FOUNDATION MONTH





Past President Larry reminded us that November is Rotary Foundation Month. Our club goal for the month is \$32K for the Foundation and an additional \$10K for Polio Plus. Which brings us back to the bicycles. Bob Rogers has set a goal of riding 104 miles on the stationary bike this month – the length of a Polio Plus ride in Arizona he was not able to attend. He invites us to support him with our gifts to Polio Plus. And on this day, other members of the club were invited to join him on the bikes...which several did throughout our meeting.

A video was then shown – "Why Zero Matters" – which highlighted the phenomenal success of Rotary's Polio Plus campaign – 2.5 billion children protected against polio! A 99.9% reduction in polio cases around the world. This is the largest such effort in history. Following the video, **Bob** announced that the last case of polio reported in Nigeria was August, 2016. That country will soon be proclaimed polio free.



David Schreibman then came forward for some special *Paul Harris* recognitions. He shared some Foundation history: began in 1917 with a gift of \$26.50; first grant of \$500 in 1930 to the organization that become the Easter Seals; since its inception the Foundation has spent more than \$34 billion on life-changing, sustainable

projects that have changed lives and it has consistently been rated amongst the top charities of the world. **David** then recognized **Paul Yeomans** who has now reached the level of *Paul Harris* Fellow +4 and **Pam Graber** – *Paul Harris* +2. **Harry Simms** – *Paul Harris* +3 – will be recognized at a later date.





Hal Kwalwasser reported that interviews for applicants for the North Bay Construction Corps will begin the first week of December. 

Larry, still mourning the loss of ladderball – rather like mourning the loss of hair lice – announced the drawing. Winning ticket was held by Bicycle **Bob Rogers**. He reached in and what did he find? The bolo balls from ladderball! Boy, some guys just can't let go. Winnings were donated to Polio Plus. Balls immediately destroyed by Sergeant at Arms.









Our own **David Still** presented today's program. He began with the U.S. Immigration Service in 1977, eventually becoming District Director for the San Francisco District. He retired 12 years ago. Of course, the Immigration Service no longer exists, having become part of the Department of Homeland Security. The last significant effort at immigration reform, assuming children in wire enclosures does not count as reform, was in

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In that year, three problems related to immigration were identified:

- #1: too many people entering the country illegally
- #2: too many people working without proper documentation
- #3: too many people living in the U.S. long term without proper documentation.

In that year, in an effort to address these issues, the Immigration Reform and Control Act was passed and signed by President Reagan. It sought to address the three identified problems with

these measures:

- #1: Double the size of the border Patrol from 3000- to 6000.
- #2: Employers were required to check documents, then sign an I-9 form saying their workers were legal.
- #3: People could stay and apply for legalization if they met certain conditions: they had to have lived in the U.S. at least 4 years, they had a clean record, and they needed to learn U.S. history and government.

This all sounded good, but the words and music did not quite match. For example:

- #1: No money was appropriated to hire additional Border Patrol officers. The extra 3000 never happened.
- #2: Employers were presented with a blizzard of differing documents, and had no way of knowing if they were genuine or phony. There was little enforcement, so the law depended on voluntary compliance. For many it was easier just to sign the I-9 form and be done with it. Too much paperwork.
- #3: Adjustments were made to the law allowing anyone who had worked in agriculture for 90 ways to apply for legalization. Thus people from urban areas were showing up with paperwork saying they worked in agriculture. The program was meant to last for a year, but when the year expired there were thousands of unresolved cases. Eventually, a decision was made to grant them all legalization.

In 1986 the IRCA law was passed with good intentions, but it seems real reform never had a chance. It is anyone's guess what might happen next. Oh yes, the Border Patrol now numbers 12,000 agents.



With that, our meeting was adjourned. Thanks **David**, for an extremely interesting and timely program.
