

Dan **Rasmus** introduced Jerry Meshulam, pastpresident and current treasurer of the Sebastopol Sunrise Rotary Club. Jerry has long been a fine photographer, but in recent years has begun to focus his talent on



birds of prey. Raptors – hawks, eagles, falcons, owls, even vultures – are distinguished by their curved beaks and sharp talons, perfectly designed for catching and holding prey.



Beginning with raptors of the Sonoma Coast, <u>Jerry</u> shared photos of Peregrine Falcons, the most widely distributed raptor in the world. Male and female Peregrines are paired for life and instead of building a standard bird's nest, they dig out depressions in coastal cliffs and raise their young in the cliffs. Females are slightly larger. Peregrines are extremely fast flyers and Jerry had great stop action shots of the falcons taking off from ocean cliffs.

Moving up toward Jenner, <u>Jerry</u> and his camera discovered a pair of bald eagles. They are opportunistic hunters, and are not above stealing meals from other birds, as well as plucking fish from the ocean. In fact, <u>Benjamin Franklin</u> objected to the choice of the bald eagle as our national bird, calling them birds of "bad moral character." I guess we can accept such behavior in our politicians but not in our birds.

The Jenner Headlands Preserve has become a great place to watch migrating raptors. A number of varieties of hawks, kites and harriers can be spotted. The large red-tailed hawks, known as buteos, are the most common variety of raptor found in Sonoma Country and can often be seen soaring high above the ground, hardly moving their wings at all. The cry of the red-tailed hawk is so distinctive that it is often used in films whether or not the filmed bird is a hawk. Meanwhile, the Coopers Hawk, an accipiter, flies close to the ground with much faster wing movement. The Northern Harrier, another of the buteos, can be identified by its distinct gray coloring.

Moving inland toward Lake Sonoma, at least there once was a lake there, we enter the realm of the osprey. These raptors are all about catching fish, and they seldom get skunked. Ospreys are the second most widely distributed raptor in the world and like others, they are paired for life. In fact, the paired ospreys return to their same nest year after year to raise their young. Each year they add material to the nest so it tends to grow to enormous size. Interestingly, when an osprey grabs a fish, it always turns it with the head facing forward thus maximizing the aerodynamics. Again, some wonderful shots of ospreys in flight, and of their young.

Turning toward home, who knew Sebastopol was the home to so many owls – great horned owls and barn owls. It is not unusual to hear the familiar "Hoo, hoo" of the great horned owl in the evening. Incredibly efficient hunters, the owls enjoy the taste of gophers, which drew applause from our gopher-plagued audience.

Also common in Sebastopol, and especially in Ragle Park, is the red-shouldered hawk. This large hawk, with its red-coloring, has its own distinct cry that can be heard in many parts of town during the morning.

August 20, 2021 - Investigative Reporting - Lowell Bergman

Lowell Bergman is the Emeritus Reva and David Logan Distinguished Chair in Investigative Reporting at the Graduate School of Journalism at UC Berkeley and founder of the Investigative Reporting Program, where he taught lecture classes and then seminars dedicated to investigative reporting for 28 years. He was also а producer/correspondent for the PBS documentary series Frontline. Bergman's career spans nearly five decades, most notably as a producer, a reporter and

then the director of investigative reporting at ABC News and as a producer for CBS's 60 Minutes, leaving in 1998 as the senior producer of investigations for CBS News. In 2019, <u>Bergman</u> retired after a 50-year career in journalism and currently lives in Freestone, CA.



August 27, 2021 - Policing In America - Richard Corriea

Policing in America: A front-row-seat perspective on policing after 35 years with the SFPD, and a commentary on the history, culture and contemporary issues in policing.

<u>Richard Corriea</u> is a former San Francisco Police Department Commander. He headed up the department's Metro Division, where his span of responsibility included five district stations and over 600 sworn personnel. He will offer insight from his numerous areas of command including the Police Academy, San Francisco International Airport, Internal Affairs, Muni Transit Division, the Sexual Assault Unit and the SFPD's Crisis Intervention Team.

Policing in America has come under intense scrutiny in recent years for reasons we see nightly on television news. <u>Commander Corriea</u> has the perfect view point to help us

understand the history, culture and contemporary issues in this critically important vocation, also known as The JOB. Richard is also a master story teller that you won't want to miss.

COMMUNITY VOLUNTEER PROJECTS (Cindy Carter, Chair) -

HOMELESSNESS (Jack Dunlap, Chair) - The homeless committee has been busy organizing and learning about the issues and resources associated with the homeless, aka unhoused, in West County and in Sebastopol. Attached is a recap of the resources associated with the homeless. **Diana Rich** has helped them with information about what the City of Sebastopol is doing and provided emails of several active advocates for the homeless in the community.

The committee has met with members of the Sunrise Rotary Club, <u>Jim Glomb</u> and <u>Mike McGlothlin</u>, and they have decided to work together to identify projects. Several potential projects have been identified and the list is likely to expand. The next steps are to verify the need and value as well as the feasibility.

Since budgets are under active discussion, the committee should have a \$2,000 budget allocation so that Sebastopol Rotary can commit to helping with a project once it has passed the need and feasibility phase. The committee will provide full reporting on the status of any projects as we go through the year.

LEARN TO SWIM (**Greg Jacobs, Rick Wilson**, Co-Chairs) – **Rick** reports: "Not much to report from LTS, except that **Greg** did approach <u>Ricardo</u>, the pool manager about the possibility of catching the 2020 class of second graders, soon to be newly minted third graders in the fall. Ricardo was not excited about the prospect of fall classes and wanted to focus on the spring. This may be a blessing for us because the prospect of coming up with 100+ volunteer instructors on this short notice is daunting, to say the least. The average age of the instructors is about the same as the club."

ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY (Kathy Schwartz, Chair) – The committee is meeting [Met 8/13] to select a new project, since the Burbank Farms project is not ready.

VOCATIONAL & YOUTH SERVICE - GAIL GIJZEN, DIRECTOR:

YOUTH EXCHANGE (Multi Club Program) (Aleia Coate, Jackie Moreira, Katy Spyrka, Co-Chairs) – <u>Inactive</u> for FY 2021-2022.

COOL KIDS CAMP (**ROBIN MAYBURY**, CHAIR) – **Robin** & <u>Libby</u> want board input on whether we should consider modifying the Cool Kids Camp program to support kids who only go for a day, instead of a week. **Robin** prefers to keep it the way it is. They would like to request more help bringing next year's plans together and working with the organizations who ID the kids.

Cloverleaf Ranch would love to have more volunteers help from the Rotary Clubs of District 5130.

OVERCOMING OBSTACLES AWARD (**Tom Boag**, **Hal Kwalwasser**, **David Schreibman**, Co-Chairs) – Contacting the high school scholarship and regular counselors in another two weeks. With consolidated, reorganized, re-named schools it is important to get the Overcoming Obstacles Award 2022 information and announcement to them, teachers, and administrators and then to



students. Normal schedule is for students to apply by mid-November (Scheduling TBD, always in March, April, or early May)

INTERACT (**Pauline Pellini**, Chair) – **Pauline** Chairs all of Interact (Twin Hills, <u>Analy</u>, Brookhaven) -- School will be back in person mid-August. Advisors are in place so we should be meeting soon.

Aleia, Mark, & Gail / Directors of Analy's [West County High School] - Meetings begin once school is back in session.

INTERACT HOLIDAY ADOPT-A-FAMILY (**Pauline Pellini**, Chair) – Nothing new to report. Scheduling TBD – a Saturday in December.

LEARN WITH ME (Linda Irving, Chair) – Patti, Linda, and <u>Deborah</u> to meet soon and discuss the future of Learn with Me. No updates, except Patti has requested a meeting at the District Office to discuss whether this program will be active this year and discuss any final decisions around that. (Public Health guidance around reopening schools, while subject to change, calls for creating "stable groups" where classroom students, teacher and aide stay together with minimal contact with others. This might allow for volunteers to assist within a classroom, under the direction of the teacher. The most likely volunteer in such a case would be comfortable leading small group activities rather than individualized tutoring. It is hard to envision how Learn with Me can fit into these requirements)

FINANCIAL LITERACY (**David Schreibman**, Chairs) – Rotary has received 2 donations (a little more than \$300 & another for a little more than \$200). In the Financial Literacy presentation to the class, we teach to take the first 10% of all income and give it to charity, the next 10% to savings, and the third 10% to an investment account. **Ken** discovered the donor, <u>Luis</u>, was supporting our club as his chosen charity because of the gratitude he has for what we taught him in one class at Analy two years ago. <u>Luis</u> helps support his family while attending SRJC, and twice sent me emails after the talk asking questions. He has read all 37 documents on the "Financial Toolbox" USB drive. <u>Luis</u> has been invited, and will soon attend, one of our lunch meetings. (Scheduling TBD -Financial Literacy typically tries to be in classrooms in May before the Seniors graduate)

ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP AWARDS (RYLA) (Multi Club Program) (**Gail Gijzen**, Chair) – Nothing new to report. (Schedule typically determined in January.) HIGH SCHOOL SPEECH CONTEST (**Larry Ford**, Chair) – Nothing new to report. (Schedule TBD – after Overcoming Obstacles Award.)

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE – DOROTHY RODELLA, DIRECTOR:

WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE (Keller McDonald, Chair) – ANNUAL SUMMARIES

2020/2021 Year -- Prior to the club's August, 2020 board meeting, Int'l Director **Steve Prandini** asked for a "guesstimate" on our needs. The Committee requested \$10,000 if the club does not have a fundraiser this year, and \$15,000 if they do have a fundraiser. At their August meeting they approved a budget of \$10,000 for WCS. With this money we financially supported:

1. St. Helena Rotary's Zimbabwe Global Grant Water Project with \$2,500.

2. Puerto Vallarta South's Eye Surgery Program with a direct donation of \$6,000. This was not a Global Grant, but a direct donation to their club.

3. Santa Rosa Sunrise's Sabalo Surgery Center Project in Nicaragua with a donation of \$1,500 towards the purchase of a digital portable X-Ray machine. This was not a Global Grant, but a direct donation to their club.

<u>2019/2020 Year</u> -- The original budget the board approved was \$5,000 for the WCS Committee. However, due to a bookkeeping error, the \$2,500 committed last year to Sebastopol Sunrise's Tanzania Water project was not put in reserve at the end of last fiscal year, so the \$2,500 was taken out of this year's budget, leaving us with a budget of \$2,500 for this year. With that money we supported:

The Rotary Club of Pt. Isabel, Texas' Hands to Honduras Global Grant Rigores Water project with the \$2,500. In addition, the board approved an additional \$125 to cover the cost of TRF's overhead charge.

2018/2019 Year --_The original budget approved by the board was for \$17,397. Because the club was struggling financially, after reviewing the potential projects, the WCS committee recommended the board reduce the WCS budget to \$12,500 to help the board with its overall financial situation. This was approved by the board. With the \$12,500 we supported:

- 1. The direct expenditure to Chidamoyo Hospital in Zimbabwe of \$5,000 for the purchase of 100 hospital bed mattresses.
- 2. The expenditure of \$2,500 to support the Sebastopol Sunrise Global Grant School Water and Toilet Block Project in Bukoba, Tanzania.
- 3. The direct expenditure of \$2,500 to support Puerto Vallarta South's Water Filter project for the village of Casimiro Castillo, located Southeast of Puerto Vallarta.
- 4. The WCS Committee ended the year with a \$2,500 surplus that was NOT rolled over into next year's WCS budget, to the best of my knowledge.

PUBLIC RELATIONS (Hal Kwalwasser, Chair) – "We've nominated two organizations for the Rotary Ethics in Business Awards. One is Food for Thought, and the other is the Press Democrat. I had a good chat with <u>Rick Green</u> to inform him of our nomination. He was pleased."

The website revision for the year is underway. It should be done in two weeks.

I asked **Hal** to let me research it.

I sought input from <u>Michael Hixson</u> and have shared his and my opinion on how to approach this with **Hal** and **Diana Rich**. **Hal** and I will have a follow up meeting soon.

This evening, I completed the transition on our homepage from **Keller's** 2019/2020 Year in Review (left pane) to **Dan's** 2020/2021 Year in Review.

The new page of AppleKnockers for **Ellen's** year has been created and has our newsletters from 7/9, 7/16 and 7/23 uploaded. I have asked **Cindy Carter** to please keep the Calendar information up-to-date."

SECRETARY SUPPORT COMMITTEE (Scott Briggs, Club Secretary) – Tom Boag has assisted President Ellen with a survey of club members' requests to join their chosen defined club committees. After the July 31 deadline, a spreadsheet of all requests was provided to Ellen for Directors' use.

CLUB ACTIVITIES – SUE ENGLE, DIRECTOR:

APPLE BLOSSOM PARADE (Hal Kwalwasser, Ellen Harrington, Co-Chairs) – Hal reports: "The Apple Blossom Festival float is moving along nicely. I've met with the Sunrise Club, and so far, it's been quite productive. We have a design and a theme: Be a Superhero, Volunteer. It is an extension of our effort to promote volunteerism in the community. The "float" is a truck with banners. The one on the front repeats the theme, while the two on the side show the logos of the "Sebastopol Service and Action Coalition", that is, the eight service clubs in town. The truck is flanked by "superheroes" in costume, each one of whom carrying a sign promoting some area where we need volunteers. They are accompanied by four "leaflet-ers" who will be handing out sheets with volunteer opportunities listed. The theory of action is that by stimulating volunteerism generally we raise our profile and increase volunteering for our projects - as well as the projects of others. We do need help: We've got a truck driver and the signs are in progress, but we need six superheroes and 4 "leaflet-ers" to walk the parade route. We also need someone who can hang the banners on the truck."
