Jeff Boal introduced the love of his life, Jean.





Next Friday, September 25th, it will be Bring Your Pet to Rotary Day! So, make sure your four-legged friends are close by, and ready for their close up's!




Karen Daniels celebrated her birthday on September 14th.

Today's presentation was about maintaining love in the midst of dark times, and finding the light in dark times. <u>Ben</u> shared a picture of him and <u>Judy</u> from 35 years ago. He described <u>Judy</u> as engaging, outgoing, talkative, sharp, quick witted, and had a bright smile. Ben then shared another photo of <u>Judy</u> from 2009, four days before <u>Judy</u> learned that she had Alzheimer's. She saw the diagnosis as a positive, because she had been struggling with memory issues for years. <u>Ben</u>, however, went thru a tsunami of emotions. Today, <u>Judy</u> lives in assisted living, but still has the amazing personality that <u>Ben</u> loves, and that beautiful smile.

The impacts of Alzheimer's are stunning. Alzheimer's destroys brain cells, which control our senses, most cognitive functions, and our balance. Additionally, Alzheimer's can cause behavioral issues, including hallucinations, paranoia, and anxiety.






<u>Ben</u> told us how he had to step in and take care of the daily functions Alzheimer's took from <u>Judy</u>, including brushing her hair, and painting her nails. Through all of this, <u>Ben</u> and <u>Judy</u> have found ways to keep the intimate, loving moments of their relationship alive. <u>Judy</u> loves the moments where <u>Ben</u> reads stories to her. The power of music has brought them closer together. Music, most of the time, elicits a positive response from Judy. If she was well enough, she would get up, and

dance with <u>Ben</u>. Storytelling and music have allowed <u>Ben</u> and <u>Judy</u> to keep their relationship, and their love for one another, alive.

Sadly, because of COVID-19 restrictions, <u>Ben</u> can only visit <u>Judy</u> from the sidewalk of her Assisted Living center. However, <u>Ben</u> still talks to <u>Judy</u>, and still plays the music, which gives her great joy. <u>Judy</u> did contract COVID-19, but pulled through, and bounced backed. Even though Alzheimer's disrupted their relationship, <u>Ben</u> and <u>Judy</u> have found small connections, powerful enough to defy the weight of Alzheimer's. The power of love and compassion shines through, even against the darkest of skies.

David has been married for over 38 years and has three children, including a set of fraternal twins. There are three grandsons between Rocklin and Orange County. He makes as much time as he can for his family. Though he largely grew up in Boston and New York, he graduated from SRJC in 1978 and Berkeley in 1980 after his family moved to Sonoma County.

He took his Mathematics degree and three years' experience running an Amway business, and started a career in the cash register business in 1980 that continues today. He's owned multiple small businesses and has been a real estate investor for over thirty years.

You know him as a Past President (2016-17) and a Board member of both the club and the SREF. He's also volunteered and been a Board member for Junior Achievement for over twenty years. He's got many interests including travel, golf and photography.

But today, what's most important is David's 11-year history as an avid geocacher. He's found over 4000 hidden treasure boxes, called geocaches, in 8 countries and 18 states, and he's hidden over 220 for others to find. He's found at least one geocache on every calendar day of the year. The furthest away is in Mykonos Greece, Hawaii is the furthest west, and Seoul Korea is the furthest east.
