

Dick has a boat he bought in 2014 called the Karen Jeanne. He showed pictures of the modifications he made on the boat including literally cutting the boat in half and adding several feet to its hull length. Don't try this at home. New engines were installed and hatches.

Commercial fishing somehow survives



despite the best efforts of many to make it so complicated that it can't go forward.

Changing whale migration patterns are a cause for constant regulatory changes along the way. The regulatory agency in charge, Fish and Wildlife, uses models to predict what will happen and then the regulate the fisherman accordingly. The models aren't always right. Dick works with Fish and Wildlife doing surveys and other practices.

One of the reasons trap fisheries are so sustainable is the ability to release resources unharmed



Commercial fisherman must face a barrage of regulatory barriers to bring the fish to the market. Richard agrees that whales can be endangered when there are thousands of crab pots in a relatively small area. There are engineers working on devices to protect the whales. Many of the devices work but they are cost prohibitive at this time.

We were all left with a sense of what a day in the life of our local Fishermen is like.

Obviously, commercial fishing is a tough life.
