<u>Senator McGuire</u> began by sharing what polls indicate are the three top issues for Californians: 1) Homelessness, 2) Climate change, 3) Housing. California Republicans actually put immigration near the top of the list. Interestingly, he is the only Senate Democrat who represents a district with a significant rural population.



And polls show that 31% of us get our news from internet web sites – sites with which we agree politically. So both the Right and Left tend to live in a news bubble, hearing only what they want to hear. By the way, only 6% report getting their news from newspapers. He then said that in his talk, he would like to focus on three topics: the economy, education, and wildfires/PG&E.

## Economy:

In spite of what we might hear from Texas or the White House, California remains #1 in the U.S, in job growth, actually producing 100,00 more jobs than Texas. We are also the #1 manufacturing state and are responsible for 25% of the US gross domestic product. And California is paying down its debt, now with \$21 billion in our Rainy Day Fund.

## Education:

After having been last in the US in per pupil spending in public education, California now ranks 32nd and in 24 months should be up to 25<sup>th</sup>. In the coming years Community Colleges in the state will be tuition free. Senator McGuire also emphasized the need to put more money and planning into career training education, because a large percentage of our students do not go on to college after high school.

Talk of education led to a discussion of income inequalities in California and homelessness. 2/3 of minimum wage earners in our state are women, many women with children. \$13 an hour cannot support a family, even when a person works more than one job as many do. And so we see that women over the age of 65 and single women with children are disproportionately homeless. California is now prepared to spend \$10 billion dollars over the next few years in order to develop more affordable housing. \$1 billion will be spent this year on homelessness alone, with \$16 million coming to Sonoma County. And are there are renewed efforts to deal with the chronic homeless, many of whom suffer from substance abuse and/or mental health issues. Counties using state funds will contract with the state to provide housing units that include necessary services such as drug counseling. These facilities are having significant success in keeping the chronic homeless in decent housing and off the streets. The Palms Inn in Santa Rosa is an example of a housing facility having an amazing impact on the lives of the formally chronic homeless.

## Fires and PG&E

<u>Senator McGuire</u> took no prisoners when talking about the management of PG&E. First, the official fire season in California has now expanded to an average of 222 days, even as average temperatures in the state have increase by 2 degrees. To continue to deny that climate change is playing a huge role in our fire danger is to choose to live in some kind of strange alternative reality. Cal Fire will be adding 600 new firefighters and will continue making significant upgrades in equipment such as helicopters and air tankers.



In terms of PG&E, <u>McGuire</u> called it a dysfunctional company and demanded the resignation of the CEO and the entire Board. Some of the problems?

Lack of investment in infrastructure. Equipment is dangerous and outdated and the company is billions of dollars behind in necessary upgrades.
The PUC. He called it a company lapdog, comfortable in PG&E's pocket and unable or unwilling to oversee anything the utility does

- Climate change. 20 years ago, 15% of PG&E equipment was in a fire zone. Today, 50% is located in fire zones. And the utility seems unable to respond.

<u>Senator McGuire</u> insists that executive pay be tied to safety and a safety plan must be implemented that holds the company responsible and accountable. The company must be required to set aside reserves for

crucial maintenance. When a bankruptcy agreement is reached this spring, again the CEO and Board must go. The company should be given three years to make safety improvements in fire zones. The company is \$60 billion in debt and the situation is worse than it looks. If necessary, the State of California can take it over or find some entity to do just that. Whew! That was a lot in a short period of time.



With another successful meeting down, Keller brought the hammer down at 1:30pm sharp.

### FUTURE PROGRAMS

#### February 21st: Kristen Madsen of Creative Sonoma

Kristin Madsen, Dir. of Creative Sonoma, a department of the Sonoma County Economic Development Board, will present an overview of the place of arts in the economy of Sonoma County. The purpose of the Creative Sonoma department is to help the arts community in Sonoma County by developing the skills of all creative people in Sonoma County to enhance the value of the work they provide. Creative Sonoma is helping to foster new ways of presenting artwork to the community, both for the economic enhancement of the artists involved, as well as to the general exposure the public to works of art.

## February 28th: Better Angels

Better Angels is a national citizens' movement to reduce political polarization in the United States by bringing liberals and conservatives together to understand each other beyond stereotypes, forming red/blue community alliances, teaching practical skills for communicating across political differences, and making a strong public argument for depolarization. Instead of asking people to change their minds about key issues, they give all Americans a chance to better understand each other, to absorb the values and experiences that inform our political philosophies, and to ultimately recognize our common humanity. If feelings about our political adversaries can be represented on a spectrum, our objective is to move Americans from Hatred to Respect & Appreciation.
