INTERNATIONAL SERVICE UPDATE





An Update from our Board of Directors: **Dorothy Rodella**- Director, International Service

Dorothy came forward to update the club on International Service. Our club is involved in three areas:

- Rotary International Foundation **Lu Frazier**, chair: this involves two areas of focus: the general fund and polio plus. Our club goal is to raise \$20,000 for the general fund and \$10,000 for Polio plus.
- World Community Service **Keller McDonald**, chair. This committee has a budget of \$11,200 and is currently at work looking at a number of service opportunities
- Programa de Becas **Dorothy Rodella**, chair. This scholarship program, in cooperation with the Puerto Vallarta South Rotary Club, is now an

"official" Sebastopol Rotary committee under the umbrella of International Service. The program, which over the years has provided a number of scholarships for students of all ages, from middle school through the university, has been supported by individual Sebastopol Rotarians. All money received goes directly to the student. The goal for this Rotary year is to provide 22 scholarships. A middle school scholarship is \$250; high school \$300; university \$350. THE PROGRAM





Hal Kwalwasser introduced our speaker, <u>Estelle Rogers</u>, who also happens to be his wife. For a number of year <u>Estelle</u> was the Legislative Director for Project Vote. She retired in 2015, but not really. She went on to chair the American Bar Association's committee on election law, as well as serving on the group, Lawyers Defending Democracy.

<u>Estelle</u> began by saying that when we discuss Election Law, we really are talking about a topic with three distinct parts:

- Before Election Day
- Election Day itself
- Post Election

Before Election Day:

Much of the pre-Election Day activity centers around voter registration. Every state, even smaller entities such as townships, have their own

laws and practices concerning voter registration, such as:

- Automatic Registration: you receive a letter in the mail telling you that you are registered.
- Pre-registration: this is offered to 16 or 17-year olds. They pre-register, then are automatically registered when they turn 18.
- On line registration
- Same Day registration
- Voter registration drives
- Register when you get or renew a driver's license.

What also can happen before an election and is quite common is a purging of the registration rolls. Literally thousands of names have been removed, often without informing the very people being purged. Some states also provide unsolicited absentee ballots, ballots mailed automatically to voters. Since the 2020 election, many states have also made the effort to restrict absentee or mail in ballots.

Election Day

Largely because of COVID, the 2020 election saw a major uptick in the number of mail in and absentee ballots submitted. Some states require a potential voter to provide an explanation – an excuse – for wanting an absentee ballot, while others state are no excuse needed absentee states. This election also saw an increase in drop box voting, 24-hour voting, early voting and drive up voting. On election day, there are a number of different state requirements concerning voter ID, and also who can exactly deliver a ballot – family member or non-family member. Some states prohibit this, even as they enact stricter ID requirements. A recent issue has been the presence of partisan poll watchers. Sent to polling places by political parties, are they there to ensure a fair election, or is their mission more intrusive, perhaps even an effort to frighten or intimidate voters? Some new state laws seem to allow these partisan poll watchers more latitude for intrusion.

Post-Election:

This is where things have really gotten interesting since 2020. Security of ballots and voting machines has become a huge issue. Just who can handle ballots, count ballots and secure all the voting related equipment. Voter subversion has become an issue, with a number of states – Texas, for example - passing laws that seemingly make it easier for state officials to overturn election results they don't like. If a governor doesn't like the outcome of a presidential election in his or her state, can that governor or legislature simply throw out the results, dismiss the duly elected presidential electors appoint new,

unelected ones? Can legitimate election results now be de-certified by a state secretary of state simply because his or her party didn't win? Indeed, can Congress do the same? The rioters of Jan. 6 had no problem with that. And who exactly is supervising recounts these days? Makes the 2022 election just a bit frightening...perhaps a lot frightening.

The Voting Rights act of 1964, a far-reaching, ground breaking piece of legislation, ensured that all people, especially minorities and the marginalized, had the right to vote. Section 5 of that legislation stated that certain jurisdictions, primarily in the South where voting rights had long been restricted, had to have the approval of the U.S. Justice Department before any changes to voting laws could be enacted. In 2013, Shelby County in Alabama, asked the Supreme Court to be released from the restrictions of Section 5. The Court agreed with Shelby County, essentially gutting Section 5 and opening the door to the draconian voting restrictions states are passing today. The Voting Rights Act also had a Section 2 which made it illegal to discriminate against voters. Justice Alito ruled that there was, in Estelle's words. "non-enough discrimination" to justify any restrictions, so essentially Section 2 was thrown out as well. And so, since the 2020 election, state after state has passed laws restricting drive in or drop box voting, limiting absentee and mail in voting, reducing the number of polling places, and reducing the number of days for early voting. Current bills before Congress seeking to protect the right to vote for all people seemingly do not have much of a chance for approval.

<u>Estelle</u> pointed out there is a terrible irony that underlies all these laws restricting voting. Politicians have created doubt and uncertainty about voting in spite of all the evidence to the contrary. So now they enact restrictive laws to address the doubt and uncertainty that they themselves originally created! Historically this country has expanded voting rights. We have moved from only white male property owners to all white males to females to minorities to including eighteen-year-olds. Are we now about to witness a contraction of the voting rights so many have fought to protect?

Thank you to Estelle Rogers for a provocative program.
