From Gene Nelson

On this month when we celebrate Presidents' Day, and just one week from the birthday of Abraham Lincoln, I share some of his thoughts on just what it means to be "this nation under God."

During the Civil War, Lincoln was often visited by northern clergy. During one meeting, a clergyman exclaimed that he prayed daily that God is on our side. Lincoln replied, "I do not agree with you. I am not at all concerned about that, for I know God is always on the side of the right. But it is my constant anxiety and prayer that I and this nation should be on the Lord's side."

And in his second inaugural address, this man who, it was said, felt all of the grief and none of the hatred of the Civil War, concluded this speech for the ages with these timeless words: "With malice toward none; with charity for all; with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in; to bind up the nation's wounds; to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for this widow, and his orphan – to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace, among ourselves and among all nations."

**Pauline Pellini** introduced our trio of speakers representing the Western Sonoma County Historical Society. First speaker was <u>Teresa Ramondo</u>. <u>Teresa</u> is presently directing the Society. She is a well-known Sebastopolite (Sebastopolian?) (Sebastopudlian?) who served as director of the Chamber of Commerce for many years.

The Historical Society was founded in 1975 to feature the Luther Burbank Experimental Farm – a unique local treasure. It expanded to include a Historical Museum and Archive in the old Depot building downtown. The Society is funded by memberships - \$30 per or \$100 for angels. They also receive grant money. The Rotary Club of Sebastopol has made many such grants.



They sponsor a Cemetery walk each year as a major fundraiser. They present historical vignettes in the cemetery itself. They are always looking for new volunteers, especially young people ( they know how to work the computers and stuff – really helpful.)



Gail Lee then spoke representing the Burbank Farm. Luther Burbank was a towering historical figure. He rode his bike out to Sebastopol from his home in Santa Rosa to the Farm to complete his work with plants. He was friends with luminaries such as Thomas Edison, Henry Ford and Helen Keller.

The Society preserves his work and raises money through plant sales,

wreaths, and jam sales. They have a cadre of volunteers to work on the property and provide docent led tours to schools and interested groups. They are presently working on a deer proof garden.

<u>Donna Pittman</u> discussed the Museum. It has a very popular exhibit right now of Autos and automotive history. They have had exhibits about the hippies of Sebastopol and also the Pomo Indians. They have 16 trained docents. They have a large archive and can provide assistance to interested history buffs. They are attempting to digitize a large amount of material that has been donated over the years.
