



## Sebastopol Rotary Coronavirus Relief update as of May 1, 2020



Pass the hat for *Trends Catering* "bonus gratuity" has reached \$1930. <u>Susan</u> thanked Rotarians and said she will divide it up with the kitchen staff and the Rotary meeting service staff.

The pass the hat for "Feed the Frontline", AKA Project Mario, has reached \$3,965! \$20 gift certificates for takeout meals at Mexico Lindo are being passed out to front line workers around the west county. Kudos to **Gail Gijzen** for spearheading this project!

## Community Crisis/COVID-19 Support Committee

The Community Crisis/COVID 19 Support Committee is making swift progress helping locals. The committee has allocated \$25,000 to several worth while causes. The committee originally allocated \$20,000 to:


\$15,000 to the Sebastopol Chamber of Commerce for grants of \$500, \$1,000, and \$2,000 for small businesses for crisis response.

\$2,500 to West County Community Services for COVID 19 testing, food, sanitation, and health support for seniors, shutins, and homeless.

\$2,500 to Ceres Project for meals for fragile community members. Their need has increased from 1,300 to 2,500 meals per week.

Last week, the committee allocated an additional \$5,000, including an additional \$2,500 to the Sebastopol Chamber of Commerce grants, and \$2,500 to the Graton Day Labor Center for direct grants of \$200 for 200 unemployed undocumented workers/families (they've raised \$15K towards their \$40K goal).

Major thanks to the Community Crisis/COVID 19 Committee members: **Jack Blasco**, **Richard Power**, **Aleia Coate**, and **Gene Nelson**. And, thanks to you for donating! As of May 1<sup>st</sup>, our club members have donated \$1,930 to Trends gratuity, \$3,965 for Feed the Frontline, \$1,450 for Community Crisis, and \$1,525 to our foundation. Larry and Gerry Reilly-Ford had their anniversary at home sheltering in place. He said they worked on his plane and did yardwork. He also said his yard is now beautiful.







**Keller** passed the screen over to our speaker, <u>Dick Anderson</u>, who spoke about an amazing literacy project in Guatemala. The program was started in 1997 by two young men from Ohio who wanted to be in service. They chose to start the Guatemala textbook program. Guatemala is one of the poorest and uneducated/illiterate countries in the Americas. They worked with two Rotary clubs in America, and one in Guatemala. Dick, and his wife (also a Rotarian), became involved in 2000. They decided to make it their life's work.

Since then, over 608 Rotary clubs in 8 countries and 80 districts have been involved at one time or another. Annually, over 100 Rotary clubs worldwide work on the project. They are a worldwide GLP family. They also partnered with a nonprofit in Guatemala to administer the program. There has been 207 textbook projects involving 54,000 students. There are also 50 computer centers. These projects take place in the Guatemalan mountains, not in the cities. It's a challenge to get other local clubs in Guatemala, because of potential kidnappings. Guatemala is twenty years out of a civil war, and most local Rotarians are high level figures.

<u>Dick</u> pointed out than one third of the indigenous Guatemalans cannot read or write. The textbooks cover math, science, social studies and Spanish. The textbooks cost \$1.50 a month, and are paid by the parents. The program is financially self-sustaining, and the books are replaced every five years. Additionally, the group hands out sports equipment to the schools. During the annual visits, the visiting Rotarians will play soccer with the local kids.

The computer centers are for grades 7-9, and give each student 90 minutes each week with an instructor. This is also fee based to replace computer equipment every seven years. It is also financially self-sustaining. The SPARK READING PROGRAM is for elementary school children to pre-learn for the textbook program. The RISE PROGRAM is for the very poor children who show promise. Teachers recognize very poor students who need financial help. The program provides financial support for these students to stay in school. The students who participate in this program have an 80% high school graduation rate compared to the 95% dropout rate for non-RISE students.

This is not a Rotary International program. It is a District program run at Club level. Currently there are 160 Rotary Clubs in 30 Districts around the world who are participating. <u>Dick</u> is looking for more Clubs to participate.



After a wonderful meeting, **Keller** rang the substitute Roto-Bell at 1:30PM sharp. If you need some vegetable starters, **Harry Simms** can help. There are several varietals in his driveway. Give him a call if you are in interested. Additionally, local farmers through the FEED Sonoma program are offering organic vegetable boxes.
