A workshop designed exclusively for them is convened prior to the Friday Rotary Club meeting. It is usually far more valuable and can be more significant than mere money. Faced with pandemic restrictions, it was hard to imagine the usual magical interactions occurring while sitting in separate homes. But our desire to give these amazing students what they deserve drove us to find a way.

Three leaders of our community each shared openly the challenges and hardships that they faced in their personal journey of success. After each speaker's talk, we asked each student for their feedback on what had impact on them. When the students were done, others in the meeting offered their thoughts as well.

These winners quickly realized they are not alone in their personal struggles and that virtually everyone has their own story of hardship. They learned valuable life philosophies and much heartfelt wisdom in a safe, supportive environment.

The event is always emotional and thought-provoking. It's not uncommon for our speakers to share things they haven't spoken of in decades. This year's leaders were <u>Efren Carrillo</u>, **Dorothy Rodella**, and **Aleia Coate**. All three share a deep devotion to helping these special young adults who all also want to help others.

Ellie Bengs was our first speaker and after thanking the Club for the scholarship, she noted that young children learn skills. Ellie had to learn the unusual skill of relocating dislocated joints. It became clear around the 7th grade that she had a condition that caused her joints to easily dislocate. Not ideal for a young person who loves gymnastics. Her parents helped her to learn about physical limitations and engaged physical therapists to assist. Ellie was a good student and a quick learner. She powered through the tedious physical therapy sessions and exercises.

Today she loves hiking, basketball and badminton. With her outstanding GPA and this scholarship, she plans to attend either Cal Poly SLO (Go Mustangs) or UC Davis. She would like to study physical therapy with an eye on helping others as she was helped.



Jashai Limu-Houston



<u>Jashai Limu-Houston</u> is a senior at Laguna High School. Her obstacles began before she was born. Her mother developed a serious illness during pregnancy. <u>Jashai</u> got here anyway and has been working toward success ever since. Her first memory is of medications and illness. Her father was unfortunately absent while she was growing up. She helped her mother with her younger sister and resolved to succeed as a model for her.

She will graduate in 2021 and hopes to attend Santa Rosa Junior College. Her first love is art and she would love to study it academically either as a graphic or fine artist. Her dream would be to attend the Academy of Art College in San Francisco.



Draven Molinaro



<u>Draven Molinaro's</u> obstacles also showed up early. He was diagnosed with ADHD at a young age but with the help of teachers and family he fought through it. As a young teenager, his family home burned down in the Tubbs Fire. While this would knock down almost anyone, Draven persisted. Another knock down came when one of his best friends passed away from cancer. <u>Draven</u> has always loved cars. His father and grandfather instructed him on the fine points of automobiles since a young age. <u>Draven</u> felt another shock when his beloved grandfather passed away in the same year as his friend. He said that he developed coping skills "through cars".

They are his true love and he plans to study auto engineering at Universal Technical Institute in San Diego.



Isabella "Bella" Realini



<u>Bella Realini's</u> path has not been an easy one. Her parents divorce when she was in the 3rd grade led to many years of instability and change. She tried living with her mother, father, grandparents, and siblings, none of which provided stability. She tried couch surfing and once moved to Texas on her own to live with a sister. The result was attending ten schools between the ages of 10 and 18 including five high schools in 4 years.

Today she has found the stability that everyone needs, living with her aunt and uncle. And she has turned up the success meter working several hours a week and managing a 4.0 GPA at El Molino High School. She plans to attend Sonoma State and wants to study social work.



Trinity Safran



<u>Trinity Safran</u> is the youngest of six siblings and has struggled in an unstable living situation. She feels that she never received the help in school that others have received because her parents were not there for her. At one point she realized that she was failing high school and was ready to give up. Enter El Molino High School teacher <u>Lana McNamara</u> who guided her to a home school program that fit her needs perfectly. Trinity did not give up – she succeeded. She realized that she is interested in construction and joined the North Bay Construction Corp this year to learn construction skills of all kinds. 
She is on track to graduate from El Molino and said she was especially grateful to Lana McNamara.

<u>Denise Whitlock</u> began by acknowledging that every teenager has some obstacles. From her story it was clear that hers were exceptional. After her father passed away when she was 8, her mother felt it best to home school her. Even though she believed she was not getting a proper education and wished to go to school, her mother persisted with home schooling. She tried living with relatives but that was unsuccessful. She was finally able to start attending school with others in the eighth grade, never attending public school from seven years old until then. She took to school in a big way and today carries a 4.0 GPA at Analy High School.

During her time as a home schooled student she always relied on the comfort of pets. Today she would like to study veterinary science. She plans to attend the University of New Orleans.



Jasz Reed-Peebles



In 2016 <u>Jasz Reed-Peebles</u> was named youth of the year at her Boys and Girls Club but she did not feel successful. <u>Jasz</u> has been burdened with caring for her siblings as long as she can remember. An unstable family life resulted in many obstacles. Jasz remembers trying to live in a house without electricity and using a flashlight for light. She has encountered the foster care system in her life. She did acknowledge the help she got from her sisters father who tried to assist. She has always felt ultimate

responsibility for her three sisters and her greatest fear was that they would be split up. That never happened through the help of family friends.

She was ultimately gratified when her sister was named youth of the year in 2019. Jasz would like to study graphic arts at SRJC.





David Schreibman introduced a few of the Club's guests to reflect on the students.

<u>Linda Ruder</u> is a guidance counselor at Analy High School. She described <u>Draven Molinaro</u> as a kind, polite and thoughtful young man. She noted that he had created a Maker Project automobile engine on a 3-D printer that was a work of art.

She characterized <u>Denise Whitlock</u> as a highly intelligent, focused and responsible young woman. She is amazing under pressure and loves learning and thinking about things.

Analy Principal Shauna Ferdinandson knows Ellie Bengs as humble and kind. She is focused on her goals and education. She is highly impressed that Ellie's hardships are leading her to want to live a life of service.





Dr. Bodley is President of the Gravenstein Health Action Coalition. The Coalition is a collaboration of local organizations, agencies and individuals working together to support policy, system and environmental change to improve health outcomes of all residents of West County Sonoma.

Dr. Bodley formerly served on the Palm Drive Health Care District, elected in 2012 to a 4 year term serving as Secretary of the board and community services liaison. She was a Professor Emeritus in the Department of Nursing at Sonoma State University fromn1975 to 2004, and served as Interim Director of the Santa Rosa Junior College ADN Program in 2003–2004.

Dr. Bodley received her B.S.N. from the University of San Francisco, her M.S.N. from California State University, San Jose, and her Ed.D. from the University of San Francisco. She lives in Sebastopol with her husband Walt Bodley.
