Dan Rasmus introduced Club Member **Greg Jacobs**. **Greg** was raised in Sebastopol. His dad was a local dentist, musician, and Rotarian. **Greg** grew up to be a local District Attorney, musician, and Rotarian. **Greg** got his education at Stanford and Berkeley. No wonder he is so conflicted.

Greg spoke to us about his time as lead prosecutor on one of the



most notorious murder cases of our time, the <u>Polly Klaas</u> case. Everyone in the country followed the case of the abduction and murder of this young girl, including most everyone in the news media. **Greg** was picked to lead the prosecution of the killer, <u>Richard Allen Davis</u>.



Greg gave a behind-the-scenes look at what it is like to be in the middle of a major murder case and a major press case. **Greg** knew he had a lot going for him. The evidence was on his side, circumstantial but easily understood by the jury. He also appreciated the judge in the case who was always fair.

Greg's team had its problems. It was not simple to keep the arguments within the team. The second chair wanted to be first chair. The clerk thought maybe she knew better than everyone else. And maybe the lead investigator was going to write a book. The defendant had confessed. There was good evidence. The trial venue had been changed. And yet the challenges were intense.

Greg knew that he could not lose this case and yet there were opportunities to do so. The media was hounding him several times a day and he realized that most of them had no idea of how murder trials worked. Fortunately, the judge did the things necessary to keep things on an even keel. The trial ended in conviction and a death penalty sentence. The whole country was watching.

Estelle was a voting rights lawyer in Washington for 11 years before her retirement in 2015. Since then, she has done extensive voter protection work for campaigns in several states and currently chairs the American Bar Association's bipartisan Standing Committee on Election Law. Her talk will focus on state efforts to curtail the right to vote, both before and since the 2020 election, and what Congress can do to push back.
