

We have a potential politician in our family. Our own Diana Rich is running for Sebastopol City Council. She told us how this experience has given her so many opportunities to connect and interact with people. The work she is putting into her campaign is keeping her away from the news, which Diana appreciates! .



**Rick Wilson** introduced our speaker today. Someone who is not a stranger to our club, and not a stranger to the community, State Senator, and member of the Rotary Club of Healdsburg, <u>Mike McGuire</u>. The Senator started with an overview of the wildfire situation. So far this fire season, over three million acres have burned. The August Complex, burning in the Mendocino National Forest is now over 700,000 acres, making it the largest wildfire in California history. It continues to burn west into Mendocino and Humboldt Counties. Almost 90% of the Mendocino National Forest has been scared by wildfires in the past two years. There's also concern for Del Norte County, as the Slater Fire continues to burn west towards the coast. Mike noted that almost all fire resources in California are



committed to the wildfires. The state continues to strengthen the reach of Cal Fire, through hiring new and seasonal fire fighters, and the purchase of new Blackhawk and C-130 planes, both re-purposed for fire suppression.

<u>Senator McGuire</u> moved onto the economy and the state budget. The state, along with other states, now has a substantial budget deficit. However, the picture is not as bleak in California. The state tapped into its rainy-day fund to bridge the budget divide. Thankfully, 55% of the reserve is still in the bank. Sales taxes of online purchases is also softening the impact, both at the state and local levels. The state is still dealing with massive unemployment (currently at 3.7 million). The state recently gave schools \$5.3 billion to help upgrade internet infrastructure, provide wireless hot spots, and computers and tablets to students. Cal Fire also received a budget increase of \$75 million.

The senator moved onto the state's response to the Coronavirus. California is starting to see a big decrease in the spread of COVID-19. Hospitalization and ICU numbers are also decreasing. The state is working to make test results available in 48 hours or less. They are working with public and private laboratories statewide to make this happen. They're also working on making rapid testing available at schools for students and faculty. States, including California, are working together to bulk purchase PPE supplies. The state is in this for the long haul, and for good reason. According to the University of California, a vaccine will not be available until the second quarter of 2021. However, the chance of a drug cocktail, which would mitigate COVID-19 symptoms, could be available by the end of the year. Do not expect life to return to normal until the end of 2021.

<u>Senator McGuire</u> touched on PG&E. While he stated there have been some improvements, the Senator noted that these improvements only took place because of enforcement actions by the state. He has doubts about PG&E's long term plans. The Senator mentioned that plans for curbside dining on Main Street are in the works. The city is working with CalTrans to allow for some restaurants to move out onto the street; a move other cities across the area are doing. He concluded with a discussion on law enforcement reforms. <u>Senator McGuire</u> reported that Assembly Bill 1506, requiring the State Department of Justice to investigate every officer involved shooting, is awaiting the Governor's signature. The state also banned the use of choke holds. A bill banning the use tear gas, pepper balls, and rubber bills did not pass. Additionally, a bill to decertify officers who commit bad conduct also did not pass. <u>Senator McGuire</u> stressed an appreciation and support for law enforcement, a profession that runs in the Senator's family. He acknowledged that law enforcement is now a catch all, forcing officers to deal with many issues.



President Dan thanked the Senator for talking with us, and adjourned the meeting at 1:15pm.


