






Sebastopol Rotary was fortunate to have five Rotarians from the Rotary Club in Kirksville Missouri zoom into our meeting.



RINGING OF THE PEACE BELL: There will be q ringing of the Peace Bells on August 5th starting at 4:15pm in Hiroshima Japan and on August 8th at 7:02 in Nagasaki Japan to mark the 75th anniversary of the event. Jim Passage spoke and reminded us that it was just 75 years ago that United States dropped atomic bombs on these two cities. He said that there is no doubt that we have seen pictures of the devastation and that we know that hundreds of thousands of people died instantly or on the following days and weeks. He reminded us that Takeo Japan is our sister city. To mark this date in an appropriate manner in a time of "shelter in place" Sister Cities International has proposed a bell ringing event. People in Sister Cities across Japan and across the United States will


be ringing bells. Bells may be rung in a front yard, in a driveway, on a hill top, in a field or orchard, public space—where ever convenient and in keeping with good health precautions. Jim said that he will be ringing a bell in his front driveway near his new Peace Pole.

Bells will be rung for 75 seconds or will ring for 75 peels whichever is most appropriate for the size of the bell. Bells will be rung in Japan and the United States at exactly the same time, exactly 75 years after impact.



Dee is a trainer with California Grand Jury Association (<u>www.cgia.org</u>) traveling throughout the state training new civil grand jurors. She served on the Sonoma County Civil Grand Jury from July 2017-2018 term and as a Foreperson during the 2018-2019 term. In 2017-2018 term she was Chairperson of Cities and Special Districts Committee s and active on the Editorial Committee. Dee was born and raised in New York and moved to San Francisco North Bay Area with her husband and two children in 1980.


Dee explained the Civil Grand Jury in Sonoma County which is funded by Sonoma Country. It is



affiliated with the court system and consists of citizen-volunteers. These Grand Jurors choose an issue or a topic amongst themselves and have the power to investigate. They generally choose local government agencies to look into and ask questions about. Surely the local bureaucrats are often unhappy to see them coming as it means they have to answer lots of questions about their policies and procedures.

Some recent investigations have included the Coroners office, zoning laws, and other government entities. The Civil Grand Jury completes its investigation and issues a report of findings for the public to review. The agency being reviewed must make a written response for the public to review as well.

Several Sebastopol Rotarians have served on the Civil Grand Jury including Pam Graber, Ellen Harrington and Henry Alker.

July 31: Keller McDonald, Sonoma County Swifts - Now you see them, now you don't!



Keller McDonald has been a Rotarian for nearly 35 years, but he has been a birder even longer. Keller started birding on a family camping trip to the Sierras when he was 12. His excitement at seeing his first Western Tanager prompted his dad to buy him a bird book and loan him the family's binoculars ... and he was hooked for life! Bird Study was the first merit badge he earned as a Boy Scout. In college, he took every bird-related class offered at UC Davis. He married a birder, and together they have traveled with binoculars and bird guides to birding spots across North, Central and South America; Scotland; Israel; and Japan. Keller says, "Birding, like Rotary, is something you can do every day wherever you are, anytime - day or night!" Keller has identified over 700 of North America's 914 bird species. His kids know his birding bent makes him a little strange, but they've learned to live with it. Keller will share the mysteries of the Vaux's Swift – one of Sonoma County's special winged treasures.
