Famed journalist **Rollie Atkinson** introduced our guest speaker <u>Lowell Bergman</u>. <u>Lowell</u> is supposedly retired from a long and illustrious career as an Investigative Journalist. He worked for several publications, 60 Minutes, and UC Berkeley School of Journalism. Even though retired, he continues to work on documentary films, one of which will be on Netflix in the near future. He lives in Freestone.



As an editorial comment, your scribe can recommend a recent Hollywood movie entitled" The Insider" This movie tells the true story of our speaker, <u>Lowell Bergman</u>, as played by <u>Al Pacino</u> in his interactions with <u>Mike Wallace</u>, 60 Minutes and a tobacco company whistleblower <u>Jeffrey Wigand</u> played by <u>Russell Crowe</u>. If you haven't seen it, check it out. If you have seen it, watch it again. It is awesome. And right now you can stream it on Amazon Prime.



Lowell Bergman spoke about the history of investigative journalism. When he first began in the business, he was working with an alternative press in San Diego that was pushing up against the establishment line on the VietNam war. The powers that be were able to easily silence voices that didn't comport. Lowell and several of his friends had to leave San Diego and ended up in Guernevillle at the end of Neeley Road. (Scribe note- that's right across the river from my house. More pressure on the AppleKnocker team.)

During the 70s and 80s, various court decisions changed the face of journalism. The deregulation of the industry with the demise of the Fairness Doctrine led to one-sided

reporting. No more did the government take an interest in what went out over the airwaves. Reporting was not required to be "in the public interest."

The advent of the Internet put a strain on local news reporting until there are fewer and fewer actual reporters doing work today. Reporting on the Internet is not bound by any search for truth and anything goes. Court decisions have not only allowed deregulation but in some areas forbidden government interference with whatever is published or printed. (Reno v ACLU 1997)

Mr. Bergman presided over a lively question and answer session but, alas, was unable to provide a panacea to the general lack of truth telling in media. It is recommended that Rotarians, when following any news, go back to the Four Way Test.





President Ellen Harrington thanked our distinguished guest and noted that the Club has made a donation in his name to the Overcoming Obstacles Scholarship Fund.



Well – The AppleKnocker Team may not have come up with anything that will make headlines or collapse the Internet with its import. But we had a good time.

Policing in America: A front-row-seat perspective on policing after 35 years with the SFPD, and a commentary on the history, culture and contemporary issues in policing.

<u>Richard Corriea</u> is a former San Francisco Police Department Commander. He headed up the department's Metro Division, where his span of responsibility included five district stations and over 600 sworn personnel. He will offer insight from his numerous areas of command including the Police Academy, San Francisco International Airport, Internal Affairs, Muni Transit Division, the Sexual Assault Unit and the SFPD's Crisis Intervention Team.

Policing in America has come under intense scrutiny in recent years for reasons we see nightly on television news. <u>Commander Corriea</u> has the perfect view point to help us understand the history, culture and contemporary issues in this critically important

vocation, also known as The JOB. Richard is also a master story teller that you won't want to miss.
