<u>"Fighting the Dixie Fire"</u> - In September, 2021, our club member, **Guy Smith**, received a call in the middle of the night. He needed to bring his bulldozer to Susanville to aid in fighting the Dixie fire, which had been burning in that area since July and was approaching one million acres. He was to come, not tomorrow, not in a few hours, but now. So, he packed his protective gear, put his dozer on a big truck and took off as fast as he could go, eventually passing almost every truck on I-5 with the blessing of the CHP. Little did he – or wife, <u>Michelle</u>, - know that he would not return home until October.



Why **Guy**? He has a long history of working with large trucks, bulldozers and other large machinery. He even demonstrated for us how to sink a bulldozer into the mud of the Laguna, and get it out again. Don't try this at home. He is a professional! He shared for us some of his history with large trucks, driving for **Walt Tischer** – long time Rotarian, the <u>Soiland family</u>, and working with his son in logging operations. As a young man, he also worked for the division of forestry

in fire protection. **Walt,** whom many of us knew, must have been a patient man as he watched Guy attempt to strip every gear on his Peterbilt.

When **Guy** arrived in Susanville after his late night drive, he and his bulldozer were put right to work cutting fire breaks. They cut large swaths through trees and brush. He said that it really is ironic that they were knocking down trees in order to save trees. (Rather like **Keller** hunting ducks to save ducks) They were also able to cut lines around historical buildings thus saving them from the flames. With so much smoke and dust, they were often doing this dangerous work in near zero visibility. They also were required at times to work at night, when all they could really see was the light of the other bulldozers working nearby. And falling trees and branches proved to be a hazard. **Guy** said that hardly anyone, including himself, escaped without a broken windshield, which was a real bummer because it spoiled the air conditioning and filtered cabin air.



Their work would have been impossible without GPS and mapping. Not only did it show them where they had to go, but it also indicated escape routes when flames came dangerously close. He shared a number of photos of fire that was



seemingly down, only to roar to life with a change of wind or weather conditions. One photo showed a bulldozer in front of him that actually caught on fire. It became necessary for them to clear a large safety zone where they could park while fire burned around them. So many hazards and dangers in this work: spot fires suddenly breaking out and quickly spreading, volcanic rock that could tip a dozer over, smoke and poor visibility, the unpredictability of wind and weather.

But in the end, **Guy** and his courageous fellow operators, along with the seemingly tireless fire fighters, finally put this monster fire down. We owe them all a deep debt of gratitude. Thanks **Guy** for sharing with us and for all you do.



President Ellen thanked **Guy** for a fascinating program and before adjourning our meeting, **President Ellen** left us with this question to ponder:" Do twins ever realize that one of them was unplanned?" She rang the bell.
