Unless you are living under a rock, we've all had a challenging week (other words come to mind, but this is a family publication). As we left our zoom meeting last Friday, we were in the grips of a historic heatwave. Later that evening, most of the West County got to experience a blast from the past, rolling blackouts. But wait, there's more! We were all awoken early Sunday morning to the constant sound of thunder, a lightning show, and strong gusty winds. A repeat performance happened midday Monday. With the storms, brought hundreds of small, lightning sparked fires. One such fire started Monday afternoon in the hills northwest of Austin Creek State Park along Wallbridge Ridge. Tuesday afternoon, gusty winds turned the small fire into a massive inferno. Since then the fire has burned over 51,000 acres (as your scribe types this), forced evacuations of all the River communities, has destroyed hundreds of homes, and is threatening Armstrong Woods, Rio Nido, Healdsburg, Dry Creek Valley, and Lake Sonoma.



The fire is now the number one priority for firefighters. CalFire brought in the massive supertanker and DC-10 to fight the fire (photos from your scribe). In addition to the Wallbridge Fire, our neighbors to the north are suffering as well. The Hennessey Fire has destroyed areas around Lake Berryessa and far northern corners of the county. It's also reached into Lake County, threatening Middletown and Hidden Valley Lake.

David and **Nan Still**, and **Hal** and **Estelle Kwalwasser**, were forced to evacuate. We're happy to report that they are okay. **Dorothy Rodella** and **Rollie Atkinson** are in the warning zones. If you need any help, please reach out to Dan, or any of the board members. We all have your backs, and are here for you. **Yvette Williams van Aggelen** recently has serious health issues, and was hospitalized. She is now recovering at home. As you heard in the After the Bell section last week, Larry Dilley, son of **Tom** and **Pat Dilley**, passed away last Saturday. 

🍎 **KEEPING GIRLS IN SCHOOL** 🍎

Frank Mayhew stepped up to the lectern to give us an update on the "Keeping Girls in School" program in Uganda. He started with a beautiful video showing the greeting **Frank** and **Kathie** received from the students at Kaira Primary School. Even **Kathie** joined in the dancing! Years ago, our club offered a grant to Frank and Kathie's project. Its mission was to keep girls in Uganda from dropping out of school. The local Rotary Club was reluctant to help, since we were a small club. This did not stop their mission. The project has helped rebuild and modernize classroom facilities, install proper bathrooms, wash stations, water facilities (solar powered well and tank), and most importantly, changing rooms for the girls. They taught students how to wash their hands, make reusable menstrual pads for the girls, and taught staff how to maintain the toilets and the septic system.

Frank stressed how this project emphasizes the opportunities and possibilities Rotary delivers, and the power of Rotary. With an \$18,000 contribution from our club, the project leveraged financial support from district grants, other clubs in the district, bringing over \$122,000 for this project. The project may not be 100% complete, but the results are stunning. In 2015, 71% of girls, and 56% of boys dropped out. In 2019, the dropout rate dramatically decreased to only 15% of girls, and 11% of boys. They are now working on supplying books for the students, and training for the teachers. Goes to show the power of Rotary.

THE PROGRAM



Jack Blasco introduced our guest speaker, Rotary District 5130 Governor, Doug Johnson. Doug started by stressing how in challenging times, Rotary is incredibly relevant, and needed more than ever. He explained how most of the clubs are now zooming, and commended our club for leading the way with hybrid meetings. He then went on to recall his experience at the International District Governor training in San Diego earlier this year. Over 530 District Governors from around the world gathered to learn their duties, and network with District Governors from all over the world. It was there where Rotary International Incoming President Holger Knaack unveiled the theme for 2020: Rotary Opens Opportunities. He likened the experience to the Oscars, lots of anticipation and fanfare. The message from President Knaack stressed the need for Rotary to change and evolve, and this was before the COVID-19 pandemic.

Since the pandemic began, Rotary has changed, has pivoted, and responded to the necessary changes to adapt to the new COVID-19 world we live in. Rotary has gone through so much in its existence, and each time, Rotary always came out stronger. Doug recalled a quote from the Apollo 13 mission: "Don't tell me what's not working, tell me what's working." During these times, there's so much that is working in Rotary. While some clubs remain unsure about the future, our club is a shining example of what is working. There are many opportunities for Rotary during these times, and many opportunities for people to step up, and be a part of the change.

Doug spoke about a mission that District 5130 is focusing on, ethics. After all, ethics is apart of the Rotary DNA. He announced that at his District Conference, October 8-9, 2021 at the Doubletree Hotel in Rohnert Park, there will be an Ethics in Business Luncheon open to the public. The luncheon will award businesses with high ethical standards, and will feature a high-profile speaker. He sees this as a great way to showcase Rotary to the business community, and how ethics are at the core of our organization. Doug is working with a team to launch this program, which is modeled after a similar program run by the Rotary Club of Portland, OR.

FUTURE PROGRAMS

August 28, 2020: Mary Carouba, Women at Ground Zero



A popular speaker and performer who shines a light on professional, personal and social issues, Mary is a gifted storyteller who inspires and entertains. Using real-life, poignant examples of ordinary people doing extraordinary things, Mary vividly demonstrates to audience members the possibilities for their own lives. Infusing even the most serious subject matter with humor is a hallmark of Mary's work. Mary's background as a stand-up comic, investigative social worker and prison consultant also adds richness and depth to her presentations and performances. Event coordinators often remark that they have never had a speaker as popular with their groups, and audience members respond enthusiastically to Mary's powerful message that anything is possible when individuals act with passion and urgency on their goals and dreams.

Mary is the co-author of the critically acclaimed *Women at Ground Zero: Stories of Courage and Compassion*, a book that honors the women heroes of 9/11. The challenging process of finding the women heroes and giving voice to their powerful and moving stories was Mary's own "ground zero," and the lessons she learned about taking risks, moving forward in the face of fear, and overcoming seemingly impossible odds became the cornerstone for a powerful series of inspirational presentations. Mary delivers her popular presentations to corporate groups, first-responders, universities and colleges, non-profit organizations and community groups. She also performs on international cruises. Mary is currently working on a book and a one-woman play, "Life, Death, and Other Comedies."

September 4, 2020: Congressman Jared Huffman



Jared Huffman represents California's 2nd Congressional District which spans the North Coast of the state, from the Golden Gate Bridge to the Oregon border, and includes Marin, Sonoma, Mendocino, Humboldt, Trinity, and Del Norte counties. He was first elected to Congress in November 2012 and currently serves on the Committee on Natural Resources, the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, and the Select Committee on the Climate Crisis. In the 116th Congress, he chairs the Natural Resources Subcommittee on Water, Oceans and Wildlife, with jurisdiction over federal water projects, fisheries management, coastal zone and oceans policy, and wildlife and endangered species. Jared also founded the Congressional Freethought Caucus to promote sound public policy based on reason, science and moral values, while protecting the secular character of government and championing the value of freedom of thought worldwide.

Prior to his legislative service, Jared worked as a Senior Attorney for the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC). One of his proudest accomplishments at NRDC was helping forge an agreement to restore a 153-mile stretch of the San Joaquin River in California's Central Valley. Before NRDC, Jared was a successful public interest attorney whose victories included several major jury verdicts in gender discrimination and race discrimination trials. He also served 12 years in local government as a Director of the Marin Municipal Water District (MMWD), from 1994 to 2006. Jared represented the North Bay for six years in the California Assembly where he chaired the Water, Parks and Wildlife Committee. Among his other accomplishments as a state legislator, Jared played a leading role in crafting landmark water reforms in 2009 and authored dozens of successful bills, including California's pioneering lighting efficiency standards (AB 1109) which were subsequently adopted into federal law; the nation's largest programs for solar hot water heating (AB 1470) and paint recycling (AB 1343); reforms that improve California's State Parks system (AB 1589) and Department of Fish and Wildlife (AB 2402); and creation of a new voluntary type of corporation, California Benefit Corporations, to promote corporate social responsibility (AB 361)
