Bud Daveiro celebrated his birthday on Aug. 28. He spent the time at the hospital. Comments not being recorded here.





(Sebastopol Rotary provided significant support for that fledgling Analy Maker class.) The Analy program has become a national model for maker education! Casey is now Maker Education Coordinator for the Sonoma County Office of Education. Casey provides workshops, training, guidance, and support for Maker education in Sonoma County, California, the US, and beyond. He has shared his Maker experience and enthusiasm at the NASA Langley Research Center, Pittsburg, Rhode Island, Los Angeles, and

even China!



<u>Casey</u> was joined by <u>Anna Barbarinde</u>, Science Coordinator for SCOE, and Matt

O'Donnell, Technology Innovation Specialist, SCOE, who shared exciting opportunities for local students in the areas of science, technology, engineering, and math. *Project Make* has blossomed since our club first visited <u>Casey</u> and the Analy Maker Lab as our off-site meeting in August 2012!

Casey explained that the **Sebastopol Rotary Education Foundation**

funded the first dedicated maker space in the County. The theme of the Lobster Boil that year was

"Turning Lobsters into Lasers {cutters}" These cutters are being used by students of all ages – 1st grade up- including special needs students- today.

The Maker movement helps inspiring entrepreneurs produce a product. An example is <u>Miles Pepper</u>, an Analy High student, who designed a reusable straw in a maker class and then raised \$5M in less than a year.





There are Maker classes in most of the Sonoma County school districts. There are Makers Certificate classes at Sonoma State. The Pathfinders Institute is training educators to give makers classes.

Matt O'Donnell went on to explain the Sonoma County Office of Education's part in the Makers movement. Their vision is Curiosity, Empathy, Communication, Collaboration, Ethics and Initiative. For more

Anna said there is a STEAM Showcase in Sonoma County that is open to all students using whole classes or singles or small groups. The trend is moving shop classes to Maker classes.
