


"All the News that Fits We Print"

Myriah Volk was born in Los Angeles in 1975, meaning your aging scribe was immediately depressed. But her family moved to Sonoma County in 1981. She also played basketball for Healdsburg High, where she earned statewide recognition. Eventually earning a record 12 varsity letters, she was named the Sonoma County Athlete of the Year in 1993 and was inducted into the Healdsburg High Hall of Fame in 2013. If we ever have a Rotary basketball team, we now have an in-house ringer! She earned a Division 1 basketball scholarship to Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo. But after so many years of training and playing, by her sophomore year, she had simply burned out on sports and gave up her scholarship.

But what called to her was acting. So, it was off to Hollywood. She discovered she spent as much time waiting tables as acting, but she was able to get small parts in some films and TV shows. "Buffy the Vampire Slayer" comes to mind, and she once shared a scene with Dick Van Dyke, truly a memorable moment for her.






With the acting career not exactly moving at Warp speed, she moved to San Francisco, waitressing once again. But travel called to her, so she moved to London and then to the warmer climes of Barcelona...still in her 20's. There she met a boy, had a baby boy, and they decided to move back to the U.S. After another child and a divorce, **Myriah** found herself in Sebastopol. Using her basketball background, she started the "Little Hoopsters" program at The Community Center – basketball for preschoolers. She also began work as a personal trainer at Coaches' Corner.

With all her talents and interests, perhaps her greatest passion right now is the non-profit she started – "Shoes 4 Kids." The mission of this program is to provide a good pair of athletic shoes to every kid who needs one. It has attracted a lot of attention and star power. Former NFL star, Jerry Robinson, is the chair of the board

and she and Jerry now have a pod cast – "People Doing Good", which highlights individuals in the community who are making a positive difference – people doing good. In fact, Guy Fieri has been a guest.

World Community Service chair, **Keller McDonald**, shared with us some details of the Puerto Vallarta Sur Water Filter Project. Working with the Puerto Vallarta Sur club and with the Rotary Club of Santa Rosa, our club has provided \$1,500 to purchase 25 water filters for households and families in need of clean water in the Puerto Vallarta area. Those will be matched with another 25 filters for a total of 50!!

Program chair, **Dan Rasmus**, introduced our speaker, <u>Vivian Straus</u>. Vivian grew up on her family's dairy farm in Marshall. Much like **Myriah Volk**, she heard the Siren song of Hollywood, leaving life on the farm to pursue an acting career. But she learned that you can take the girl out of the farm, but you cannot take the farm out of the girl. Proclaiming her love for cows, she left the lights of Hollywood behind and returned north to join the family business – Straus Family Creamery as <u>VP of Marketing</u>, later serving as Public Relations Coordinator for Cowgirl Creamery.



While she continues to help manage the home ranch, her passion for local cheese has led her to a leadership role in the California Cheese Trail. Getting back to Hollywood for a

moment, Vivian has actually combined the two worlds with her one woman show, "E-i-E-i-OY! In Bed with the Farmer's Daughter, which she wrote and performed to sold-out audiences. And she is opening a new performance piece about her mother in October.

The Cheese Trail promotes local artisan cheesemakers and family farmers, providing tours, events, and cheese-making classes. In a time when dairies in both Marin and Sonoma counties are disappearing, The Cheese Trail is an effort to increase the visibility and, hopefully, the profitability of our local cheesemakers. Forget Wisconsin, we have many wonderful and unique cheeses being made right here and most of these locations can be visited. And that is where the Cheese Trail comes in. It provides a map to and information about – updated yearly – all the marvelous cheese makers all around us. Try Valley Ford Cheese or Bella Cheese in Sonoma or the "off the wall' cheese of Bohemian Creamery. One can take a driving tour of cheesemakers. Just take a look at cheesetrail.org. It provides directions to a vast array of cheese tasting opportunities. Now where did I put that Chardonnay?



Thanks, <u>Vivian</u>, for your dedication to local agriculture and our farmers/cheesemakers. Once again, we learned that Hollywood's loss was our gain.
