


**President Dan** then introduced some special visiting Rotarians:

Reflecting on the Sebastopol Rotary Club and how it has impacted his life, former President, David Schreibman, shared three Rotary memories which have impacted his life.

The Lotus Project in Vietnam. This was a project supported by our club- a project your faithful scribe was once privileged to visit with a Rotary check in hand - for a number of years. It provided life-saving open heart surgeries for children. One year, when he was working with the Analy Interact Club, the club raised funds for this project. That year the Lotus Project was able to save the lives of eight children. Rotary and Interact working together saving children's lives. It is something he has never forgotten and which inspires him still.

Overcoming Obstacles: This concept was borrowed from a club in Reno, but Sebastopol essentially redesigned it from the bottom up. David has been involved with this program since its inception in 2011, and it inspires him - and re-inspires him - every year. You all know what it is and what it has meant to our club and to the recipients. **David** recalled one of the first recipients of an Overcoming Obstacles grant – Dakota Kantala. She spoke to our club in 2017. She gave a powerful witness, not only to how the money and recognition helped her, but how meeting with other students and Rotarians, hearing their stories, truly changed her life. David feels he too has been forever changed.

Debunking: For many past-presidents, this is a moment they would rather forget, but David vividly remembers it. His extended family came, including his father, whom **David** seldom saw and who was quite ill with cancer. His father witnessed all the silliness, but also the fondness with which we remembered and honored David and his presidential year. He was quite moved by all that was said about his son. At the airport, as he was preparing to return home, he turned to David and said, "Now I can die happy." That impactful and unforgettable moment would never have happened without Sebastopol Rotary. So get out there and share Rotary. You just never know who might be impacted in a meaningful way. Thanks, David, for your sharing.

# THE PROGRAM





**Rick** Wilson introduced our speaker, Dr. Evian Gordon. <u>Dr. Gordon</u> is the founder of "Total Brain", a research effort focusing on brain wellness, mental health and memory. Today he was focusing on memory...what is it, how do we boost it, what suggestions/changes might work for us? Re-wiring our brains doesn't just happen. It requires a specific strategy which must be implemented in the moment. This is the only way to change our thinking. Don't wait. Do it right now.

It is no secret that as we age, we experience memory loss, especially short-term memory. "What was your name again?" (unfortunately you are asking your spouse!) This memory loss occurs on the outer cortex of the brain. But,

interestingly, our emotional memory and awareness in deeper parts of our brain are not affected by aging. How can we use this to our advantage?

When considering the brain and memory, it is important to remember that re-wiring one thing leads to everything. So we must focus on specific targeted things. In his groundbreaking book, "In Search of Memory", <u>Eric Kandel</u> talks about "Encoding – Storing – Retrieving." We must learn how to store and retrieve only what is relevant. So, the short-term memory in the Hippocampus needs to be filed in the long term, emotional memory in the Amygdala.

Our brain has 85 billion neurons...a huge capacity for memory. So why do we forget so much? For one thing, our short term memory only lasts 30 seconds. It must be stored and stored in the moment. We must test ourselves day in and day out to improve memory. And how so we do that? <u>Dr. Gordon</u> outlined 5 keys to testing and training memory:



- Why? We must be clear on why we want to remember something have a commitment to remembering this item.
- Readiness: We must be ready to change. It won't happen by itself.
- Capacities: We have strengths and weaknesses when it comes to memory. Which capacities need work?
- In the Moment: As has already been said. Don't delay. Switch negative to positive now!
- Track and Measure: This is a 30-day challenge as we track the stories we want to remember.

Tips for Remembering: Chunking - Association - Calm - Sleep

- Break the item you want to remember into chunks. Numbers for example 639818531. Don't try to remember it all at once. 9 numbers break it into chunks of three. Within each chunk look for patterns...639 listed in numerical order would be 369. 818 think of the 1 as bracketed by the two 8's.
- Association: Remembering faces and names can be a challenge for all of us. Let's say you are trying to remember <a href="Susan Johnson">Susan Johnson</a>. Perhaps you can make an emotional association, such as she is the one with a wonderful smile. Think of smile, think of <a href="Susan">Susan</a>. Or, try remembering her occupation. <a href="Susan">Susan</a> works in financial services. So, the first letter of her name can be associated with a dollar sign \$usan. Warm smile + \$= Susan Johnson.
- Calmness: Stress is the great derailer of memory. When caught in a situation such as meeting up with someone you know but whose name you cannot remember, instead of getting anxious, try stepping back, slowing your breathing, putting the brakes on the fight/flight system in our brains. It can make a difference.
- Sleep: Sufficient sleep is essential for improving memory. It is while sleeping that our brain consolidates our most essential memories.

Thank you, Dr. Gordon, for presenting such a "memorable" program. Now...where did I put my glasses?

## August 21, 2020: Doug Johnson, District 5130 Governor



Simply put, Doug Johnson is a Rotarian just like you and everyone else in your local club.

His story begins back in Dedham, Massachusetts, a blue-collar neighborhood next to Boston. The lessons learned growing up in working middle-class America have profoundly shaped his character and value system. People come first!

After attending American University in Washington D.C. for some time, at age 21 life brought him to Santa Rosa, California where he has resided since.

One day in 2011 on a business appointment he was asked about Rotary and shortly thereafter joined the Rotary Club of Santa Rosa and the journey began. World Community Service Chair, Club President, PETS Sgt. at Arms, Zone Institute guest, AG, and now District Governor 2020-2021.

He has been very blessed in so many ways! His three adult children all live locally as do four grandchildren. Family time together grows more meaningful every year. The oldest granddaughter, now 12, even got run a meeting of the Rotary Club of Santa Rosa when Doug served as President in 2015-2016 and wants to know when she can join Rotary! Since 1986 Doug has worked at Discovery Office Systems and plans to continue working there full time even when serving as District Governor. Discovery Office Systems provides the latest in business technology such as IT services, digital content management, print/scan solutions, VoIP telephony and more.

Besides Rotary he is active in his local church serving as Treasurer and loves both sports and travel.

Jared Huffman represents California's 2nd Congressional District which spans the North Coast of the state, from the Golden Gate Bridge to the Oregon border, and includes Marin, Sonoma, Mendocino, Humboldt, Trinity, and Del Norte counties. He was first elected to Congress in November 2012 and currently serves on the Committee on Natural Resources, the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, and the Select Committee on the Climate Crisis. In the 116th Congress, he chairs the Natural Resources Subcommittee on Water, Oceans and Wildlife, with jurisdiction over federal water projects, fisheries management, coastal zone and oceans policy, and wildlife and endangered species. Jared also founded the Congressional Freethought Caucus to promote sound public policy based on reason, science and moral values, while protecting the secular character of government and championing the value of freedom of thought worldwide.

Prior to his legislative service, Jared worked as a Senior Attorney for the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC). One of his proudest accomplishments at NRDC was helping forge an agreement to restore a 153-mile stretch of the San Joaquin River in California's Central Valley. Before NRDC, Jared was a successful public interest attorney whose victories included several major jury verdicts in gender discrimination and race discrimination trials. He also served 12 years in local government as a Director of the Marin Municipal Water District (MMWD), from 1994 to 2006. Jared represented the North Bay for six years in the California Assembly where he chaired the Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee. Among his other accomplishments as a state legislator, Jared played a leading role in crafting landmark water reforms in 2009 and authored dozens of successful bills, including California's pioneering lighting efficiency standards (AB 1109) which were subsequently adopted into federal law; the nation's largest programs for solar hot water heating (AB 1470) and paint recycling (AB 1343); reforms that improve California's State Parks system (AB 1589) and Department of Fish and Wildlife (AB 2402); and creation of a new voluntary type of corporation, California Benefit Corporations, to promote corporate social responsibility (AB 361).


