drake Blvd. **Greg Jacobs** asked if the Petaluma station is close to the Airport Express stop. <u>Matt</u> said the station is a few blocks west of the Airport Express stop. Nick Gurney asked where the rail cars were manufactured. <u>Matt</u> told us Nippon Sharyo manufactured the trains. The shells were assembled in Japan, and the rest of the train cars were assembled in Rochelle, IL. Jeff Boal asked what the unexpected surprises have been. <u>Matt</u> told us that the popularity of bikes on the train has been surprising. He also told us that the amount of students using the train has been surprising. Finally, he also said the amount of disabled individuals using the train has been surprising. Again, SMART is 100% ADA compliant.



President Larry Ford struck the hearty Roto-bell at 1:30PM sharp! Over the weekend, some from the Roto-flock gathered at the Sebastopol Memorial Cemetery to help clean up the grounds.



In 2004, Mike was elected to the Healdsburg City Council where he was the city's youngest mayor and was instrumental in creating one of the most successful local economies and stable municipal budgets in the region.

In 2010, Mike was elected to the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors. He has been a tireless advocate for our environment, and helped lead efforts that turned years of deficits into a multi-million dollar surplus and made Sonoma County one of top counties in job growth in California.

Mike has always been a tireless advocate for our environment. He has helped protect and preserve tens of tens of thousands of acres of open space, watersheds and coast and he successfully fought to keep our regional and state parks open to the public.

Mike was sworn into office on December 1st, 2014, and represents the Second Senate District, which stretches from the Golden Gate Bridge to the Oregon Border. The district includes Del Norte, Trinity, Humboldt, Lake, Mendocino, Sonoma and Marin counties.

Mike attended Santa Rosa Junior College and graduated from Sonoma State University. He is married to local high school teacher and middle school assistant-principal, Erika McGuire. Erika and Mike live in Healdsburg.

<u>Senegal Cervical Cancer Screening</u> – Found out from the June Board Minutes that the expenditure of \$2,000 for this Rotary club of Chicago 1 Global Grant project was approved by the board, but we are still waiting to hear from Chicago 1 as to when the grant is approved by TRF and the funds are needed.

<u>Keeping Girls in School Global Grant #1748653</u> – All funds have been sent in except for \$1,350.30 from the Rotary Club of Russian River, due to a mis-communication. The project is ready to start work on the borehole well but cannot start until all funds are in the hands of TRF. President <u>Hans Bruener</u> and **Frank Mayhew** are working together to resolve the issue in as timely a manner as possible.

<u>Tanzania Water and Toilet Block for Schools</u> – <u>Jerry Meshulam</u> of Rotary Club of Sebastopol Sunrise is initiating a global grant from a project he learned about at last Spring's Eastern Africa Project fair. It is \$69,000 project (\$20,000 needed from clubs) for the installation of a rain water harvest system, construction of a toilet bank, and menstrual health education for a 650 student girls' school in Bukoba, Tanzania. I told him that we would look at it but cannot commit to any support until after our fundraiser, when we will I know how much funds our board allocates for International Service, probably after club's November board meeting. I am planning on a first meeting after the gala event, and at that time I will present this project to the committee members.

PROGRAMMA DE BECAS [Also reported in Vocational / Youth Service area] (Chair: Tom Lambert) – No new report. The team has signed up all last year's donors to continue this year, and they would like to recruit some additional members.
