




Snoopy and Woodstock on the dog house welcomed today's Rotarians. Our wonderful sponsors of Sebastopol Rotary appeared on the screen.

THE PROGRAM



A conversation on domestic violence presented by Stephen Zollman, Program Chair. Bob Boyd introduced the first speaker, Judge Jim Bertoli, head of Sonoma County Domestic Court. Judge Bertoli explained that he set the domestic violence calendar for the County. He also said he was a singer in a country bank, "Courting Disaster". He is also an Analy High graduate.


Judge Bertoli explained that domestic violence is handled in the court system in two different cases: criminal and civil. Judge Bertoli takes care of the civil end. The family law division can issue restraining orders that can include children, new boyfriend, parents, in-laws and anyone else connected to the case. He can issue an immediate three weeks temporary restraining order.



This includes orders giving exclusive use of property – home and autos. Also includes surrender of firearms, child custody and no visitation.

There has been and increase in cases in 2019. There were 318 applications for restraining orders in 2018. As of October 31 of this year, there have been 567 applications. He said that part of the reason was the 2017 fires and the after affects. But he also said the other reason was a lack of civil discourse over the last two years in the entire nation. People have been given to be violent in the current climate.

Four out of 5 victims are women. Of those applying for protection, 9 out of 10 are women. There is a specialty court for criminal complaints. They handle cases that are part of a guilty plea. This is a three year supervised by the court







Madeleine Keegan O'Connell, Executive Director of the YWCA was the second speaker. She showed a video of a mother with three children who ended up at the YWCA safe house, which has 32 beds. The mother was a victim of physical violence from the father of her children. She used the services of the YWCA for victims of domestic violence. With therapy and counseling for her and her children, and help from Burbank Housing who provides rental help for victims of domestic violence, and help from the Sonoma County courts, she has a safe place for her and her children.

Safety is the #1 concern at the YWCA. During the evacuations in October, all 32 residents of the safe house were evacuated and returned. The YWCA now also includes safety training on evacuating including what to put in a go bag. After

the evacuation, the hot lines were lit up 24/7. The hotline number is 707-546-1234. Domestic violence happens in all classes.

NOVEMBER 22, 2019: David Still, Comprehensive Immigration Reform. A History Lesson

Some say we need Comprehensive Immigration Reform. Some say we don't. Some have no idea what Comprehensive Immigration Reform is. And most people don't realize that we did this once before. Yes, in 1986 the Immigration Reform and Control Act (IRCA) became law. It was a well thought out compromise package that was negotiated by both parties and signed by President Ronald Reagan. The perceived problems were the same then as now – the solutions considered "a balanced approach." So what went wrong?

David Still was head of the adjudications division of the San Francisco INS District in 1986 and was right in the middle of all of it. He will give a history lesson about the valiant attempt to fix a problem and why it went off the rails.

The DV panel on Nov 15th will feature a sitting domestic violence judge and Analy graduate, Judge Bertoli and the YWCA exec director, who has spoken to the club previously. One of the \$1K level sponsorships is earmarked for a specific program. The remainder are sponsoring our general quality programs. We have a couple of other potential sponsors pending. We have committed areas of recognition to our sponsors, & we look forward to enjoying our partnerships with them this year.

SUPER PLAYGROUND PROJECT (**Keller McDonald**, Chair) – Our tamale sale fundraiser with Sebastopol Sunrise is coming to a close. We have about 600 tamales still to sell as frozen 3-packs at various locations around town. We've raised over \$25,000 and will be working with Sebastopol Sunrise on a plan to reach our goal of \$30,000. We'll be looking for hands-on volunteers this spring and working closely with City of Sebastopol staff to disassemble the existing structure and install new borders, bark and landscaping after the new play structure is installed.

TROPICAL ESCAPE FALL FUNDRAISER (**Mia Del Prete**, Event General Chair) – The Fundraiser Committee has been meeting regularly in preparation of the upcoming Fundraiser. The Live Auction Committee has put together an amazing and some new Live Auction Items. The Silent Auction Committee is working hard to gather items for Silent Auction which will include some new items. There will be five specialty wine tables for only \$150/person. Winery representative will provide the wine and provide a special experience for the guests. Anyone interested will need to sign up for the table asap, as they are going fast. This year we will have entertainment by Taimalietane Islands of Polynesia. The Committee will be meeting again on September 30 to work on the remaining details.

COOL KIDS CAMP (**Robin Maybury**, Chair) – Karen Daniels, Steve Beck, Tom Boag and Robin Maybury attended the Cloverleaf Ranch Open House on 04Oct19.

District 5130 sent 31 kids to camp this (2019) year.

Analy, unfortunately, has none so far. The previous Analy Career Center/Scholarship Counselor recently left and has been replaced by Paula Bush – who transferred from another district role but has had some OOA experience. The present teachers' strike at all three schools is causing us a lot of concern and means that we will probably have to adjust the schedule for obtaining applications, reviewing them, and choosing the participants. As soon as the strike is over, **David Schreibman** and **Tom Boag** will see the new Analy HS Principal, Shauna Ferdinandson in order to reach out to all school teachers.

YOUTH EXCHANGE (Aleia Coate, Jackie Moreira, Katy Spyrka, Co-Chairs) – Nothing to report since last month.

LEARN WITH ME (**Linda Irving**, Chair) - Each week there are 24 tutors, working 30.5 tutoring hours, serving 51 students 1-to-1, by working with small groups in a kindergarten and a 3rd/4th grade classroom. There are three Rotarian associates including current (**Lu Frazier**), former (**Bill Cole**, M.D.), and a spouse (<u>Susan, wife of Dewey Watson</u>, Sunrise member) The three tutors volunteer 2x each week. Most tutors work 1-on-1 with the same 2 or 3 students, weekly, throughout the year. 2 tutors assist 3 hours per week in classrooms. At teachers' direction they run small groups and tutor students. Division of students:

Grade Level K 1st 2nd 3rd 4th # Students 11 9 9 11 11

All 12 teachers participate in Rotary's LWM tutoring, and the teachers select program focus for each student. Tutors are matched with students based on skills, interests and schedules. Primary focus of sessions are: Early Literacy (19 students), Reading Practice & Language Arts Assignments (19 students), Math support (2 students), and Mixed: LA/Math Assignments (11 students).
