Harry Polley was inducted on January 9, 1970, 51 years ago. He has badge #1. **President Dan** presented some photos of life and Rotary in 1970. Great pictures of Sebastopol and Harry and Rotary friends over the years.



Loved the tattoos on **Dave Madsen, Gene Nelson, Norm Stupfel and Harry. Harry** reflected on his 51 years in Rotary and how much it was a big part of his life. He developed deep friendships and a drive to help others through Rotary.



He sponsored somewhere between 30-35 members over the years. Membership is a big part of Rotary. He was part of Sebastopol Rotary's first International Project along with the Crab Feed and Teacher mini grants. He loves the debunkings. He thanked Rotary for being in his life and asked that we go out and recruit new members.





<u>Elizabeth Gore</u> serves as President and Chairwoman of the Board for HelloAlice, the first-ever artificial intelligence platform for business owners. As a social enterprise, HelloAlice is open to all entrepreneurs and prioritizes services for women, minorities and veterans.

<u>Elizabeth</u> lives on a farm north of Healdsburg. She worked for the peace corps in Bolivia, and for the UN for ten years as entrepreneur-in-residence. She is also the emeritus Chair of the United Nations Foundation's Global Entrepreneurs Council.

HelloAlice (as in *Alice-in-Wonderland*) is a platform powered by Al technology which helps small business owners find funding, network and services. There are over 300,000 companies and growing. The platform tracks data and trends to increase owner success rate.



HelloAlice is also hosting the COVID19 Small Business Resource Center to help in the pandemic.

<u>Elizabeth</u> studied cattle in college in Texas. She is now running a tech company and married to <u>James Gore</u>, Sonoma County Supervisor. After working for the Peace Corps<u>, Elizabeth</u> returned to the US to find that it was very hard to start a small business. She then went to work for Dell Technologies as entrepreneur-in residence and worked to support Dell's goals of helping small and medium businesses grow.

Hello Alice uses machine learning to mine information for the over 350,000 businesses to use to intelligently grow their businesses. The Covid19 Business Center helps business mine government and private funds.



<u>Elizabeth</u> talked about local data. She said 70% of business owners think it will be better in the second half of 2021. Many are planning to rehire. 60% of the restaurants are decimated. The Covid19 Center helps business "close with dignity" and helps them keep their credit ok for future endeavors. E-Commerce has sustained and grown. The hardest hit in the Hispanic community is the hardest hit, women even more. Veterans are also hard hit because of lack of credit history so they could not get PPE or PPP.

Hello Alice gathers data trends and sells the information to companies like Salesforce and QuickBooks. They are a venture backed company who plans on selling after they reach 1,000,000 customers. They will have reached their personal capacity by then and a much larger company will be needed.

Dear Friend of Sebastopol Rotary,

There will be no Sebastopol Rotary Crab Feed this year. The Corona virus has done us in.

The problem is that the reason we put on the Crab Feed has not gone away. In fact, it is more urgent than ever. All the money we raise from our diners at the Crab Feed supports the Mark Sell Teacher Grants program. Just to refresh your recollection, our teacher grants go to teachers from any school in West County who have a terrific idea to improve teaching that cannot be funded from the school budget. The maximum grant is \$500, but it adds up. Over the nineteen-year life of our program, we have given out over \$313,000 in almost 1000 individual grants.

Our grants are needed in the age of COVID more than ever. Distance learning is not easy. Sally Briggs, who teaches art at Apple Blossom School, illustrates the ongoing financial difficulties teachers are facing. Before, all she needed were enough supplies for one art classroom. Now, she needs to make sure every child has supplies at home, which means 408 pairs of scissors, 408 brushes.... You get the idea.

On behalf of the teachers and students in West County, we ask for your help. Give us a hand in making sure that the teacher grants can continue to support great learning for our kids. Please stand with your community.

So, what's a crab dinner worth when there is no crab? Here is what we suggest: The Crab Feed traditionally allows us to put about \$70 per couple toward our teacher grants. Could you dig down and give us that level of support, even if the meal is a bit "slim" this year? Or maybe you could think bigger. Perhaps you could find \$200, which would likely be enough for a great grant all on its own? We want to help with that. The giver of the largest donation will receive three bottles of Sonoma County pinot noir (Kosta-Browne, Williams-Selyem, and Martinelli) worth nearly \$300, and anyone who gives more than \$70 will be eligible for a drawing where the winner will receive three bottles (two bottles of Sonoma County pinot noir [Freeman and Lynmarl and a bottle of Iron Horse sparkling rose) worth nearly \$200.

And remember all donations, which go to the Sebastopol Rotary Club Foundation are taxdeductible under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3).

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION (Lu Frazier, Chair) – No report. <u>Committee Interest</u>: Steve Beck, Frank Mayhew

WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE (**Bob Rogers**, Chair) – The WCS committee met on Friday, December 8th to consider which projects, if any, to support with the \$10,000 allocated to us by the Sebastopol Rotary Club Board. Working with the District 5130's International Committee Chair, <u>Barb Spangler</u>, 3 projects were chosen to consider, in addition to a 4th project presented to us by our sister club, Puerto Vallarta South.

After much discussion, two projects were chosen to support.

 St. Helena Rotary's Global Grant Zimbabwe Water Project – Areas of focus are Water and Sanitation and Economic and Community Development. The <u>Rotary</u> <u>Club of Harare</u> is the Host Club, who conducted the TRF required Community Assessment, which involved about 20 multi-aged individuals from the 2 villages of 2,200 inhabitants this project will support. As a result, they will be drilling two wells and installing two 5,000-gallon elevated storage tanks, which will distribute the water by gravity to each village.





The system will be sustained by the selling of fruits and vegetables in the Hararte market, about 50 miles away. The water from the wells will make the fruit and vegetable gardens possible. Cost of the project is estimated to be \$80,000, with a cash contribution from Rotary Clubs of approximately \$23,000 to qualify for the Global Grant. The WCS Committee voted to recommend to Sebastopol Rotary's Board a contribution of \$2,500 in support of this project. We request an approval at tonight's Board Meeting, as time is of the essence in getting the application submitted to TRF.

- 2) Puerto Vallarta South's Eye Surgery Program A member of the PV South Club is Dr. Jaime Miramontes, an ophthalmologist who performs corrective eye surgery on children with congenital cataracts and strabismus (cross eyedness) on a pro bono basis. He has negotiated with the local hospital a cost of \$700 to \$1,000 per surgery for the use of their facilities. There is a continual need for funding for these corrective eye surgeries for low income families and the waiting list is growing. Due to the COVID pandemic, the club has not been able to hold its annual fund-raising event which provided much of the funding for this eye surgery program. The WCS Committee voted to recommend to Sebastopol Rotary's Board a contribution of \$6,000 in support of this program. We request approval at tonight's Board Meeting, if possible.
- 3) The Committee has decided to hold the remaining \$1,500 in reserve for the time being.
